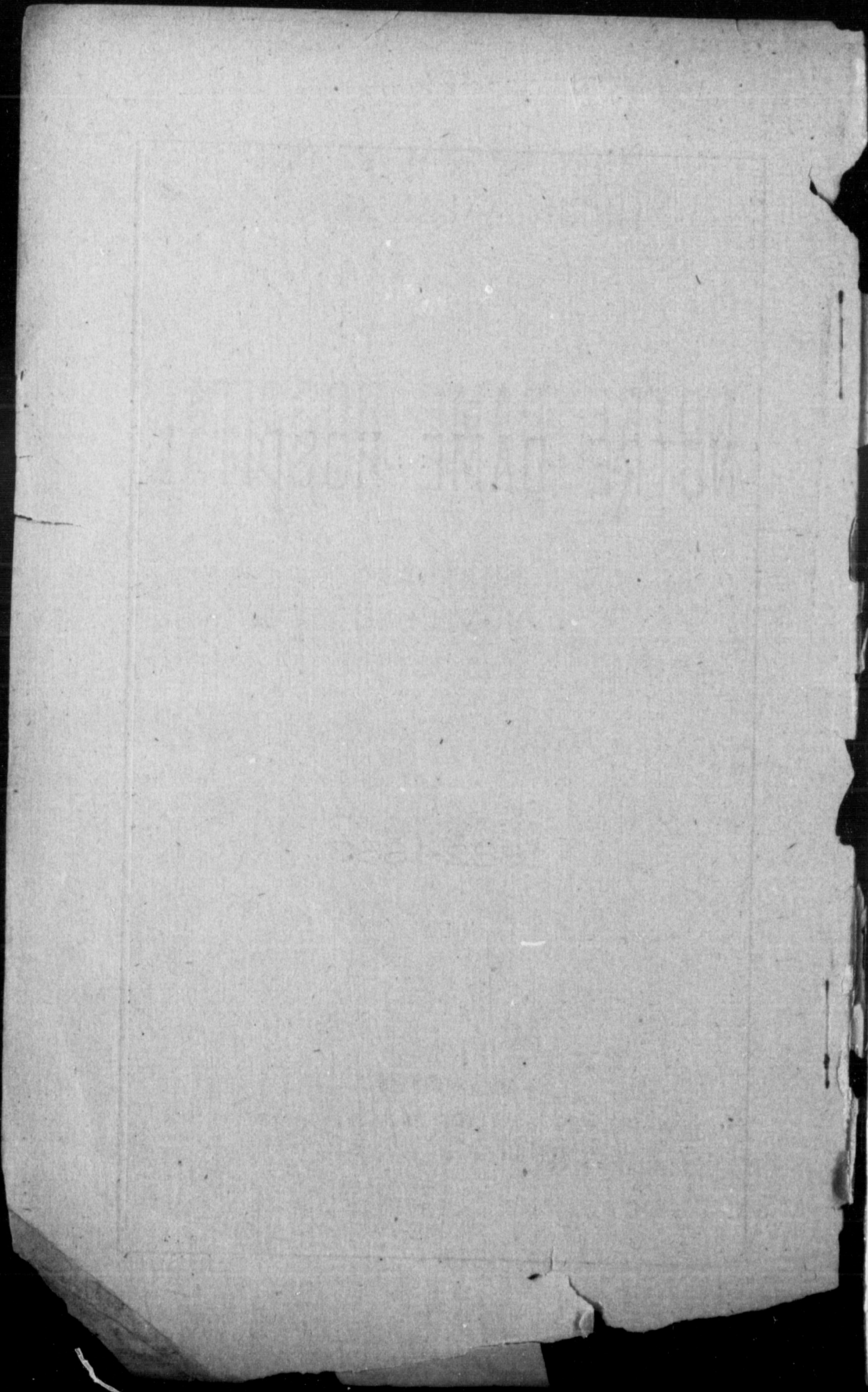

Year 1882-83.

---

Notre-Dame Hospital was established for the cure and relief of the sick, without distinction of race or creed. The nursing of the patients is entrusted to the reverend Grey Nuns, fourteen of whom reside continually in the Hospital. In addition to these, two ladies of the same community come to the Hospital every evening, to watch the sick during the night.

