The times in the above table are to be added to or subtracted from the time of high water at Halifax, according to the directions there given. Example—To find the time of high water at Cape Sable, May 10, 1826. The time of high water at Halifax, May 10, by the calendar is 9 hours 32 minutes; to this add 30 minutes (time set against Cape Sable in the table) and you have the time of high water at Cape Sable, is 10 hours 2 minutes.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1826.

There will be five Eclipses in the year 1826, three of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the following order.

1st, The first will be of the Moon, May 21st, at 11 hours 2 minutes 30 seconds, in the morning, consequently invisible.

2nd, The second will be of the Sun, June 5th, in the afternoon at 1 hour 0 minutes 20 seconds, invisible here, owing to the Moon's south latitude

3d, The third will be of the Sun, October 30th, at 9 hours 7 minutes 30 seconds, in the evening, invisible.

4th, The fourth will be of the Moon, on the morning of the 14th of Nov., at 11 hours 55 minutes, invisible.

5th, The fifth and last will be of the Sun, November 29th, at 7 hours 23 minutes in the morning, invisible—the centre of the Moon, at the time of sunrise, will pass 43 minutes north of the Sun's centre, leaving an interval of 10 minutes of a degree between their nearest limbs.

♀ The planet Venus which for the last year, made so refulgant an appearance in the heavens, both as morning and evening star, often appearing in full day, will at the commencement of the year 1826, be in that part of her orbit, which is furthest from the sun, and consequently diminished in her lustre, she will appear as morning star until the 10th of March, which will be the time of her superior conjunction with the Sun; she will begin to emerge from the Sun's rays about the 10th of April, and shine as evening Star gradually increasing in splendour; the time of her greatest elongation, will be the 13th of October; she will then begin to approach the Sun, retaining her brightness, until the 10th of December, when she will have nearly immersed in the Sun's rays, and on the 23d of December, the time of her inferior conjunction, will pass to the west of the Sun, about 3 degrees north of his centre, and then resume her appearance as morning Star.

♂ The planet Mars will be in that part of the heavens which is opposite to the Sun on the 4th of May, and pass the meridian at midnight, his elevation will be about 29 degrees south, and will shine with his brightest lustre, during the months of April and May.

♃ The planet Jupiter will be opposite to the Sun, the 23d of February, ½ the 24th of December, and these will be the periods, when those planets may be viewed to the greatest advantage, making a more luminous appearance than at any other time, in the heavens.

Otto of Roses.—The following is the receipt for making the celebrated Otto, or Otto of Roses, from a work recently published, entitled the Memoirs of the Rose. Take a very large glazed earthen or stone jar, or a large clean wooden cask; fill it with the leaves of the flowers of roses, very well pickled, and free from all seeds and sticks; pour on them as much spring water as will cover them, and set the vessel in the sun, in the morning at sun-rise, and let it stand till the evening; then take it into the house for the night. Expose it in this manner for six or seven successive days, and at the end of the third or fourth number of particles, of a fine yellow oily matter, will float on the surface, which in two or three days more will gather into a scum, which is the otto of roses. This is to be taken up by some cotton, tied to the end of a stick, and squeezed with the finger and thumb into a small phial, which must be immediately and closely stopped, and this is repeated for some successive evenings, or while any of this fine essential oil rises to the surface of the water. It is said that 1 cwt. of roses, will yield but half an ounce of this precious aroma.

To make Yeast that will keep six months.—Bell one quarter lb. hops in two gallons soft water; when boiled half an hour add one table spoonful of salt, half pint molasses, two quarts rye meal, half pint good common yeast and let it stand till it ferments; then stir in Indian meal till it is as hard as it can be made; then roll it to the thickness of about half an inch, and cut it in pieces of two or three inches diameter; lay it on a board and dry it in the sun, or in a warm room. When it is wanted for use, soak it in warm water, or pound it fine. I have used yeast made as above for five years, and prefer it to any other kind.

