The Managers will be in their Room on the first Monday in each month from 7.30 to 9 p.m., to attend to applications for sittings. Those who give up their sittings should notify the Managers, as sittings cannot be transferred to other parties except by the Managers.

Packages of envelopes will be furnished to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is simply this: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's name on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays. As the current expenses of the Church are more than covered by pew rents and open collection, the whole amount contributed by envelope will be applied to the payment of interest and the reduction of the debt.

For packages of envelopes apply to Capt. Perry, or at the Managers' Room. Contributors should not leave envelopes in their pews, as it sometimes happens that the envelopes are used by strangers, or even taken away altogether, and this leads to confusion and annoyance.

The Minister will, as a rule, be found at home between 12 o'clock and 1.30 p.m., except on Mondays and Fridays. He will also make a point of being at home on Friday afternoon and evening, after 4 p.m.; and he will be glad if members of the Congregation, and especially those who are comparative strangers, will avail themselves of the opportunity of coming to the Manse.

Missions and Schemes of the Church.

Contributions for the following objects are collected monthly by the Women's Association.

- I. Home Mission.—The field is divided into two sections—the Eastern, embracing the Maritime Provinces, and the Western, extending from Quebec to British Columbia. In the Western section there are 533 supplemented Congregations and Mission Stations receiving grants from the Fund. For the carrying on of the work during the current year it is estimated that about \$40,000 will be needed, of which \$14,000 is required for Manitoba and the North-west.
- 2. Foreign Mission.—The Church in the Maritime Provinces provides means for carrying on operations in Trinidad and the New Hebrides. The Church in Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba carries on work in three distinct fields:—I. Among the Indians in the North-west, where we have four Missionaries; 2. In Formosa, where we have Rev. G. L. Mackay, D. D. and Rev. K. F. Junor; 3. In Central India, where there are three ordained Missionaries, Rev. J. M. Douglas, Rev. J. F. Campbell, and Rev. John Wilkie, and two female Missionaries—Misses McGregor and Roger. The amount required for this year is about \$25,000.
- 3. MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND, for providing annuities for widows and orphans of Ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each Minister contributes \$12 annually to this Fund, and the amount paid to any widow is in proportion to the amount con-

- 4. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—The sum of \$400 is aimed at as a retiring allowance; but the amount at the disposal of the Committee last year only enabled them to pay \$220.
- 5. Colleges.—There is now a common Fund for the support of Knox, Queen's and Montreal Theological Colleges. The amount required this year is \$19,000.
- 6. QUEEN'S COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY FUND.—This Congregation is responsible for two Scholarships, one of \$60 and the other of \$50, to be competed for by students who have the ministry in view.
- 7. French Evangelization, for Mission work among the French Canadians, Twenty-seven Missionaries were employed during last year, of whom twenty-one are ordained Ministers. Sixteen of these Missionaries regularly conduct services in both English and French. Eleven Colporteurs and three Bible women distributed during last year upwards of 6,000 copies of the Bible in whole or in part, and about 32,000 French tracts and other religious publications. Thirteen schools are taught by eighteen Teachers, with an attendance of 475 pupils. The central schools at Pointe-aux-Trembles are attended at present by between 80 and 90 pupils. The estimated expenditure for the year is \$34,000.
- 8. Assembly Fund, to defray expenses connected with the proceedings of the General Assembly, and the expenses of Committees that have no other Funds.
- 9. Mission Schools.—Some payments are still to be made on the purchase of the lot on which St. Mark's

Church stands. The Session is responsible for \$10 per month in aid of the Dorset Schools; but it has been to a large extent relieved of this burden by the Young Men's Association.

Minutes of the Fifty-First Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The Fifty-first Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the Lecture Room of the Church, on the evening of Wednesday, 18th January, 1882.

The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, B. D., was appointed Chairman, and Mr. Wm. Mitchell Secretary of the meeting.

The Chairman opened the meeting with devotional exercises. The minutes of last annual meeting of the Congregation, as printed in the annual report, were held as read and confirmed.

The Secretary to the Board of Managers read the annual report and submitted the financial statements for the year 1881.

Fifty-First Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

The accompanying Financial Statement of the Board of Managers shows the receipts and disbursements for the year 1881. Although the revenue has been smaller than that reported for the year previous, it is yet in many respects very satisfactory, especially when it is remembered that no pressure was brought to bear upon the Congregation for the purpose of augmenting the revenue. It would perhaps have been too much to expect a continu-

ance of the exceptionally large revenue of the year 1880, but the Managers did hope that the surplus revenue would have been sufficient to liquidate the whole of the remaining balance of the Floating Debt. This has not been realized. This debt has however been so far reduced, that it will be no difficult matter for the Congregation to pay off the balance (now \$6,000) before the close of 1882, and, in addition, to provide a sum to be applied in reduction of the Loan from the Standard Life Insurance Company.

