

ANNUAL REPORT.

N presenting the Annual Report of the First Methodist Church, covering the work of the past Conference year, the Pastor, Quarterly Official Board and Trustees join with the members of the Church and Congregation in returning thanks to Almighty God for his preserving care and the degree of prosperity, both temporal and spiritual, which he has vouchsafed to us as a Church. Over fifty members have been received during the year, and at its close the Church rolls show a membership of 560. This report is intended to be a complete reference or guide to all the regular meetings held and work done by the Church and its auxiliaries, and it is hoped that a copy will be preserved in every family of the Congregation. The subjoined list of contributors to the different funds of the Church will be found complete so far as said contributors permitted their names to be given in connection therewith, but does not include the plate collections or membership fees of the different societies. The total monies raised by subscriptions and collections is somewhat less than that of the preceeding year, but this may be accounted for from the fact that no special appeals to the Congregation were found necessary to be made, but it will be seen by the general financial statement that a floating debt of \$1,300 still remains which the officials are anxious should be wiped off at the earliest possible date, and it is earnestly hoped that the publication of this list (which shows how comparatively few of our 560 members and an average Congregation of 600 to 800 are giving systematically to the regular support of the Church) will have the effect of stimulating larger numbers to obtain envelopes from the Ushers or Secretary and become regular contributors; in this way the amount required to liquidate the comparatively small debt could be quickly and easily obtained. A few prominent supporters have expressed a desire that all pew rents should be abolished and the entire sittings made free to the public, and the revenue derived at present therefrom be raised by the envelope system. If this desire should continue to grow, the Congregation may sometime in the near future be asked to give an expression of their views upon the question.

All strangers are cordially welcomed to our services and the ushers will be pleased to provide them with sittings.

The Pastor earnestly requests that he may be informed as early as possible of cases of sickness among the Congregation, and that all persons desiring spiritual aid or instruction will not fail to avail themselves of his services.

Since that time three of its members have entered the regular ministry, four of the present members are local preachers and some of them have been actively employed in evangelistic work. It was found desirable to establish the Boys' Class recently and we hope in future to be able to give a good report of its success with Mr. John Baird as leader.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The St. George Missionary Society established some two years, is in a flourishing condition having a well selected staff of officers and a large number of the Schulars enrolled as members. Object to promote Missions in connection with the School. One Sunday in each quarter is devoted to the cause of Missions and the programme of the day is furnished by this Society; they also give financial aid to the cause. Last year they contributed \$15.00 to the funds of the general society as mentioned in the foregoing S. S. report. Judging from the past experience this Society is fully meeting the ends for which it was designed.

THE BOY'S BRIGADE.

The Boy's Brigade started early in 1893 with a membership of thirty, nd have since added to their number. Last summer they had an outing in ca^amp under the command of Major Stacey and quite enjoyed it. Capt. Frank Stacey, who is now instructing the Brigade, reports the boys taking a lively interest in all the proceedings. It was found desirable to procure more suitable accomodation than the lecture room afforded and they now drill each Thursday at 7.30 in the Skating Rink on Metcalfe Street. The meetings are opened with Bible reading, singing and prayer, after which they drill for one hour and dismisss with the benediction. After dismissal half an hour is devoted to recreation. The boys have started a subscription list to provide for the necessary expenses and are anxiously looking forward to the time when they can procure a supply of Boy's Brigade rifles. They hope to do so before their approaching summer camp. Any interest taken in this branch by the older people is fully appreciated by every member of the Boy's Brigade.
