BRITAIN CALLING FOR MORE DOCTORS Needs Qualified Men to Join Royal Army Medical Corps. Message Received in Toronto Yesterday Announced at Local Camp.

Medical practitioners from Canada to join the Royal Army Medical Corps and to serve during the war with rank of lieutenant have been asked for by the British war office. This important announcement was made by Lieut.-Col. J. T. Fotheringham, A.D.M.S., at Hamilton Park camp yesterday afternoon.

At present only doctors registered in Nova Scotia, Quebec, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, and who are graduates of universities in those provinces are eligible. If the necessary action is taken by the provincial medical boards the practitioners of Ontario and the other provinces then become eligible.

At present all the provinces do not have reciprocal relations with the English authorities in regard to the registration of doctors. Regarding this the war office states it is willing to accept Canadian University graduates registered in Canada, and provincial medical boards, not already reciprocating with the general medical council, express a desire to reciprocate.

A dispatch from Flisgard, Wales, says: Thirteen members of the crew of the British steamship Agulla, which was sunk by the German submarine U28 on Saturday night, lost their lives. The survivors, who arrived here today, say the Agulla was sunk at a point 50 miles southwest of the Small, a group of rocks on the southeast coast of Ireland.

The crew was given four minutes in which to leave the ship, but survivors say the steamer was fired upon while the men were getting into the launch. The submarine was making 10 knots, however, and quickly overtook them.

The attempt of the Agulla to escape seemed to arouse the anger of the Germans, for they gave the crew and passengers only four minutes in which to leave the ship. But before this the submarine opened fire, which was kept up rapidly while the crew endeavored to get into the launch.

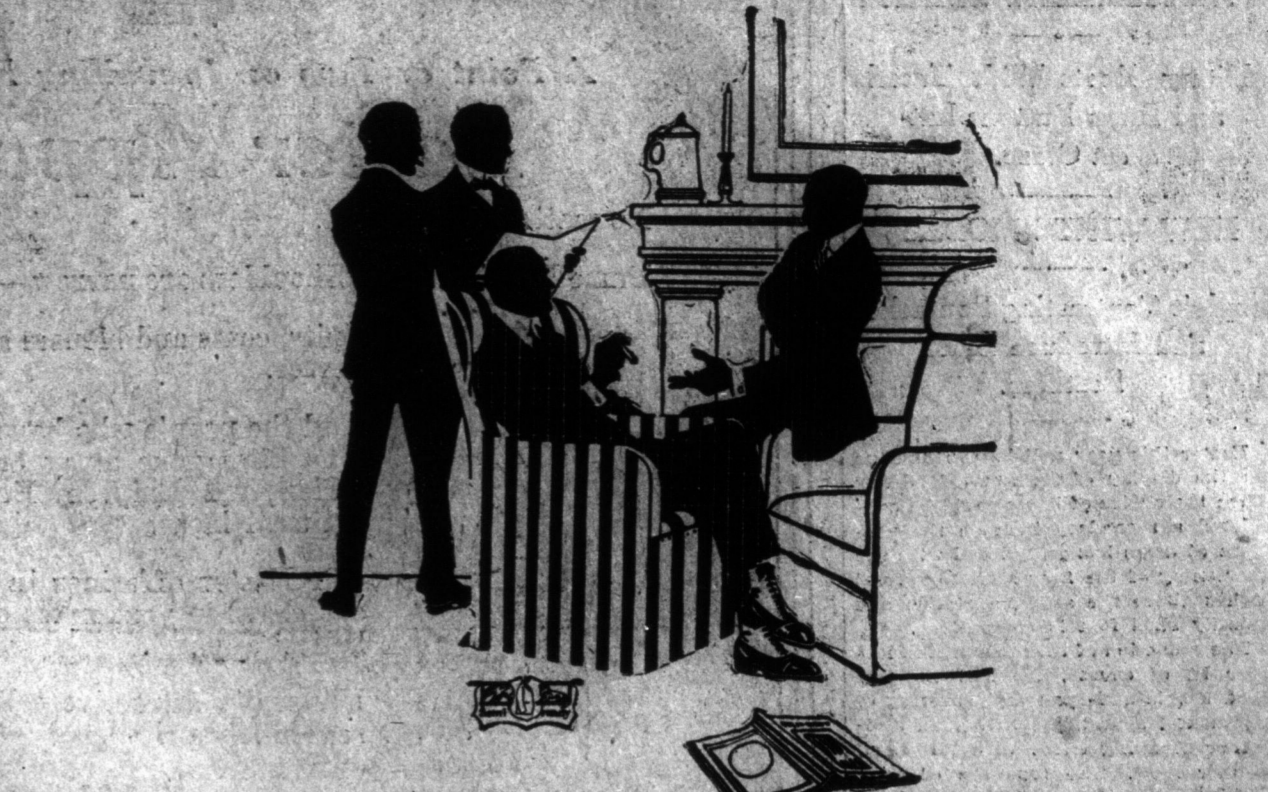

INIMITABLE HUMOR, DELICIOUS SATIRE

Prof. Leacock Spoke Yesterday in Aid of Belgian Victims.

