

THE WORK.



OD is owning the work among the Young Men of our city. It is true there is little

outward show, but there is that, more to be desired, a deepening and widening spiritual interest both on the part of our workers, and those among whom they work. At the last meeting of the Board, the Chairman of our Boarding House Committee reported 671 visits to Boarding Houses and 82 visits to Fire Halls, Police Stations, Car Stables, Hotels, Livery Stables, &c. An important feature in the report was "Young Men spoken to" 91, while the report for previous week showed on the list 115.

The Reception Committee reported regular attendance by its members during the month.

The Devotional Committee spoke of the growing interest in the meetings, and gave glory to God for continued proofs of His power as manifested in the conviction and conversion of several young men.

The financial aspect in regard to removal of our debt is so encouraging as to warrant us in beginning to lay plans for alterations in our Hall.

HE following extract is from a published address on the "Inspiration of the Bible"

Massachusetts in October last:-

"Again, I conclude that this Book has in it the very breath of God, from the effect that it produces upon men. There are men who study philosophy, astronomy, geology, geography, and mathematics, but did you ever hear a man say, "I was an outcast, a wretched inebriate, a disgrace to my race, and a nuisance in the world, until I began to study mathematics, and learned the multiplication table, and then turned my attention to geology, got me a little hammer, and knocked off the corners of the rocks and studied the formation of the earth; but since that time I have been happy as the day is long; I feel like singing all the time, my soul is full of triumph and peace; and health and blessing have come to my desolate home once more." But I can bring you, not one man, or two, or ten, but men by the thousand who will tell you, "I was wretched; I was lost; I broke my poor old mother's heart; I beggared my family; my wife was broken-hearted and dejected; my children fled from the sound of their father's footstep: I was ruined, reckless, helpless, homeless, hopeless, until I heard the words of that Book!" he will tell you the very word which fastened on his soul. A WORD TO YOUNG MEN.



AKE CARE!" said the commanding officer to a soldier as he was going to a post from which several senti-

nels, one after another, had mysteriously disappeared; "take care; be watchful and on your guard every moment, for thus only will you be safe." And, as they were at warfare with the Indians and in the Indian country, the caution was of deep significance and import-

The soldier went to his post, and was watchful against the first possible intimation of danger, feeling that his life depended on it. For a time all was still and quiet. Not a sound was heard, not

a movement seen, till, by and by, he noticed one of the large hogs of the forest quietly feeding among the trees and gradually drawing nearer to the place where he stood. Carefully watching its movements, he suspected danger, and, raising his rifle, fired, when, with a yell of agony, an Indian leaped up from the disguise and fell dead before him, while he himself was safe. His caution and watchfulness had saved him!

To every young man we would repeat the admonition to the soldier, Take care!" For the pathway of life is surrounded with dangers to the young, and to every one an all-important caution is, "Take care; be watchful

if you would be safe."

1. Take care of your health. A sound mind depends largely on a sound and healthful body, and without health you are not likely to have vigor, or cheerfulness, or courage for duty, or success in life. Do all in your power, then, to have and keep good health.

2 Take care of your time It is one of the most precious of god's gifts. Mis-improved, it is loss, injury, ruin; rightly used, it is success, character, influence, life to the intellect, life to the soul. Know, then, and constantly remember, the value of time, Seize and improve every moment as it passes.

3. Take care as to your associates. Not only will you be known by the company you keep, but you will soon become like it. "He that walketh with wise men shall be wise, but the companion of fools shall be destroyed.' And last and most important of all—

4. Take care of your soul. Not only take care as to your health, your time, your ssociates, and, it may be added, your habits and morals, but take into view your entire being and entire existence, and care for your soul. Remember that you are to live for ever when the sun shall have gone out in darkness Conducted by the General Secretary and the last star shall be quenched from the heavens, and begin to live here as you shall wish to live for ever, to form

here the character and here lay a foundation for the hopes in which you would rejoice through endless ages. Take God's word as the man of your counsel and the guide of your life. Believe in Christ as the divine and only Saviour; receive his truth; obey his requirements; cherish his spirit; rely on his promises; and trust yourself, with all your interests, for time and eternity, to him. Thus take care for your highest and best interests, for your immortality, and you shall be safe and and happy both for time and for eternity.
