THE RACE ISSUE.

It is charged against the Conservative candidates and the Conservative newspapers of Ontario that they deliberately raised the so-called race cry, with all its attendant dangers, in order to excite Ontario against Quebec, and thereby influence the Ontario vote in favor of the Opposition. In answering this charge it is necessary, first of all, to define in detail what it was that these candidates and newspapers actually did. We will try and state the case as honestly as we can. We speak at least for ourselves, and we think that what we say in regard to the World applies to the Ontario Conservative press generally, at least that portion of it which commented on the issues coming within the scope of the alleged race cry. The criticism complained of, previous to the holding of the election, was directed principally against two distinct actions of the Government. The first was the hesitation of the Government in sending the contingent to South Africa. The second was the appointment by the Government of Mr. Tarte to represent Canada at the Paris Exposition. When the question of sending the contingent was first mooted, Hon. Mr. Tarte opposed the idea, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, influenced by Mr. Tarte and his following, declared himself as opposed to sending a contingent without the authority of Parliament. Mr. Tarte took a definite stand on this question. He opposed what the English-speaking people throughout all Canada favored. His action on this question is certainly open to criticism. Let us look at the matter as it affected the English in Canada. They realized that the Empire was in danger. They felt impelled by feelings of affection for and sympathy with the Mother Country to render speedy assistance in what at that time looked like a serious crisis in her history. If we were to be of assistance to the Mother Country it was necessary to act quickly. It was not proposed to force any Canadian, whether French or English, to join the contingent. It was to be a purely voluntary effort. The English are the dominant race in this country. It is a large majority of the people who are British. Did Mr. Tarte show a friendly feeling towards his British fellow-subjects when he, anticipating their patriotic sentiments, forestalled them by declaring that what they desired to do would not be tolerated? The ultimate change of policy by the Government is proof that Mr. Tarte took the wrong side on this question. The English-speaking people of Canada were right in preferring the services of a representative to the Mother Country. Mr. Tarte was wrong in opposing them. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte are anxious to keep the race question in the background they ought to avoid committing blunders of this kind. If any hard feelings arose in regard to the sending of the contingent, they had their origin in Mr. Tarte's blunder in opposing the British. ELECTRIC LIGHTS THE BEST "Economy"

The Civic Delegation Got Their Eyes Opened While in the States— Toronto Beats Them All

FOR LIGHTING OF THE STREETS.

Contract Goes to Manager Weight for 1100 Lamps, and the Hydro-Carbon Lights Get a Show.

The Board of Control disposed of the street lighting contract Saturday a maner that leaves no room for the possibility of the Council to-day referring the contract back for further consideration.

Electric Light the Thing. The Toronto Electric Light Co. will give 1100 or more lamps at \$74.825 per lamp per annum, with globe of clear glass, ground glass, alabaster plated or partly alabaster plated, as the city may choose, and if a reflector is found to be an advantage a reflector will also be used. The labor clause is included. This price is the same as under the present contract. This disposal of the high candle-power lights to the number virtually now in use in the city.

The Hydro-Carbon Lights. The second part of the contract goes to General Thayer's Hydro-Carbon Co., bearing the Cluett's Gas Company's gas, the lamps to be placed where the secretary of the Fire and Light Committee directs.

These hydro-carbon lamps are the same as those submitted to the city experts, and are to be approved by the secretary of the Fire and Light Committee, being not less than 80 candle-power, an amount of 25 candle-power gas lamps heretofore supplied by the Consumers' Gas Co. The hydro-carbon lamps are to have the approved reflector, and the contract price is \$31 per lamp for the first 1000 lamps and \$22 after that number. It is the understanding of the Board of Control that a clause will be put in the contract providing for the manufacture of all goods used in Toronto as far as practicable.

The Board of Control comes out of the business with credit, and the decision has certainly been contemplated by the investigation made into the hydro-carbon light by the delegation that visited the United States for the purpose.

The Delegation's Report. The report submitted yesterday by the delegation is an interesting document. One clause only which it contained invited discussion.

Speaks of the Fine Bearing of the British Army—His Suggestions as to Treating.

Editor World: Will you kindly allow me, thru the medium of your paper, to make an appeal to my countrymen and women upon a subject I have very much at heart, and which has been occupying my thoughts for some time past.

All classes in the United Kingdom have shown such a keen interest in the army serving in South Africa, and have been so unflinching in their efforts to supply every need of that army, that I feel sure they must be eagerly looking forward to its return, and to giving our brave soldiers and sailors the hearty welcome they so well deserve when they get back to their native land.

It is about the character of this welcome, and the effect it may have upon the reputation of the troops, that I have much to say, and that I venture to express an opinion. My sincere hope is that the welcome may not take the form of "treating" the men to stimulants in public houses or in the streets, and thus lead them into excesses which must tend to degrade those whom the nation delights to honor, and to lower the "soldier of the Great Britain" in the eyes of the world which has watched with admiration the grand work they have performed for their own crown and their country.

From the very nature of their service, their innate politeness, and their gratitude to the nation which has supported them, it is difficult for the men to refuse what is offered to them by their too generous friends.

I, therefore, beg earnestly that the British public will refrain from tempting the gallant comrades, but will rather aid them to uphold the splendid reputation they have won for their country.

I am very proud that I am able to record, with the most absolute truth, the conduct of this army from first to last has been exemplary. There has been no serious crime has been brought to my notice, nothing that deserves the name of crime. There has been no necessity for appeals or orders to the men to behave properly. I have treated the men to their own soldierly feeling and good sense, and I have seen that they have borne themselves like heroes on the battle field and like gentlemen on all other occasions.

Most malicious falsehoods were spread abroad by the newspapers in the Orange Free State and the Transvaal, as to the manner in which the women and children might expect to be treated. We found, on first entering the Orange Free State, that the women and children were treated as well as the men, and that the men were treated as well as the women and children.

I know how their fellow-subjects will show their appreciation of the uprightness and honorable bearing of all our gallant men and women, and I would entreat them to be as generous as our gallant men and women, and to abstain from any action that might be held against the smallest discredit upon those who have so worthily upheld the credit of their country.

I am induced to make this appeal, having read, with great regret, that when our troops were leaving England, their inebriated friends presented them with wine and showed bottles of spirits into their hands and pockets—a mode of "speaking" very distressing and disgraceful scenes. I sincerely hope there may be no such scenes to mar the brightness of the Welcome Home.
