
ONTARIO SCHOOLS

CARRIED PEACE NEWS TO SOLDIER

Canadian Veteran Dies in a Buffalo Boarding House.

'Afbert Miller, One Who Took from Headquarters to Mons Troops the Order to Cease Fire-Memorable Morning Recalled.

New York, Nov. 14—(Canadian Press)—Albert Miller, a Canadian war veteran, who was picked to carry from the British headquarters to Mons on the day the armistice was signed to cease firing, will either be buried in Canada with the conrades with whom he fought or will be given a place among the Buffalo soldier dead, according to a despatch to the New York Herald today.

Miller, who wore the Military Medal, fied in Buffalo on armistice day, just have years from the day on which he nade world history. His body lay unlaimed in the morgue until his identity was established. Military and fraternal reganizations have long since offered to

As the land surrounding Mons is flat and the Hun dominated a large stretch of country from his observation posts and machine gun emplacements in the buildings of the town, this duty of carrying the message of peace was not an enviable one, as in places the counter would have to pass across any stretches of open country.

The story is told of an officer in one of the Canadian units who volunteered to carry the glad tidings to some of his men in advanced position, but who made the supreme sacrifice within a few hours of the nessation of the fighting. Thinks ing that the German troops, aware that the warfare was due to cease that day, would not display any hostility towards a single horseman passing within their view, he essayed to ride to the advanced points of his battalion. He was sighted, however, and a machine gun, said to have been mounted in the spire of the Mons Cathedral, fired a burst of bullets, one of which caused him to fall mortally wounded. It was on account of happenings such as this that the Canadian artillery was engaged in actual firing until within a few minutes of 11 o'clock, one gun being employed in destroying a machine gun nest at three minutes to cleven.