The Hospital has a catholic chaplain or almoner who provides the help and consolation of religion to all who stand in need of it. Patients belonging to any of the protestant churches or to any other form of worship may rest assured that they may have the assistance of the clergyman of their choice as soon, and as often as they may wish.

\* \*

The corporation of the Hospital is composed of Ordinary Members, Life Governors and Elected Governors.

The business of the corporation is under the supervision of a board called the *Board of Governors*.

The medical service is entirely under the control of a board called the *Medical Board*.

Finally, the management and direction of the corporation are entrusted to a board called the *Board of Management*.

\* \* \*

Any person having paid a yearly contribution of at least five dollars becomes an ordinary member of the corporation, and continues to be so as long as he pays such annual contribution. He has the right to attend, take part in the deliberations and vote for the election of Governors at the annual general meeting of all the members of the corporation, which takes place on the first Wednesday of July.

Any person having paid the sum of one hundred dollars becomes a *Life Governor* as long as he pays a yearly contribution of ten dollars.

The *Life Governors* are *ipso facto* members of the Board of Governors.

The *Elected Governors* are appointed at the general yearly meeting of the corporation. In no case can their number exceed twelve.

In order to be eligible as a Governor, one must have paid a sum of at least twenty-five dollars and must pay a yearly contribution of at least five dollars. The elected Governors have the same rights and privileges as the *Life Governors*.

\* \* \*

The *Board of Governors* is composed of all the *Life Governors*, and of not more than twelve *Elected Governors*.

This Board transacts the general business of the corporation and meets at least four times a year, on the last Wednesday of January, April, July and October.

The officers of the Board of Governors are a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Secretary.

The Board of Governors must report at the annual general meeting of the corporation on the state of general business, in accordance with a statement made by the Board of Management.

\* \* \*

The *Medical Board* meets once a month, its officers being a President and a Secretary. This Board has the absolute control over the whole medical department of the Hospital: It watches over the sanitary arrangements, suggests the purchasing of surgical instruments, appoints the attending physicians, the house surgeons and assistants, and the physicians in charge of the out-door department. It determines the hour for the attendance of physicians, the admission of patients and consultations at the out-door departments.

The medical Board makes regulations for the diet of patients and the behaviour of medical students and nurses; it has the right to visit and examine the pharmacy at any time and to suggest whatever it may deem advisable in the interest of the Hospital.

In the interest of science, the attending physicians and surgeons, or in their absence, the house surgeons have the right of performing a *post-mortem* examination on all patients dying in the public wards of the Hospital.

\* \* \*

As it has been previously stated, the management, control and regulation of the corporation of the Notre Dame Hospital are entrusted to the *Board of Management*.

This Board is composed of a priest of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, appointed annually by the Superior of said Seminary; of not more than six members elected annually by the Medical Board, (three at least of whom shall be members of the said medical board,) and of not more than six members of the Board of Governors, annually elected by that body.

The Board of Management reports to the Board of Governors every third month, eight days at least before the quarterly meeting of the said board.

The officers of the Board of Management are a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

The Treasurer has charge of all the money, debentures and titles of property belonging to the corporation. He receives all the subscriptions, donations, legacies and all other sums paid to the institution.

Eight days before the July quarterly meeting of the Board of Governors, the Treasurer must give to the Secretary of the said Board a faithful and minute statement of all the sums received and paid by him during the year.

The Board of Management meets once a week, every Monday, (the first Monday of each month being excepted) at 8 P. M.

\* \* \*

The Hospital is open to all the needy sick, *without any distinction of race or creed*.

The admission of patients is left entirely to the Medical Board. However no patient recognised as incurable or suffering from contagious disease or mental derangement, can be admitted. The same may be said of any woman in advanced

pregnancy, unless she has met with some accident endangering her life and necessitating immediate attendance.

Children under five years are not admitted, unless in certain cases requiring special treatment, and when the attending physicians and surgeons deem it necessary. No patient is admitted whose ailments do not absolutely require his stay in the Hospital.

The Hospital has two out-door departments. A general out-door department under the control of the Medical Board and a department for diseases of the eye and ear, under the direction of Dr. A. A. Foucher, surgeon oculist to the Hospital. The number of patients treated each year at the out-door departments is quite large.

The daily visit of the wards is made regularly at 11 A. M. by the attending physicians and surgeons. As will be seen further, the house surgeons make an additional visit morning and evening.

