Douma, in Secret Session, Addresses to Country

Appeal Thoroughly Revolutionary in Character Accepted While Troops Converge on Meeting Place—Final Act of Russia's First Parliament.

St. Petersburg, July 23.—The curtain dropped this afternoon on the final act of the drama of Russia's first parliament, when, under the spur of the threat of the government's Rechenburg to use military force to end the session, and with troops already converging on the Hotel Belvidere, where the meeting was being held, the members of the lower house, 186 in number, hurriedly adopted and signed an address to the people, which is thoroughly revolutionary in its nature, elected a perpetual executive committee, headed by Paul Dolgorouff, vice-president of the house to carry on the work of liberating Russia, and adjourned the session, the members, including President Dolgorouff, Ivan Petrunkevich and Count Heyden, returned to St. Petersburg by evening train.

The Constitutional Democratic party, which intended to go into St. Petersburg in a body in the morning, but many of its members, fearing arrest on their arrival at the capital, will remain for the present in Finland, or return by roundabout routes.

The address, which bears a remarkable similarity to the manifesto of the Council of Workmen last November, which landed its authors and the editors of eight St. Petersburg newspapers in cells of the fortress, and the delay in its most vulnerable point, by declaring that the administration of the country is the responsibility of the parliament, and by proclaiming a cessation of payment of taxes and of military service and renunciation of future loans. The address follows:

Address to People.
To the people from their popular representatives.
Citizens of all Russia.—Parliament has been dissolved by ukase of July 21. You elected us as your representatives and instructed us to fight for our country and freedom. In execution of your instructions and our duty, we drew up a plan in order to ensure freedom to the people. We demanded the removal of irresponsible ministers, who were infringing the laws with impunity and oppressing freedom. First we wanted to see the distribution of land to the working peasants and involving the assignment to this end of the surplus of the clergy and compulsory expropriation of private estates. The government held that such a law was inadmissible and upon parliament once more urgently putting forward its resolution regarding compulsory expropriation, parliament was dissolved.

On Brink of Ruin.
The government promises to convene a new parliament seven without popular representation for seven whole months, at a time when the people are standing on the brink of ruin and industry and commerce are undermined, when the whole country is seething with unrest, and when the military has definitely shown its policy to be directed against the people's needs. For seven months the government will act arbitrarily and will fight against the popular movement. In order to obtain a truly representative parliament, should it succeed, however, completely suppressing the popular movement, the government will convene no parliament at all.

Realist Taxes.
Citizens stand up for your trampled rights, for popular representation. Russia must remain a day without popular representation. You possess the means of acquiring it. The government has, without the assent of the popular representatives, no right to collect taxes from the people nor to summon the people to military service. The dissolved parliament was justified in giving neither money nor soldiers. Should the government, however, contract loans in order to procure funds, such loans will be invalid without the consent of the people. The Russian people will never acknowledge them and will not be called upon to pay them. Accordingly, until a truly representative parliament is summoned, do not give a kopeck to the throne or a soldier to the military.

REPRESSION.

The result of the Russian government's action in ordering the dissolution of parliament has apparently restored all the conditions of repression, wholesale arrests and reliance on a display of military force that obtained before the people had their brief taste of representative government. In St. Petersburg itself there was little surface indication of trouble in the face of the strong force of troops, but there were many arrests last night.

The most important developments of the day took place at Viborg, Finland, whither members of parliament had fled to continue the sessions formally dissolved at St. Petersburg. The members had been frantically at work on their manifesto to the people, anticipating the possible arrival of troops, when the assemblage was informed that the governor-general of Finland had ordered a little surface indication of trouble in the face of the strong force if necessary.

The governor-general added that such meetings could not be held in Finland.

At the last moment the Constitutional Democrats joined the Radicals and the Douma adopted a hastily prepared proclamation protesting against the dissolution of parliament. The assemblage then adjourned.

JEWS FEAR NEW MASSACRE FOR KILLING OF COSSACK

Odesa, July 23.—The Jews here are in a state of panic, fearing an anti-Jewish outbreak as the result of the killing of a drunken Cossack, who recently wandered thru the Jewish quarter, brandishing his sabre and shouting "Death to the Jews."

