





MOB HAD TO BE STOPPED

Anarchistic and Socialistic

St. Petersburg, Jan. 31.-In an inter riew, Grand Duke Vladimir says : "I have stood aghast at the frightful stories of the butchery of innocent eople which they have printed. I know hey say well-intentioned patriots with a priest at their head, coming peacefully to place their grievances before his majesty, were ruthlessly shot down in the streets, but we know that behind this peaceful procession was an anarchistic and socialistic plot of which the overwhelming majority of the workmen were merely innocent tools. We know from examination of the dead and those arrested that some alleged priests were actually revolutionary agitators and students in disguise. We had to save the city from w mob. Unfortunately, to do so, innocent and guilty suffered alike. But suppose 140,000 men had reached the gates of the winter palace; they would have sacked it as the mob sacked Versailles.