HEARD TO ADVANTAGE

Destroyed All Tradition When Originator Addressed Large Audience.

Humorists in the flesh seldom live up to the impress of themselves as they leave it upon paper. It remains for Stephen Leacock to break the record to destroy all tradition and preconceived ideas to the contrary and stand before the packed proportions of the Royal Alexandra Theatre yesterday afternoon a living embodiment and perfect interpreter of the inimitable humor and delicious satire of which he was himself the originator and which he had put into books.

Professor Leacock, who spoke under the auspices of the Franco-British Aid Society and in aid of the Belgian victims of the war, was introduced by the chairman, Sir William Mulock, as an old Torontonian of British stock and Canadian development. The speaker received a hearty welcome from the big audience, who whom he at once got in touch, when he stated that owing to the shortness of time he could not follow the prescribed program to get them into good humor. He would merely ask them to get into that condition at once. The laugh that followed showed immediate compliance with the request. It is safe to say that not for a decade, and perhaps never before in Toronto, was so risible-raising an address given.

An entire novel—the latest thing in up-to-date fiction—as the modestly declared having the vaguest of names and a "mission" was the first offering of the entertainer. The story dealt with the all-absorbing romance of Vere de Vere, who is crossing on the Gloriantia, and to preserve his incognito calls himself Lancy de Vere. The other party to the situation is a girl, mysterious to the eye of the first, because she "travels alone with no one but her mother and maid." As the tale develops the steel of satire, always, however, sheathed in the softest of velvet glove, is handed out to the American multi-millionaire, the woman of a certain type, and to the fortune hunter from across the sea. The romance ended with the elopement of the principals, and the third in the triangle, the lady asking when elopement was proposed: "May I bring my husband—the multi-millionaire—because I want to feel out and touch him?"

Problem Play. A problem play in three acts was the next number. Of this the hero was a "narrow young man in a frock coat." The inefficient sort of a young man that a starved woman in a play sees med about. There was also a maid who "spoke French to make herself clear to an American audience," and a "whole third act of which 80 per cent. was silence."

FIRST NIGHTS AT TORONTO THEATRES.

DISTINCT TRIUMPH FOR PERCY HASWELL

"Stop Thief" at Alexandra Was Splendidly Portrayed Last Night.

A THREE ACT FARCE

Favorable Impression Made by Capable Company of Carlyle Moore's Play.

Percy Haswell and her capable company scored another distinct triumph at the Alexandra last night in the initial presentation of "Stop Thief," Carlyle Moore's screaming three-act farce. The production is not new to Toronto and playgoers who witnessed the original production and were present last night were most favorably impressed by the superb delineation of the various characters by Miss Haswell and her cast.

Miss Haswell made a splendid Nellie, while Miss Eleanor Russell, as Madge Carr, was excellent, Miss Catherine Campbell in the difficult role of the deaf Mrs. Carr, contributing in no small degree to the success of the production.

Jack Amory made an ideal William Carr, ground whose absentmindedness revolves much of the action of the play. He was perfect in the trying role of the valuable wedding gifts. A series of the most laughable complications ensue, which keep the audience in one long fit of laughter as plot and counter-plot follow and things become so intricately mixed that it takes an entire act at the finish to straighten out the exceedingly amusing puzzle. Special matinee will be given on Good Friday.

Featuring the show at the Star Theatre this week is the dancing of "Zallah," who, judging by the reception accorded her by the large audiences at the Temperance street playhouse last night, will make a greater hit here than she did at Hammerstein's. The burlesque part of the show is well put on. Walter Park and Frank Penny, Irish and Hebrew comedians, are dispensers of good, clean funmaking. There are a large number of attractively costumed girls in the chorus.

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BRINGING UP FATHER IS ONE LONG LAUGH

Cartoon Comedy at the Grand Full of Real Fun and Good Music.

JOHN CAIN AS "JIGGS"

Quaint Characterization That Follows Closely the Idea of the Cartoonist.

"Snappy with action, sparkling with humor, melodious with song and keenly satirical is "Bringing Up Father," the cartoon comedy that is founded on George McManus' famous newspaper sketches, and which was presented for the first time at the Grand Opera House last night. It shows a simple old man, who retains the habits of the laborer, but who has acquired wealth, in the clutch of the wife of his young manhood, who has developed a society mania. He has two beautiful daughters, one of whom wants to marry a nobleman, and the other wants to marry the singer in a movie show. Poor father has an awful time getting the beer that he wants to quench a thirst developed by hard manual labor, for Maggie, his "society" wife, considers beer vulgar.

