#### CULTIVATION OF FLAX IN MANI-TOBA.

The general information contained in this article is furnished by the provincial department of agriculture for the consideration and guidance of farmers in Manitoba who may be inclined to adopt flax as one of their regular crops.

The enormous crop of flax grown last year by the farmers of North Dakota and Minnesota, and the fact, so widely advertised that these two states widely advertised that these two states are growing more flarseed than all the rest of the United States, has led a great many farmers in Manitoba te take more interest in this grain as a general farm crop. As a result Inquiries have been numerous on the subject of flar growing, its methods, effect on the soil, and probable profits. effect on the soil, and probable profits.

#### Can Be Grown on Breaking.

An important advantage claimed for flax is that it can be grown successfully on new breaking. There is somewhat differing testimony given by different persons relative to the effect upon the land of growing a flax

crop on new breaking. Some persons report that it leaves the land in bad condition for a succeeding grain crop of any kind, and that only a season of summer-failowing will bring it into summer-failowing will bring it into the summer failowing will be supported by the summer failowing the summer failowing the fail of that the men who succeed, do so by removing the flax from the land early in the fail and plowing or land early in the fail and plowing or the fail of the fa for backsetting prairie sod, while those having poor results usually backset the land very late in the fall or wait until the following spring to plow it. Two pecks of seed per acre will usually prove about the right amount. In good growing weather a less quantity might be better, but if the weathtity might be better, but if the weather and soil conditions are somewhat unfavorable a little more than the advisable. #### The Wheat Stocks.

W. L. Parrish, secretary of the Northwestern Grain Dealers' Association, has received a comprehensive report from all stations in Manitobs and the territory known as the North-

and the territory known as the North-west spring wheat belt on the amount of wheat in farmers' hands and the estimated acreage.

These figures show that there re-mains of wheat now in farmers' mains of wheat now in farmers' bushels. Of this amount there will be needed 4,000,000 bushels for seed-ing, so that the amount left for ex-delivery of wheat from farmers only amounted to 60,000 bushels during the week ending May 10 and the ship-mer's from elevators over 1,250,000 stored is large and the disposition on the part of farmers to disposit on the part of farmers to disposit on the part of farmers to disposit on the part of farmers to dispose of their wheat small.

In answer to queries sent to all stations Mr. Parrish has been able to furnish to the association a very fair idea of the percentage of increase compared with last year, which will the amount of ground ready for wheat showed the acreage to be 55 per cent. of last year, but reports received since then puts the acreage up to 100 per

cent; oats 105 and barley 105 per cent. A very large increase is re-ported in flax acreage, which is 150 per cent. compared with last year. The ground ploughed last fall was 40 per cent. of the total acreage, and ploughed this spring 55 per cent. of total area of wheat bett. This spring ploughing is calculated up to May only.
