



THE DEATH RATE IS LOW.

The health of a city is judged by its death-rate. Toronto's health and sauitary aragements are good, judged by the bills o

ragements are good, judged by the bills of mortality for the past month.

The death-rate is lower than in any month of the past two years. There were only 195 interments in the four large city cemeteries. Seldom, indeed, is the total below 200.

More gratifying is the continued decrease of deaths from infectious diseases. During the month there was but one death from typhoid fever. There were only five each from diphtheria and scarlet fever, a decrease of three compared with the previous

month.

June was a month of drownings above the average. These numbered six and suicides and fatal accidents make up a dozen.

Of the certified causes of death of the 195 porsons buried in the city cemeteries last month 12 were attributed to broughtis, 6 to drowning, 5 each to diphtheria and soarlet fever, 3 to apoplexy, 2 to accident, and 1 each to alcohol, suicide, poison and cholera infantum.