Most of the amusing situations centre about Jiggs' determination to be a gardener, steals a sprinkling can, and even uses a hot water bottle, but always with the watchful eye of his wife, who schemes, leaving him dry and depondent. Altho "Bringing Up Father" is mostly a big laugh from beginning to end, there is a moral in it. Jiggs, realizing that he has obtained wealth at the expense of his happiness, shows Maggie a notice stating that the old bank in Dubuque—their home town, where he used to deposit his cash, has failed. Maggie, not knowing that her husband had withdrawn his savings several days before the crash, breaks down, and Jiggs suggests that he, being a poor man, was no longer useful around the home. Maggie is carried back to the days before they were rich, and realizes that the later years of her life had been one big sham after all. John E. Cain, as father, is the hit of the show. He has studied closely the McManus cartoons, and his make-up and poses are true to the idea of the cartoonist. Lida Kaga, as the ambitious wife, is a scream all the way thru. She is perhaps best in "The Irish Suffragette," a song in which she handles the large chorus of girls with such skill as to bring many encores.

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LENTEN CANTATA SPLENDIDLY GIVEN

The Seven Last Words of Christ an Appropriate Number.

CHORUS WAS LARGE

Soloists Rendered Sacred Selections With Great Appreciation.

Wonderfully realistic was the Lenten Cantata of "The Seven Last Words of Christ" given at the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes Sunday evening by a chorus of seventy-five voices and an orchestra of twenty instruments, under the leadership of the noted conductor, Rev. Father Finn, C.S.P., of Chicago.

The cantata, arranged by Theodore Dubois, opens with the soprano solo in which he expressed the desolation of the mother of the Saviour, in view of the death of her Divine Son, in His sacred passion. In her distress she addresses the multitude, "O how was there ever sorrow like my sorrow?"

This introductory number was plaintively and exquisitely sung by Miss Evelyn Donoghue, the sacred purity of whose voice admirably suited the composition. Miss O'Donoghue sang later in the "Sixth Word," with full orchestral accompaniment, her simple, pathetic interpretation of "Father, into Thy Hands I Commend My Spirit," being most appealing.

In the number, "O My God, Why Hast Thou Forsaken Me?" the baritone voice of Arthur George was heard to fine advantage, the sacred phrases being brought out with dramatic effect. Perhaps nowhere in the composition was there greater opportunity for contrast than in the "Fifth Word," which opens with the voice of the dying Saviour saying, "Filio, I am a sinner, follow me by the reclivity by the tenor; "Then the Jews who pressed Him by, each one did recite his part." This was most acceptably delivered, as were all the tenor numbers, by G. Lister, followed by the mocking chorus in a series of climaxes, so shouts of derision: "Vah! vah!"

Among the most exquisite things of the evening was the soprano solo, "Stabat Mater Dolorosa," sung by Miss Ruth White, whose voice was heard in several sections of the composition, and always with the appreciation of tone quality which marks the musician. The choruses were with few exceptions given with fine attack, and considering the short time allowed for preparation, the success achieved was simply extraordinary.

A feature of the evening was the singing of Master Leroy Kurtsborn of Chicago, a boy artist, who with a perfect lack of self-consciousness, stood in the centre of the great sanctuary, and while the eyes of the packed church were upon him, sang the "Agnus Dei" and the "Benedictus," in a voice which in its highest notes rivalled the purity and clarity of the flute.

The benediction numbers were accompanied, the harmonies and blending of the voices being one more tribute to the exceptional work of the conductor.

His Grace Archbishop McNeil, assisted by Rev. Father Kernahan and Rev. Father Egan, gave benediction. Rev. Father McGrath, C.S.P., prefaced the musical service by a brief explanation of the "Seven Last Words" of which the cantata was a development.

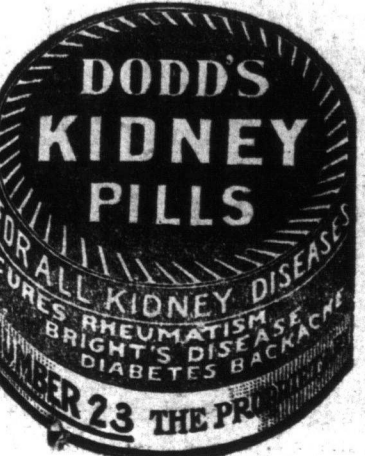

GERMANS HESITATE TO STRIKE IN NORTH
Forces in East Prussia Replenished, But Quality of Infantry Poor.
USE SHOCK TACTICS

PETERSBURG, March 29.—General Kuskobek, the captured Austrian commander of the north-eastern front, has fled and has been captured by the Russians. The activity of the Russian Gromov army prevents Von Hindenburg from developing definite action. His forces in the north, his eighth, ninth and tenth armies, have been replenished, but the quality of the new infantry is a great disappointment to the German staff. According to the disposition of his troops, he evidently intends to undertake offensive action on the north-eastern front, but days pass without serious battle. Possibly the Germans will content themselves with attempting to protect East Prussia while the grain crops are being sown.