The Sunday Collections amounted to \$8,519.67 of which \$6,126.75 was received through the Envelope System, and \$2,392.92 by Open Collection, the average per Sunday being \$164. Pew-rents realized \$4,695.37, and the sum of \$4000 was received from the purchaser of the old church property, being payment in full of the balance due on the mortgage.

Several items appear in the disbursements which are incidental, and not regular charges against revenue. These are chiefly, for necessary repairs on the church, permanent improvements on the manse property, and \$600 for a policy of insurance covering the church for a period of three years.

The pew-rents remaining unpaid amount to about \$700. A considerable portion of this has been outstanding for from one to two years, although every effort has been made to collect it. The Managers passed a resolution some time ago to the effect that seats not paid for three consecutive quarters should be re-let. They have however felt some reluctance in enforcing this rule with those who continue to attend the services of the church, but, as many

Frequent complaints are made by pew-holders about parties who hold no sittings in the church, but who systematically occupy seats without the permission, and often to the exclusion, of those entitled to them. As these cannot be termed visitors, it is hoped that they will take an early opportunity of securing sittings from the Managers. Occasional visitors are always made welcome, and will be provided with seats by the Ushers.

The system of weekly contributions by envelopes, it is earnestly hoped, will be more generally adopted by the Congregation. Envelopes will be furnished on application to the Managers.

The Managers have unanimously resolved to add one thousand dollars anually to the Minister's stipend, commencing January 1st, 1882. This decision they feel confident will meet with the hearty approval of the entire Congregation.

The Managers have decided to meet in their room on the first Monday of each month for the transaction of business with members of the Congregation, instead of weekly as heretofore.

The Managers whose term of office now expires are, Messrs. C. Perry, I. C. Gilmor, and A. T. Fulton, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

School Fund was the previous year. The difference is in part explained by the fact that the special collection on Thanksgiving Day was last year devoted to the Session Fund, whereas in the preceding year it had been given to the Sunday Schools. The Ses sion have resolved to discontinue the special collections for Sunday Schools at the preparatory services connected with the Lord's Supper, and to have instead a collection at evening service once a quarter, thus giving the opportunity to a larger number of those interested to contribute. From \$250 to \$300 is needed for the efficient carrying on of the three schools. The reports of the schools shew that good work is being done, and the Session heartily commend them to the liberal support of the Congregation. Mr. McGee has been appointed Superintendent of St. Andrew's School in room of Mr. Mitchell, whose resignation was very reluctantly accepted by the Session, after his faithful and self-denying labors for more than twenty years. The other schools remain, as before, under the charge of Mr. Joss and Mr. Cassels respec-Mr. Hughes continues to teach the Bib'e Class for young men, and Mrs. Macdonnell has resumed the Class for young women.

It is interesting to note that our Communion Sunday in October last (30th October, 1881), was exactly fifty years from the day (30th October, 1831) on which the Lord's Supper was first administered in the old church edifice on the corner of Church and Adelaide Streets, when there were 112 communicants present.

The Session call attention to the number of names struck off the Communion Roll year after year on account of removal from the bounds of the Congregation or long continued absence from the services of the Church. It is very desirable that those who leave the Congregation should furnish themselves with certificates of membership, which may be presented when occasion requires.

It is hoped that the introduction of the Book of Chants and the new Hymnal will be found to have a good effect on the Service of Praise.

We enter upon a new year with abundant cause for thankfulness and trust. "The Lord hath been mindful of us: He will bless us."

The number of scholars in attendance during the year was 276, viz: 149 girls and 127 boys. The average attendance was 194, viz: 104 girls and 90 boys. The teachers are 26 in number.

The amount contributed for missionary purposes was \$154.83. Adding \$15.11, which was unexpended last

year, there is a total of \$169.94, which has been appropriated as follows: Indore Mission, \$50; the "Dayspring," \$50; Welland Canal Mission, \$10; Sick Children's Hospital, \$20; and Dorset School Fund, \$39.94.

Weekly meetings of the teachers for the consideration of the lessons were held during a considerable part of the year, and were the source of much interest and profit to those who attended them. Much valuable aid in the preparation and teaching of the lessons was also afforded by the excellent notes of the "Westminster Teacher."

The library, containing over 500 volumes, continues to be efficiently administered, and to afford much pleasure and profit to the scholars.

Dorset Sunday School.

I am pleased to be able to report continued progress in this school. The attendance of the children during the last few months has considerably increased, and we find our rooms very small. The attendance has increased not only in numbers but also in regularity and punctuality; and the general behaviour of the children is becoming much more decorous and reverent than it was at first.