Besides the public wards where poor patients are admitted, there are in the Hospital private wards for each of the patients as have the means of paying. In these private wards, paying patients enjoy all the comfort desirable and may be treated by their own doctor or any physician of their choice. During the year 1882-83 the number of private wards has been increased to thirteen.

\* \* \*

The house surgeon and his assistant reside in the Hospital. They visit the wards at least twice a day, morning and evening. They examine all the patients suffering from serious or urgent diseases, and take charge of all cases brought in until the attending physicians arrive.

The house surgeon alone, or, in his absence, the assistant house surgeon has charge of the admission of patients.

If any urgent case is brought to the Hospital, the house surgeon must send for the attending physician or surgeon without delay. (Nearly all the physicians are connected by telephone with the Hospital.)

The house surgeon and his assistant must never be away from the Hospital when the attending physicians make their daily visit. If one of them is obliged to be absent at any other time, he must previously inform his colleague of the fact, so that one of them may be always present at the Hospital.

The house surgeon must enter or cause to be entered in books especially kept for that purpose, the names, age and sex of all the patients, the date of their admission and discharge, the treatment followed in each case, the state of the patient when discharged, the name of the disease he was

laboring under and other peculiarities. He must also see that the prescriptions of the attending physicians and surgeons are carefully prepared, and if necessary, must attend personally the compounding of medicines.

The house surgeon and his assistant are not allowed to take charge of patients outside the Hospital nor even in the private wards of the Hospital. All their time and care must be devoted to the poor patients of the institution.

\* \* \*

No medical student is allowed to attend the Hospital unless he has previously taken his admission ticket.

Under no pretence whatever are medical students allowed to go into the wards in the absence of or without special permission from the attending physician.

During the daily visit, the medical students must follow the professor as it were *foot by foot*, that is to say, they must not examine nor talk to any other patient but to the one who is at that moment, the subject of the clinical lecture.

Unless they are especially authorised to do so by the *chef de clinique*, students are forbidden to enter into conversation with patients.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE  
OF THE  
LADY PATRONESSES OF THE NOTRE-DAME HOSPITAL

FOR THE YEAR 1881-82

*Presented by the Secretary of the Committee at the Assembly of  
December 2nd 1882.*

LADIES,

Your Council has the honor of presenting you a statement of the works which have signalized the first year of our Society's existence, that is from 1881 to 1882.

In their generous efforts and undertakings to support Notre-Dame Hospital, its Founders conceived the idea of an Association of Lady Patronesses, to concur with the Gentlemen in assisting the sick and in visiting the Establishment.

The ladies on their part, animated by a desire to perform their share of labor, wherever good can be done especially that of working for an institution which renders so much service to our City, responded with alacrity to the call. At a first assembly, held on the 15th of November 1881, the following ladies were present:

Mesdames Judge Laframboise, Amable Provost, François Casgrain, Lady Lafontaine, Jacques Grenier, Judge Jetté, G. Lamothe, Duncan McDonald, Chs. Laberge, R. Thibodeau, Ed. Fabre, E. Levesque and A. Laramée.

In order to impart a certain vitality to the first reunion, until such time as the Society should be regularly constituted, an election of officers *pro tempore* took place with the following result:

President, Madam Jean Leclair; vice-president, Madam Amable Prévost; treasurer, Madam R. Thibodeau; secretary, Madam A. Laramée.

After deliberating on divers questions, particularly that of the necessity of forming a Society like the present, attention was called to other urgent needs of the patients namely: linen for the Wards, food for the sick and so forth. It was then decided to confer on the new Society the title of "Association of Lady Patronesses of Notre-Dame Hospital", and that the yearly contribution should amount to two dollars.

At a subsequent meeting, held on the 26th of December, the President suggested to the Lady Patronesses the happy idea of furnishing a repast, on New Year's day to the patients of the Hospital. The suggestion was unanimously adopted and sure of its being generally appreciated the Ladies resolved to address themselves to the charitably inclined even outside of their Association. To the present day they felicitate them-

selves on having done so, as their requests were responded to with genial warmth and generosity without distinction of origin or nationality, all seemed willing to add their quota to procure delicacies for the sick or a gratification to poor beings whose lifetime is almost made up of sufferings and want.

The success which crowned our first efforts encourages us to renew them, when the occasion requires it, for the product of the alms received, consisting of fowl, pork, beef, mutton, cakes, fruit, &c., helped to feed the sick and other inmates of the Hospital during nearly six weeks.

