The Manager, Mr. Maclean, read the notice convening the meeting, and also the following report:

THE TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE UNION LOAN AND SAVINGS COMPANY FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1887.

1. The Directors of the Union Loan and Savings Company have the honor to acknowledge the interest and attention of the Stockholders in the annual meeting held at the Company's offices, 28 and 30 Toronto-street, on Wednesday, the 25th inst., at 3 o'clock, p.m.

2. It will be seen that after paying the annual half-yearly dividends at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum, interest on deposits and deposits, municipal tax, and other expenses, a further sum of \$10,000 has been added to the reserve fund, and \$6,022.58 carried to the contingent account, which now amounts to \$24,428.18, and is available for all contingencies.

3. It will further be seen that the subscribed capital stock of the Company amounts to \$1,000,000, on which \$200,000 has been paid up, and which includes the new issue of \$400,000, on which 20 per cent. has been paid up, and \$200,000 remains unpaid at the discretion of the Stockholders.

4. The loans effected during the year amount to \$429,374, as against \$429,370 for the corresponding period last year. As explained in former reports, your Directors have always been very careful to select loans of a profitable nature, and to secure the security of real estate in the Province of Ontario; no applications are entertained on the security of property located in other provinces, and the financial stringency which occurred somewhat suddenly about the latter part of October has increased the demand for money at a better rate, but having to provide for the approaching dividend, and complete a large number of loans previously placed, your Directors had little or no funds to loan, without making other arrangements. But rather than incur any obligation to the Company's Stockholders, your Directors have decided to suspend the issue of further applications for loans until after the 31st of December, when the Company's business will be closed, and a growing demand for money is anticipated, and can now be readily obtained on securities at increased rates.

5. The repayments on loans which have matured during the year amount to \$424,003, as against \$375,116 for the corresponding period last year. The interest on current loans, with few exceptions, continues to be met with regularity, while no losses of any serious nature have occurred, and the Directors have no report to make.

6. The deposits for this year show a slight falling off, as compared with the year ending 31st December, 1886, the figures show \$480,320, as against \$480,580, while the debentures have increased from \$270,000 to \$350,400, being an increase of \$80,400, partly obtained from local sources but mostly from Scotland, and in consequence of this the various officers of the Company have the pleasure to report that they have made favorable arrangements with, and have signed the necessary contracts with, Messrs. J. & A. F. Adam, Edinburgh, and Messrs. Allan, Bockley Allan & Milne, Aberdeen, both professional firms of good standing, and long standing, to represent the Company in Scotland—the former as General Agents for the South and West of Scotland, and the latter for the North of Scotland, in lieu of Messrs. Philip, Lowe & Trail, resigned. Your Directors have reason to believe the arrangements will be attended with satisfactory results.

7. The attention of your Directors has been drawn to the fact that the Company's by-laws, rules and regulations require to be revised, and it is suggested that a resolution will be submitted authorizing the Directors to make such alterations and additions therein as they may think proper.

8. In conclusion, your Directors have the pleasure to report that the auditors have verified their usual care and attention to the Company's books and accounts, and that all the officers of the Company have discharged their respective duties to the entire satisfaction of the Stockholders.

9. The various offices in the Company's building have been fully occupied at good rentals during the year.

10. The Directors hold their seats for year to year, but are eligible for re-election at the discretion of Messrs. Lepper and Trotter, who will retire. It will therefore be necessary to elect two new members to fill the vacancies left by their retirement.
