LONDON, March 13 .- (C. A. P.) - The Daily Telegraph this morning, commenting upon attacks made upon Winston Churchill and the admiralty document, says: "Surely there is nothing to justify such language as that used by Emmerson. They are wild words of an angry man, and we deplore any suggestion that there has been interference by an imperial minister in affairs of the Dominion. The closest examination will, we are convinced, show that the naval authorities in London, when directly questioned by the official exponent of the Canadian opinion, could not in politeness refuse to show the same courtesy to Borden as that which they are willing to extend to all Dominion ministers, including Laurier himself, when he was in office. The bare idea of interference with the politics of the dominions who received their autonomous powers from the throne voluntarily and without reserve, is entirely foreign to British opinion. 



In its reply, which will be made public Friday by the committee appointed to frame it, it will be stated that the refusal is based on the fact that the provisions of the challenger deprive the New York Yacht Club of the right given it by the deed of gift, to select a vessel of such size as it pleases, provided the yacht be not less than 65 nor more than 90 feet on the water line. Plenty of Canadian manufacturers in all lines of industry had done so. The high wages paid in this

country made the importation of work-men a simple matter.

"But," said Mr. Pugsley, "there are expert workmen in this country. Many of the expert riveters in the American yards come from the Province of Nova

Mr. Pugsley declared that the Liberal Government had never intended to build their guns in Canada, but when that government had broached the subject of building ships in this country, it was at once suggested to them that they build the ships in Eng-lard, but the government had vetoed the suggestion and had at once received many tenders from British ship builders to build ships in Canada.

Riveters Are Scarce. Mr. Borden replied that Mr. Pugsley was mistaken about the possibility of obtaining riveters in England. He had it on good authority that at the present time there was a paucity of expert riveters in England. He also stated that it was to all intents and purposes impossible to manufacture guns in Canada, pointing out that one machine alone, used in the manufacture of a certain part of a gun, cost

To this Mr. Pugsley as usual had a ready reply. He declared that it had never been the policy of the Liberals to build guns in this country, but that

they had advocated in the past and advocated now the building of the greater part of the battleships in Canada. Canadian labor should be employed in the building of Canadian

ships.

Even the defaulting African State of Liberia paid off its outstanding debts in cash as a result of protracted negotiations. Ecuador resumed remittances for the service of the Guayaquil and Quito Railway bonds and indeed the only two Spanish-American republics remaining on the defaulters' list are Guatemala and Honduras, the former especially showing no indication of repentance for what the council describes as an "act of spoliation by which the bondholders were arbitrarily robbed of the revenues specially assigned to them."

No less than nine of the states of the North American Union remain on the black list. Those thus pilloried are: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina and West Virginia. Contrary to what is commonly supposed, none of their repudiated obligations were "war" debts, but, so far as the council is aware, the money, in most cases, was borrowed for works of public utility. Mississippi issued loans of \$7,000,000 between 1831 and 1838 to establish the Planters' and Union Bank and paid coupons while it flourished, but ceased payment when it got into difficulties. North Carolina, after the civil war, borrowed \$12,-500,000, largely expended in railroad construction, and repudiated the debt after three coupon payments, on the ground that it was contracted under a "carpet bag" administration. Tennessee made a similar excuse, but repented and paid.

In his budget speech, delivered in the legislative assembly of British Columbia in the latter part of last month, the Hon. Price Ellison, minister of finance, made an important statement on the taxation question. 

Keep washing until the leaves not only look fresh and clean, but feel smooth to the touch. Now put the spinach in a deep kettle with a sprinkling of salt and some

bits of bacon to season. You will not need to add water, there will be enough clinging to the leaves and more will be extracted from the plants by

Cover the kettle closely and cook, turning several times, about fifteen minutes; if not tender cook five minutes more.

If you have never cooked spinach, you will be surprised to see that the peck you put to cook has shrunken to a small bowlful and that there is generous quantity of water in the kettle. Drain off all the moisture and chop the vegetable fine. Most familie

SERUM CANNOT WORK HARM MAY BE BOON TO HUMANITY

Dr. Friedmann Points Out to Convention at Ottawa That Great Drawback of Treatment Hitherto Has Been Inability of Scientists to Rid Bacilli of Virulent Character Believes He Has Solved Problem.

In an address given by Dr. Friedmann at the opening session of the convention of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis in the Russell Theatre, the German scientist reviewed his efforts to discover a serum that would combat tuberculosis. Hon. Adam Beck presided and among the other guests were HRH. the Duke of Connaught, Hon. Martin Burrell, and many of the leading physicians of the Dominion. In part Dr. Friedmann said: "Since

the discovery of tuberculine it becomes a well-known and recognized fact that in the bacillus itself were to be found the antigenes—that means the substance which contains or produces the curative bodies. During | these last twenty-three years all efforts were therefore directed toward the extracting and isolating of ef-fective elements with different methous by chemical, thermic, mechanical and biological proceedings. We feel that this is a work that should be undertaken by people who are charitably inclined, by municipalities assisting such organizations and by the government doing all in its power by educational ways and means and by financial assistance to institutions that may be established by charitable organiza-

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. ANY person who is the sole head of

father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cuitivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead; right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