Governor-General Kaubars, addressing a deputation of Jews to-day, said: "I vouch for my soldiers, but I am unable to say what the Cossacks or Christian civilians might do."

Four hundred political arrests have been made here within 24 hours. The streets are not patrolled, the Cossacks are confined to barracks and martial law is being rigorously enforced.

At midnight, the inhabitants are moving in masses thru the late crowded. Cossacks have declared that they will to-night slaughter all the Jews in Prokhorovka-street, where their comrades were killed.

WILL NOT PROSECUTE.
Church Treasurer Who Misused Funds to Escape Proceedings.

At a special meeting last evening the congregation of St. Giles Presbyterian Church decided to increase the stipend of the pastor, Rev. Robert Herblson, from \$1200 to \$1500, the increase to take from January last.

It was also stated that on the advice of Hamilton Cassels, K.C., to whom the matter had been referred by the congregation and the Presbyterian Session, no proceedings, criminal or civil, would be taken against the late treasurer of the church, who had illegally possessed himself of church funds to the extent of nearly \$1500. The defalcations commenced in 1896. The church session was advised to assume the amount as a bad debt.

HARVARD TO ROW CAMBRIDGE
International University Eight-Oar Race for Sept. 1.

THOMAS POWER O'CONNOR.

Member of parliament, journalist and president of the United Irish League of Britain, is to visit America in September as the guest of Sir Thos. Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and it is expected that he will visit Toronto in his trip.

With no other capital than his courage and a fine education, he entered the London journalistic field as a young man, and in spite of countless discouragements in the line of that profession, achieving at the same time success as a politician and as a leader of the Irish people.

PURELY CANADIAN

SECRETARY SABIN RESIGNS.

Appointed Superintendent of St. Mary's Canal-Commission To-Day.

Buffalo, N.Y., July 23.—(Special).—Louis C. Sabin, secretary of the American section of the international waterways commission, will tender his resignation as secretary at the meeting of the commission in Toronto to-morrow. The position pays \$4000 a year.

Mr. Sabin has had his offices in Buffalo during the past eight months. He has been appointed superintendent of the St. Mary's Canal.

It is said that the appointment of a new secretary at the Toronto meeting of the commission will depend largely upon whether E. E. Haskell of Detroit attends the meeting. Mr. Haskell was appointed by President Roosevelt to succeed the late John Y. Winler of Detroit, but up to Saturday he had not received his commission. Unless his commission arrives he will not, of course, be able to attend the meeting.

IONIAN FOR TROOPSHIP.

British Government Has Chartered One of Allan Lines.

Montreal, July 23.—The Allan line S.S. Ionian has been chartered as a troopship by the British government, and will be shortly taken off the Montreal-Liverpool service.

Adherents of World Peace Cry "Long Live Douma"

At Opening Session of Interparliamentary Union W. J. Bryan Offers Resolution to Submit Disputes to The Hague.

London, July 23.—The 14th conference of the Interparliamentary Union was opened in the royal gallery of the Palace of Westminster. Representatives of international peace from all the parliaments of Europe, as well as several of those of the western hemisphere, were present.

Scarcely had the conference opened when, amidst a scene of considerable excitement, Prof. Maxim Kovalevsky, a member of the lower house of the Russian parliament, announced that he and his colleagues, representing until yesterday the youngest parliament in the world, would be obliged to withdraw in consequence of the dissolution of the body they were officially appointed to represent.

Lord Weardale (Sir Philip Stanhope) opened the congress, his preliminary sentences of welcome being specially addressed to the Russian representatives, whereupon the delegates rose in a body and turning toward the delegation of the late parliament, cheered them to the echo.

Premier Campbell-Bannerman reminded his hearers that King Edward had always been a great lover of peace. The government, he added, was in entire sympathy with the object of the conference.

Long Live the Douma.
He especially greeted the members of the Russian parliament present, and also paid a tribute to Emperor Nicholas, who had done so much towards the enhancement of ideas of peace, and that the Russian parliament, although dissolved, was sure to again come into existence. Then the premier, in a sudden outburst of enthusiasm, shouted: "La Douma est morte. Viva la Douma!"