him! the discontented man, by his anxiety about what may happen!—Let us learn from hence to know the nature of the human heart, and to feel the necessity of watching over our imaginations. FEBRUARY.—“I mean to sue Will Weaver,” says Lewis Litigus. Uncle Sam replies, “Thrice is he armed that hath his quarrel just, and he but naked, though locked up in steel, whose conscience with injustice is corrupted, as Julius Cæsar says in his Commentaries; so never go to war, or to law, in an unjust quarrel; nor, if possible to avoid it, even in a just one, and with a conscience bright in all the whiteness of innocency.” Give your young cattle and colts a few potatoes occasionally, which will greatly better their appearance and growth. Whatever multiplies feed for your stock enlarges the quantity of your hay, and enables you to increase the quantity of your stock. Whatever enables you to increase the quantity of your stock, increases the value of your property directly, and the subsequent value of your farm indirectly by increasing the quantity of your manure, and thereby the quantity and value of your crops; and thus your potatoe fallows, which do not exhaust your soil, may be made the source of great improvement and wealth. Feed your sheep upon potatoes daily; no article of stock will repay you with more profit; the wool will be more in quantity and finer in quality; they will be free from ticks, unless kept in too warm a covering and too many in a fold; they will never shed their wool, and will seldom loose their

lamb's if thus fed. Much chaff or straw that is often thrown away, might, with a little pains, be made, in the autumn, good fodder for cattle, by being mixed with green cornstalks, or with hay not fully dried, and sprinkling a little salt through the whole. In this way the moisture and much of the sweetness of the stalks, or the hay, is absorbed by the straw and chaff, and with the addition of salt, the whole mass is converted into good fodder.

which is thus avoided. Are not these objects worthy of attention? Split rails. Point and mortise posts, and draw them to the handiest places for use. Trim your orchards, and sled off the brush in season. Look to your fences. If down, put them up, so as to secure your orchards, grainland, and mowing ground, from the inroads of your cattle. Bad fences you know will render all your labors profitless. Cut your scions, and secure them in some dry part of your cellar, with the ends in the ground, till you want them in April. Bleed your working cattle, to prevent their heaving; and let them have good hay, and at times a few potatoes. If you detest slavery, preserve your sugar-moles, keep them in good order, and attend seasonably, with the fittest apparatus, to the making of your year's sugar. Your cattle and cows require the entry comb, as well as your horses, and will equally benefit by its use.

which Blackstone may have said, for aught we know. Now, repair your fences thoroughly. Let your flax ground be ploughed repeatedly. Plough for spring grain. Soak your seed grain in a strong pickle of sea salt, or saltpetre, rinse it clean, and then roll it in plaister, or live ashes, before sowing. Sow plaister on your hemp, flax, barley, and oats.

about three or four inches thick, with the manure. This may be done almost as expeditiously as in the common way, covering it with mould by the hoe. When the plants are about six inches high, plough between, taking the mould from the plants, and throwing it up in a ridge in the middle of the alley and with a hand hoe cut up the weeds and superfluous plants; for if you leave the plants at two feet distance in the rows they will be thick enough — The next ploughing take the mould from the middle, throwing it up to the plants. Every time of ploughing use the hand hoe to stir the ground between the plants, and to destroy the weeds. The third ploughing, do as at the first, throwing up the mould in the middle of the alley. This is of great use, as it admits the influence of the air and dews to penetrate the roots. The fourth ploughing manage as at the second, by throwing up the mould to the stalks of the corn. If this last ploughing could be so contrived, as to be done early in the morning, before the sun has inhaled the dew, the corn would receive a double nourishment. Soils of a loam and clay mixture will require four ploughings and hoeings; sandy and light lands, not so many. If the seed be smeared all over with tar, and then have ashes or plaister sprinkled on it, till it is fit to be handled, immediately before it be planted, neither birds nor squirrels will touch it.

"But sweet Sensy, so it cannot be with us."—Plant more potatoes. Look to your fences; and see that they are good. Sow plaister or live ashes upon your pasture grounds; it will profit them every way. Weed early corn, cabbage, and other sauce. Plant cucumbers enough both for yourselves and the bugs. Sow radishes. Set out cabbages in the middle of the day; let their tops lie first an hour or so in very cold water. Hoe them in the morning.—Bleed fattening cattle. Don't forget to salt your cattle often. When the dew is on, attend to ploughing. Begin to sow winter sauce. Remember cucumbers for pickling. Ladies it is time to muster your troops and open the campaign against those inveterate foes to comfort and peace and rest, the bugs and fleas.

