WEST HURON MADE A RUMPU. Senator From South Dakota Wanted to Introduce a Resolution on Philippine Question

AND WAS QUICKLY CUT SHORT. A Letter From Aguinaldo Saying Dewey Recognized Philippine Republic Caused It All.

Washington, Jan. 31.—There was a stormy scene in the Senate, to-day, brought about by Mr. Pettigrew, of South Dakota, who sought to have a resolution embodying a document written by Emilio Aguinaldo to the Philippine Insurrection, and containing a declaration of alleged recognition of the Filipino Republic by Admiral Dewey.

Senator Lodge, Massachusetts, protested against printing the document in any form, and read a letter from Admiral Dewey's statement relating to the admiral was denounced as "a tissue of falsehoods."

Mr. Lodge said he preferred accepting Dewey's statement, embodying a document written by Emilio Aguinaldo to the Philippine Insurrection, and containing a declaration of alleged recognition of the Filipino Republic by Admiral Dewey.

Mr. Pettigrew declared that Admiral Dewey had recognized the Philippine Republic and also afforded an opportunity, heretofore to deny Aguinaldo's statements, had not done so.

Mr. Hawley, of Connecticut, denounced Mr. Pettigrew's action as treason.

After several senators had rebuked Mr. Pettigrew, the matter was dropped.

ITALY THREATENS TURKEY. A Young Italian Girl in a Harem Must Be Released or Diplomatic Relations Will Cease.

Constantinople, Jan. 31.—Owing to the refusal of the Minister of Justice, Abdurrahman Pasha, to hand over the 15-year-old Italian girl, Sylvia Gemel, who had been placed in the harem of a Turkish officer, the Italian Ambassador, Signor A. Pansa, has sent a ultimatum to the Porte, declaring that unless the girl is surrendered to the Italian Embassy to-day diplomatic relations between the two Governments would be ruptured.

Altho the Minister of Justice contends that the girl has embraced Islam, it is believed that the Porte will yield to the Ambassador's demand.

THE GIRL GIVEN UP. Constantinople, Jan. 31.—Late this afternoon Sylvia Gemel was conducted to the Italian Embassy and handed over to her father.

It is reported that the United States Governor of the Hudson River, near Peekskill, has a site for a magazine for the navy proposed to erect a storehouse upon the matter of enlarging the canal of the State.

LIVERPOOL WHEAT REACTS.

Chicago Followed Suit and Then Recovered Again.

Closing With Net Fractional Gain for the Day-Corn Markets Steady and Dull - General Local Grain and Produce Markets-Notes and Gossip.

Liverpool wheat futures reacted slightly today closing 1/2 cent below central bid yesterday's last quotation.

Paris wheat and flour became dull, selling 3/4 and 4/5 respectively below Tuesday's final figures.

Liverpool maize also weakened.

Chicago market opened strong this morning, declined and then advanced to above previous close.

The five colonies, Victoria, South and West Australia, New South Wales and Queensland, Australia's wheat crop is estimated at 43,000,000 bushels.