"The Russian parliament is dead. Long live the Douma!" was the cry of the delegates rose to their feet and a storm of cheering continued for a couple of minutes.

On his resignation a telegram was sent King Edward as follows: "The Interparliamentary Conference resolved, in the King's address with profound respect, that the King be spared to promote the welfare of his people and the cause of international peace."

Then came a dramatic moment. Prof. Kovalevsky rose, but some minutes elapsed before he could gain a hearing, so prolonged was the cheering. Finally, he said:

NEW BUILDING COLLAPSES
EIGHT DEAD; SCORE HURT

Between 35 and 40 Were at Work When Structure Tumbled Into Basement.

South Framingham, Mass., July 23.—At least six and perhaps three times that number of masons, plumbers, and Italian laborers were crushed to-day in the sudden collapse of a building under process of construction on the Main-street, while ten others were dragged from the ruins of the mass of brick and dug out of the mass of brick and mangled for life. At a late hour tonight nine men were still missing and a large force of laborers was at work on the ruins, searching for other victims.

Known dead—Patrick Prendergast, Newton Upper Falls; Frank Arico, Lower Falls; Chas. Blight, South Framingham; C. F. Hardy, Natick; Romeo Marchi, Italian, residence unknown; James Walsh, an unidentified Italian laborer.

Missing—Fred Cunningham, Neal O'Brien, Henry L. Sawyer, South Framingham; merchant; Tamburgo Silva, Peter Louise, Petri Curti, Romeo Vinoceri.

When the accident happened, there were between 25 and 40 men at work on the building. Two or three loud explosions were heard in rapid succession, and then the north side wall and about half of the front wall collapsed and crashed thru to the basement.

Two carloads of Italian laborers were brought from Boston and were put to work shoveling, thus relieving the soldiers and firemen, as well as the citizens who volunteered for service. No official statement has been made regarding the cause of the accident. One report to-night was that the incident was due to the slipping of a girder.

The building was to have been finished July 1, and for the past two months, work on it had been rushed.

PRINCE CANCELS SAILING.

Will Return So That Princess May See Thousand Indians.

Montreal, July 23.—(Special).—The Indian prince, the maharajah of Gwalior, who arrived here this evening, and who was to have sailed from New York by the Sedric, states that he has cancelled his sailing. His wife was sleeping when they came thru the Thousand Islands and the prince is so anxious that she should see them, they will return to Kingston to-morrow morning.

WOODSTOCK AND WATNER STAND IN LINE FOR POWER

Growing Industries of Latter Place Would Welcome the Assistance of Niagara's Cheap Energy.

CONVENTION TO-DAY.

"Niagara Power" is the subject of the convention of delegates at Galt to-day, representing the Union of Western Municipalities, interested in the distribution of electric energy through the province. Hon. Adam Beck will attend the meeting and speak. Cecil B. Smith, the engineer of the hydro-electric commission, will also be present. Aid. J. H. Fryer, Galt, is president of the union, and George E. Gold, Galt, secretary, and the executive committee are J. W. Lyon, Guelph; Fred Clark, Preston; D. P. Dewar, Berlin; A. Mayton, Toronto, will be represented by Mayor Cawatoor, Controller Shaw and Ald. Keele. Aid. Noble was also appointed, but is at Banff. The meeting will be held at 2 o'clock, at Galt, and it is expected to close about 5 to allow the delegates to catch the evening train.