We continue to keep the school open during the summer months, and are always able to secure the attendance of a sufficient number of our teachers and scholars to make the school both profitable and interesting during that period. Many of the older boys absented themselves during that time, and we have had some trouble in getting them back, but we think that we are at last bringing them once more within our influence. We expect to be largely assisted in this by reason of improvements made to our library through the generosity of the children of St. Andrew's and of other friends, who have given us many handsome and suitable volumes—ones likely to attract older boys.

The staff of teachers continues unchanged, except that we have lost the services of Mr. FitzGibbon, whose business engagements, much to our regret, have called him away from the city; and that we have now associated with us Miss Carrie Wylie.

We desire to return our warm thanks to the children of St. Andrew's Sunday School, and the many other kind friends who have so generously come forward to assist us in supplying our library, in providing our annual Christmas entertainment, and in other ways; their names are so many, and their gifts so varied, that it is impossible to enumerate them.

Dorset Night School.

Owing partly to the mild weather last spring, the attendance was not what it should have been, and, in consequence, the school was closed earlier than usual. Knowing that the boys could receive more thorough instruction at the public night schools, at the beginning of this season, we decided to open the school only on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, with the usual Saturday evening concert, instead of every evening in the week, as last winter. This would give them an opportunity to attend the other schools, which are open the remaining evenings of the week. Our school opened this season on Oct. 25, and has been open every Tuesday and Thursday evening since, except January 2nd, that being the night of the annual treat, which was attended by about sixty of the boys. The attendance has been fairly satisfactory, the average being about thirty-five. The number of names on the roll is ninety. The great difference between the whole number and the average is partly owing to the fact that many names have been added lately, and one of the great difficulties of the school is securing a regular attendance. We open at 7.45 and close at 9.30. There are two subjects taught each evening, half the time being devoted to each. The subjects we teach are Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, and Dictation. We have eight classes in the school at present. The majority of the boys come from William, Bolton, and York streets; Most of them work in the some from Lombard street. different factories. Some sell papers, others will neither work nor go to day school. There are only two boys in the school who are learning a trade. About fifteen of the boys cannnot read. Ten of these are between the ages of thirteen and nineteen. Very few of them can read well, and Long Division is generally the extent of their knowledge of Arithmetic. A good many are anxious to improve themselves, but others are indifferent. But we are satisfied from the improvement in the boys who have been long with us, that good is being done. An effort is being made to establish a library and reading-room for them, to be open some of the other evenings of the week, for we feel that, although good is being done in teaching them to read and write, a great deal more could be done if we could get them to read good books.

Report of Young Men's Association,

The Association has held nine meetings during the year, the small number being accounted for by the resolution adopted in November, that meetings should be held monthly instead of fortnightly as heretofore. McPherson, who had filled the office of Secretary to the complete satisfaction of the Association. Messrs. J. M. Matthew and A. J. Taylor were appointed to fill their respective positions.

The question of Temperance alluded to in the last annual report, was finally disposed of by the Association at a meeting on the 7th February, by the unanimous adoption of the following preamble and resolutions:—

Whereas it is desirable that all the advocates of Temperance, both total abstainers and non-abstainers, should unite to effect the end which they seek in common, namely, the prevention and suppression of intemperance, and of the evils that flow from it; and that an Association

should be formed in which both classes might work together in the carrying out of this object;

The following resolutions are suggested as a basis:-

1. That much can be done towards the suppression of intemperance by entirely discountenancing the prevalent custom of "treating."

2. That the establishment of coffee houses upon the English system, as regular business concerns, would be extremely beneficial and should be promoted.

3. That strong efforts ought to be put forth to enforce and maintain the due observance of the liquor laws now on the statute books, and to obtain such further legislation as shall, upon consideration, be deemed advisable.

These resolutions, together with a letter from the President, printed in circular form, were sent to the Ministers of the various city churches, to Church Associations and different Temperance organizations, asking that representatives attend a meeting in Shaftesbury hall, on the 21st March. At this meeting was organized the "Society for the Prevention and Suppression of Intemperance," which is now in active operation, with good promise of becoming a permanent institution in promoting the cause of temperance in the city.

The "Penny Savings Bank" and "Dorset Night School" progress favourably, and it is evident that both institutions are doing a good work. The Bank shews an encouraging increase of business over last year, as will be seen from the report hereto appended.

The state of our finances is shown by the Treasurer's report presented herewith. The Association has been unable entirely to relieve the Kirk Session of the annual

grant made to the Dorset School. It has, however, assisted the Session to the extent of \$75.