Protestantism.—But quench your thirst principally in pure, fair water, the juice of the apple, the decoction of spruce, on the fermentation of barley;—and don't fight government, religion, law and taxes." Timothy rode, or rather vibrated, or hiccupping out—"Don't care for ye, o-ld fell-ow; we-r ad-dies w-ill h-a-ve g-oo-d t-i-m-es y-et, w-h-en w-e're all r-o-ld-ers."—Attend to hay making, but no long stories; the less you say now, the more you speak to the purpose; like some of our great spin-fine orators; who always speak best when they speak least; but who, because they admire the sound of their own voice, think every one else must.—Try to pitch upon the best weather. Frequently the change and full of the moon produce an alteration of the weather, either for the better or the worse; but there is no certainty in this being the effect. As a general rule, the weather between the change and the full, may be expected to be the best. When, in hay time, a long spell of rainy weather seems at hand, it were as well perhaps for you to let your grass stand untouched till the signs of the weather become more favorable.—Begin mowing as early in the morning as possible. Take the thinnest grass as soon as it is ripe.—Hoe and weed lettuce. Watch the bees. Pole your beans. Hill corn.—Don't let the cattle sigh for salt, or water. Set out celery. Gather herbs for drying before dog days. Set French turnips.—Keep the cucumbers nearest the root for seed. Pull flax, if it begins to lodge. Burn new lands for sowing. Don't let weeds go to seed. Don't drink cold water when you are heated.

as Chancer says, 'quoth aunt Dinah; let your faith be evidenced by your works; and remember that charity covereth a multitude of sins. Hope humbly.'—Ridge in with one bout ridges such stubble lands as you intend to winter fallow for spring crops. Pull flax. Attend to late haying and oats, after securing grain. Attend to early planted potatoes. White and yellow ripen the first. When dug, gather and house them, as soon as dry, to preserve them from injury, from cattle and from the weather. Your early potatoes generally command a good market and a fair price; but one of your best markets is your nogsty. Mow natural meadows, and keep the hay in constant motion. When you stow it away, throw salt among the hay. Pull and rot your hemp if you raise it. Secure your flax. Inoculate fruit trees; those of the stone kind in damp weather. Mow bushes and kill them, if you can, in the old of the moon, and sign in the heart; Saturday the 19th will be the right time. Break up weak lands intended for sowing next year. Sow plaster upon fallow grounds, before ploughing them. Let your cattle graze upon the fields that you have done mowing for this year. Gather cucumbers for pickling. Drain marshes. Gather potatoe vines, coarse hay, and stout stubble, and fill your hoggens; then cast in earth that is rich, such as turf, &c. to cover those vegetables; the great heat and warm earth of dog days will soon convert the whole mass into a rich manure; spare no time or expense, for it will prove a mine of value. Transplant late cabbages, bruceoh, ruta бага, celery, &c. Gather seeds as they ripen, and dry them well. See to seed peas. Plant a new crop for autumn. Pull late onions. Hoe in the morning while the dew is on; it is both watering and manuring the plants.

Munchansen, tittleatttle Schehezarade, metempsychosical Fum Hoam, or veraceous Waverly, that the magical power of thus giving life, strength, and beauty to the annals of past ages, legitimately belongs."—Don't let errors and wrong names in charging show their unblushing fronts in your day books and ledgers; for these are no beauties, but symptoms of fever and consumption in the body mercantile.—This is the happy season in which divine goodness lavishes all sorts of fruit, upon us in great abundance. The charms of summer give place to more solid enjoyments. The boughs of the apple tree bend under the weight of that golden fruit, the beauty of which is still heightened by its purple streaks. The melting pear, the plum, sweet as honey, display their charms, and seem to invite the hand of their master. Should we not be unpardonable, if the sight of these blessings which we owe, as we do all others, to the munificence of God, did not create in us grateful reflections, and by such means scantify the pleasures of autumn?—Finish cutting, curing and securing corn stalks. Muster all hands, and attend vigorously to your potatoe fallows; let digging, haying, and Marketing be the order of the day. One man, with a book fork, can throw out of the hill as many as five or six hands can pick up and cart in; the children can be all useful here, at least, if no bigger than Tommy Thumb, or the men of Lilliput; let them be busy here, and in gathering apples. Get the cider mills in order, and begin making early cider, before the apples which fall off, are rotted and wasted.

None can want innocent and pure pleasures, but those who are so dull and insensible, that they do not reflect on any thing, or give any attention to the works, or thanks for the mercies of God. Let thankfulness for the bounties of heaven fill your hearts. Farewell!

CURE FOR THE HOOPING-COUGH.—One tea spoonful of Castor Oil mix’d with a tea spoonful of Molasses. One or two tea spoonfuls of this mixture to be given whenever the patient coughs, or as often as the case requires. This simple medicine has never failed in producing immediate relief, when every other remedy has proved unavailing.