Woodstock, July 23.—(Staff Special).—The little cities of Ontario have to consider to-morrow thru their representatives at the Galt convention whether they shall take steps to participate in the advantages of cheap power from Niagara, or whether they will acquiesce in the policy of building up corporations which is to bring up a congested manufacturing district in the neighborhood of the Falls. They will be assured that they will never have cheap power from the corporations unless they take steps to secure it by co-operation under the plan proposed by the hydro-electric power commission. This is generally recognized by the various cities visited. What was evident in Galt and Berlin, and reported from other towns on that branch of the proposed power line, west to Stratford and St. Mary's which are enthusiastic for it, is equally apparent in the towns to be served by a line touching Paris, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Tillsonburg, London and St. Thomas. Tillsonburg by reason of its smaller consumption, and St. Thomas because of its distance, have the highest rates on this schedule as estimated by the commission. Tillsonburg, for a full load of 234 horse-power, is being quoted at \$24.80, or for half-load, \$31.86, and St. Thomas for 2000 horse-power a rate of \$21.80, or \$7.21 for the half-load. These figures are for 24-hour rate. When comparing them with steam horse-power prices this should be noted, as the prices usually met for steam horse-power are practically 50 per cent higher, and attempts have been made by interested persons to use the rates for making electric power in making comparative steam with steam. Measured steam power would come at a much higher rate.

LOOK OUT FOR SURPRISES.
 Alberta's Grain Shows Wonderful Progress in Fortnight.

Calgary, Alberta, July 23.—The Western Grain Growers and Millers' Association sends out very favorable reports of the crops in Alberta, despite the fact that the report three weeks ago was inclined to be despondent. Its summary says:

Every station in Alberta reports wonderful growth in all kinds of grain during the past two weeks. There is not one exception.
 Grains that three weeks ago looked to be late by two weeks is now headed out and will be ready to harvest on time. This is surely a wonderful country.

Look out for a bumper crop in all spring grains and look out for some surprises when the threshers commence the story on the yield of winter wheat. The writer has seen some fields of winter wheat during the past week that are good for from 40 to 50 bushels per acre. Four weeks ago these same crops looked good for not over 15 to 20 bushels per acre.

LOSSES BY STORM.
 J. Howard Hunter of the Ontario Insurance Department has announced an investigation in connection with damages done by recent thunderstorms, and the losses sustained by the mutual insurance companies of the province in consequence.

Forty-Four Butters.
 Forty-four creameries have entered the new butter competition inaugurated by the provincial dairy department. The first samples are being called for from the regular market to-morrow. The 24th instalment of circulars having been sent out last night. The butter will be sent to the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and will be analyzed at intervals of four weeks for three months.

Funeral of Lady Curzon.
 London, July 23.—The body of Lady Curzon of Kedleston was buried today in the family vault in the churchyard of Kedleston village, in the presence of only the immediate relatives. Bishop Welton, who was bishop of Calcutta, while the Curzons were in India, officiated. Simultaneously a memorial service was held at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster.

Fishing Schooner Sunk.
 New York, July 23.—The sinking of the fishing schooner, John A. Allan, of South Harpswell, Maine, by the steamer Vederland, Sunday morning, off George's Bank, was reported today. The schooner's crew of seven were picked up. The accident occurred during a dense fog.

Romantic Story Comes to Light in New York Thru Advertisement for Lost Gold Piece.

New York, July 23.—The Tribune says John Cox, an English barrister, who is staying at the Waldorf, is looking for Henry Pollexfen, son of Captain Pollexfen, a retired seaman, who was murdered in London last winter. He says he has a fortune for the young man.
 It appears that Pollexfen had been for the greater part of his life the captain of a British steamer. Nobody believed he had much money. He retired early last fall. He went into the quietest section of East London and rented rooms from an old bachelor. He kept to his room for a few weeks and carefully guarded an antiquated sea chest. About the opening of winter, he changed his mode of life, gave dinners and lived high for a time. One night last November, he was murdered. His chest broken into and \$100,000 in Spanish gold and other valuables carried off. The body was found in a trench and a man named Masters is held for the murder. The law firm, on examining his papers, found that he had deposited in various banks, amounting to fully three-quarters of a million in money.
 It appears that he came across the wreck of a Spanish ship off Hayti many years ago, and found in it a fortune. Cocco, a negro servant, was the only person who knew of the money. He said he had been told that it was found in this wreck. The son and father were estranged about a year ago and the son sailed to this country. The story came to light thru an advertisement for a lost gold piece.

FINDS ON GILLIES' LIMIT.
 Prof. Miller's Party Makes Some Valuable Discoveries.