The repast was given on the 7th of January 1882. The Reverend Mr. Rousselot, parish priest of Notre-Dame, presided, and the Lady Patronesses with other benefactors waited on table. The sick were highly gratified and repeatedly expressed their thanks. It is so easy to confer a little happiness—a kind act, a pleasant word sink deep into the heart, and the poor patients of that day will not soon forget the heartfelt benevolence bestowed upon them by the Ladies.

It is therefore the pleasant duty of your Council to express in the name of the poor patients and also in that of the Ladies Hospitalers of the House, their sincere thanks to the generous public who so kindly responded to the call made on them.

In a reunion of the Committee on the 26th of January 1882, Madam Leclaire in the chair, Madam Thibodeau, treasurer, informed the Association that in conformity to its expressed desire she had purchased six pieces of sheeting, three of calico, one of shirting, a dozen mat-trasses, &c.

On the 15th of February 1882, during the meeting of the Society there was special question of having a concert whose proceeds were to benefit the Hospital and for the furtherance of which good work the Lady Patronesses pledged themselves to purchase and distribute amongst friends and acquaintances as many tickets as possible.

At a private meeting of the Committee, held in April, for secondary affairs, the Ladies visited the different Wards of the Hospital and were pleased to see how the gifts of cotton, &c., were utilized.

The members of the Society having considerably increased, amounting in number to a hundred ladies, a general Assembly was convened for the 19th of June in order to elect a new President, Madam Leclaire having accepted the presidency simply for the term of six months.

After benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, by the Revd. Mr. Rousselot, and the reading and adoption of the Regulations which specify that the yearly elections should take place in June, it was decided to hold a general election, at once, and the result was as follows:

President, Madam J. P. Rottot; vice-president, Madam A. Prévost; treasurer, Madam R. Thibodeau; secretary, Madam A. Laramée.

Councillors, Mesdames Jean Leclaire, Frs. Leclaire, Duncan MacDonald, L. A. Jetté, C. Laberge, widow Malhiot, R. J. Devins, H. R. Gray, N. Dumas, C. S. Rodier, Chs. Selby, L. Forget, C. A. Dugas, Eliz. Berthelot, Jos. Leduc, George Leclaire.

After a vote of thanks tendered to Madam Leclaire for past services, it was unanimously resolved that henceforth the Lady Patronesses should, in turn, pay a weekly visit to the sick in the Wards, provided the state of the patients permitted.

The Sister Superior informed the Ladies that the yearly expense for bread amounted to \$600 and that it would be prudent to devise means for diminishing this expense; therefore during the Assembly on the 6th of last September it was resolved, in conformity with the Sister Superior's suggestion, to seek out 240 families willing to furnish the Hospital with one loaf per month. Finally at a later reunion of the Committee, which

assembled on the 22nd of last November, the lady President wishing to know if the bread list was filled, the Sister Superior announced that only 50 loaves were wanting to complete the number needed, and that she hoped to obtain them from Ste. Anne's parish as that locality sent many patients to the Hospital.

Amongst the innumerable benefits, received by the sick of Notre-Dame Hospital, due to the kindness of the Lady Patronesses, there is one which must not be passed over in silence. Several ladies animated by the most delicate sentiments of humanity, not content with their donations of money or other services, take pleasure in furnishing the sick with pious books, illustrated magazines, flowers, fruit and other delicacies thus enlivening many a dull moment, easing many a pain.

This, ladies, is a short summary of the works accomplished during the past twelve months. Truly our first year of existence has furnished satisfactory results and realized the hopes of the Founders; for all that, we must not halt mid-way, but rather work with renewed zeal to increase the good yet to be done. It is however certain that the unanimous good will manifested on all sides and by all parties, augurs well for the future of our Association.

In the general out-door department there were consultations, prescriptions, medicines, &c., given to 2,660 patients, both catholics and protestants. Out of these were 1,173 males and 1,487 females

In the out-door eye and ear department, 599 patients were treated, including 284 males and 315 females, and 4,792 prescriptions were given.

Thus the total number of patients treated at the hospital in both out-door and in-door departments, was 4,121.

The diminution in the number of patients, as compared with that of last year, is owing to the fact that this (1882-83) year is composed of eleven months instead of twelve.