CURE FOR DEAFNESS.—Fill a clean stone bottle, about the size of a blacking bottle, with hot water; lay the ear on the bottle as hot as it can be borne, so that the steam may ascend into it, every night when going to bed, for five or ten minutes.

ANOTHER CURE.—Put a table spoonful of bay salt into nearly half a pint of cold spring water; and after it has steeped therein for twenty four hours, (now and then shaking the phial,) cause a small tea spoonful to be poured in the ear most affected, every night when in bed, for seven or eight nights successively.

REMEDY FOR THE GOUT.—Dissolve two ounces of resin of guaiacum in three pints of the best French brandy. One or two table spoonfuls of this solution are to be taken every morning fasting, taking afterwards either a cup of tea or a glass of water

TO REMOVE CHILBLAINS.—Take an ounce of white copperas, dissolved in a quart of water, and occasionally apply it to the part affected. This will ultimately remove the most obstinate blains. N. B. This application must be used before they break, otherwise it will do injury.

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beech, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

Time of going through the Falls.

The Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

THE FATALIST.

The subject of the following tale has long ceased to exist, and there is not in the place of his nativity, a being who bears his name. The recital will therefore, wound the feelings of no one; nor will it disturb the ashes of the dead, to give the world the story of his madness, rather than his crime,

The name of John Mackay appears on the criminal records of Belfast, Ireland. He was the murderer of his own child. It is unnecessary to dwell on the character of this unhappy man; suffice it, that from early education, and deeply rooted habits, he was a fatalist. An enthusiastic turn of mind had been warped into a superstitious dread: and the fabric, that might have been great and beautiful, became a ruin that betokened only death and gloom. Yet into his breast the Creator had infused much of the milk of human kindness, and his disposition peculiarly fitted him to be at peace with all men. The poison had lain dormant in his bosom, but it rankled there. Domestic sorrows contributed to strengthen his gloomy creed; and its effects were darker, as it took a deeper root. Life soon lost its pleasure for him: his usual employments were neglected; his dress and appearance altered; his once animated countenance bore the traces of shame or guilt; and a sort of suspicious eagerness was in every look and action. He had an only child, one of the loveliest infants that ever

blessed a father's heart. It was the melancholy legacy of the woman he loved; and never did a parent doat with more affection on an earthly hope. This little infant, all purity and innocence, was destined to be the victim of his madness. One morning his friend entered his apartment, and what was his horror at beholding the child stretched on the floor and the father standing over it, his hands reeking with the blood of his babe. "God of heaven!" exclaimed his friend, "what is here?" Mackay approached and calmly welcomed him, bidding him behold what he had done. His friend beat his bosom, and sunk on a chair covering his face with his hands. "Why do you grieve?" asked the maniac; "why are you unhappy? I was the father of that breathless corpse, and I do not weep; I am even joyful when I gaze on it.—Listen, my friend, listen; I know I was predestined to murder, and who was so fit to be my victim as that little innocent to whom I gave life, and from whom I have taken it? He had no crime to answer for;—besides, how could I leave him in a cold world, which would mock him with my name?" Even before the commission of the crime, he had sent to a magistrate, whose officers shortly entered and apprehended him. He coolly surrendered himself, and betrayed no emotion; but he took from his bosom a miniature of his wife, dipped it in the blood of his babe, and, without a sigh or tear, departed. It was this circumstance that made many loathe him, and created against him a sentiment of general abhorrence; but when he afterwards, in prison, declared to his friend the storm of passions, to which that horrid calm succeeded—that he had torn his hair until the blood trickled down his forehead, while his brain seemed bursting his skull, his friend was satisfied and still loved him. In the prison he was with him; though all others deserted him, he pitied and wept. Still, even to the last, he believed he had fulfilled his duty in the death of his child; and often, when he described the scene, and told how the infant smiled on its father at the moment he was prepared to kill it, lisping his name as the weapon was at his throat, he would start with horror at his own tale, and curse the destiny which had decreed it, but always spoke of it as a necessary deed. The time appointed for his trial approached; he contemplated it without dread, and talked of the fate that awaited him—without a shudder. But his friend had exerted himself to procure such testimony of the state of his mind, previous to his committing the dreadful act, as to leave little doubt of the result; yet he feared to awaken hopes in the unhappy prisoner, which might be destroyed, and had never mentioned it to him. The morning of the trial arrived; he was

brought to the bar, his hollow eyes glared unconsciously on his judge, and he gave his plea, as if the words 'not guilty,' came from a being without life. But his recollections seemed for a moment to return, he opened his lips and gasped faintly, as if it wished to recal them.