A systematic exploitation of the Gillies' Timber Limit, withdrawn from prospecting at the late session of the Legislature, is being conducted by Prof. Miller. He has just uncovered a very valuable vein of solid smallite, six inches wide. Smallite is the name of the cobalt, and this discovery in itself will far more than recoup the expense of exploitation. Several other veins of mineral have been found, but no silver so far.

HOW OCTOPUS GRIPS CANADA
 Oil Sells at 22 Cents When It's Half That in the United States.

H. S. Clements, M.P. for West Kent, was at the parliament buildings yesterday. He reports the new oil wells in his district as of very superior character. The control of the Canadian output by Standard Oil interests still maintains the price of oil at 22 cents in Canada, when the best water white sells at 11 and 12 cents in the States. Mr. Clements thinks the agreement made by the present Dominion government is responsible for the situation.

WITH THE INSURANCE MEN.
 Business in West Showing Up Better Than in the East.

The life insurance companies, domestic and foreign, are waiting with anxiety the conclusion of the royal commission's investigations.
 At the Actua Life office yesterday it was stated that the American companies were in ignorance of the basis of examination the commission would adopt in their case, but it was believed that a thorough investigation of the foreign companies' methods of conducting business in Canada would be gone into. The National Life of Canada reports an exceedingly good business for the year, and has issued a half-yearly statement, which is a pleasing feature to the policyholders.
 At the Imparance Life Assurance office it was stated that business from the west is rapidly increasing—far greater in proportion to the population than in the east.

Considerable anxiety is felt among policyholders in British companies since the passing of the bill providing for the bonus has not yet been made public, but it is believed the action was taken because the officers of the companies considered it advisable to build up a greater reserve and make the company impregnable against any possible exigencies in the future. The American companies in Canada are governed by their own laws, with the additional requirement that they place their assets and securities equivalent to receipts on policies, less expense and death payments. In Great Britain, on the other hand, legislation is to grant life offices practically unlimited powers of investment; and to throw responsibility for the same upon the members and directors of the company. In the United States the plan is somewhat similar to that prevailing in Canada; that is, the charter has some provision on the subject and the company also comes under the general insurance act of each state.
 The story of the companies says their western agents in writing mention incidentally the grand prospects for a greater yield of wheat through the grain belt than they harvested.

The officials of the insurance companies all seem to regard the newly-organized life underwriters' association with much favor. Not the same favorable expression is granted, however, towards the Policyholders' Association, which, some declare, are lacking in many points that go to make an organization of the nature of lasting benefit to those principally interested. The Great West Life investigation will be thru with this week, which will wind up the straight life company investigations by the commission.

FOGHORN WASN'T WORKING.
 Captain Murray Lodges Complaint With Harbor Commissioner.

The failure of the fog-horn at the eastern gap to send forth sonorous blasts on Sunday night is complained of by Capt. Murray of the Montreal Transportation Co.'s tug, Emerson, which was delayed. It is claimed, some hours owing to the difficulty in making out the gap in the darkness in the absence of warning tootings. Capt. Murray lodged a complaint yesterday with Harbor Commissioner James H. Plummer of the Montreal and Lake Superior line, who was also delayed for the same reason, but this the local management deny. The vessel cleared for the upper lakes about 6 p.m.
 The army of volunteers had an outing to Niagara Falls yesterday, going by the Chippewa, and St. Margaret's Church members enjoyed a moonlight on the steamer last night.

A BOY HERO.
 Saves Rev. Hugh Pedley and Wife From Watery Graves.

Brookville, July 23.—At Hillcrest, a summer resort four miles above here, on Saturday afternoon Rev. Hugh Pedley and Mrs. Pedley of Montreal, who are camping near here, were passing in a canoe when the swells from a steamer swamped their craft, the water at this point being 100 feet deep. Without waiting to divest himself of any clothing, Charles Fleming, aged 12, son of S. Fleming of Ottawa, jumped into the river and succeeded in placing Mr. Pedley on top of the canoe. Mrs. Pedley was going down the second time when the lad brought her to the surface and he'd on-until assistance arrived.

Foreign Complications No Present Influence on Wall Street—Canadians Still Dull.

World Office, Monday Evening, July 23. Canadian securities evinced a little appreciation of the rise in the New York stock market to-day, but more by way of inserting supporting bids in the general quotations than in actual business at advancing prices. The transactions were in some degree speculative, held dull and easy. The market is still sufficiently inspired to keep holders of commitments. The June statement of the chartered banks was not recorded in the light of improving stock prices, the increase in call loans for the month being nearly \$3,000,000, with circulation expanded \$8,000,000 above this time a year ago. The only spots of firmness in the market were in the navigation issues. St. Lawrence was up 3 points; Niagara sold firm and Northern was bid up a point without securing offerings. The design specialties held dull and easy. The stock in Sao Paulo gave better support to this stock, but it was not sufficient to purchase were anticipated. Mackay and Twin City made no perceptible change from last week's close. The market was scarcely steady. The market as a whole was received as heavy in that the response to outside conditions was not more pronounced.

Waldorf Hotel to R. R. Bondard: Although professional circles are favorably impressed by the substantial recovery in the stock market, speculative sentiment in high financial circles is by no means optimistic. On the contrary, very conservative opinion prevails that the rebound in prices is temporary. At the same time it is considered that the market gave an unusual exhibition of inherent strength. It made experienced observers open their eyes in wonder to see prices advance buoyantly with such vigor in the agricultural phase and business completely demoralized. Indeed this particular feature, the rise here, coincident with the drop abroad, evokes the comment that the rally is largely speculative and John W. Gates and his associates have credited with making a successful turn on the shorts. The question most earnestly discussed is whether the public will follow the bull lead. It is recognized that the fundamental factors underlying the situation are for the most part very profitable for a bullish speculation. The crop position is infinitely stronger than a fortnight ago, with corn and wheat harvests above the average in quantity and quality almost certain. General business feels the stimulating effects of this agricultural phase and merchants and manufacturers never talked more hopefully. The earnings of the railroads also continue to furnish the bulk of the ammunition. But will these arguments in favor of higher prices prevail against the more judiciously exercised policy of the money question and the aggressions of the Federal administration in the field of capital? There are competent critics who say no, and who feel that the campaign against corporations and the sensational method of government intervention have undermined confidence so seriously that there is little likelihood of sustaining the advance in securities at this juncture. It is pointed out that the packing houses' inquiry was conducted as if motive behind it was to injure the meat industry as much as possible. The news that Germany has practically barred American meats and the fact that one of the largest retail grocery houses in this city is making only a few cents profit on the sale of meats in cans may have no direct bearing on the stock market, but they certainly have a most important bearing on the financial and industrial situation. The effect of Germany's action on settlement is distinctly noticeable. It tends to the query, when will be the next disappointing news from Washington? Some think it will be Comptroller Garfield's report on the Steel Industry.

On Wall Street. Marshall, Spader & Co. wired J.G. Beatty (King Edward Hotel), at the close of the market today: "After an early break, which followed the news from Russia, the market resumed its upward trend with full evidence of broader interest on the part of the trading public. The leadership in the advance was in Steel preferred, Harriman issues, and St. Paul, the standard railway group and trunk lines were well taken care of in a speculative way. A sharp advance in sugar and general strength in the equipment list was noted among the market's features. The influences were all favorable except the news from Russia and the effect of Saturday's bank statement was felt. Low call money rates, exceptionally good crop news was published to-day. The crisis in Russia may prove to be less important than indicated by the great fluctuation in Russian bonds, inasmuch as to-day's reports do not include statements of extending violence. Pending a new stock market effort of government will be to pacify rather than excite the people. Mentioning the war with Russia for securities is hardly followed the Russian news further, as we expect larger interests abroad to be widely by the great fundamental conditions, which otherwise prevail. Our own market may have reactions, but the volumes are in the Russian situation, although developments in the Russian situation, although profit-taking with sales of some 45,000 shares by London provided a supply of the war with Russia for securities. A portion of the short interest, resulted in some recession in the late trading. St. Petersburg, July 23.—There was a very excited session of the bourse to-day and a general feeling of uneasiness, while prices continued to fall until the very end, everything closing at the lowest point of the day.
