MIDNIGHT REVEL  
ENDS IN MURDER

Celebration Punctuated by a Fusillade of Pistol Shots—Revelers Turn from Dance to Pursue Slayer.

New York, June 17—Villia avenue in The Bronx was alive with the colorful celebration of Padua's patron saint when five shots sounded above the laughing revelers early today, and Michael Di Cola to the sidewalk with five bullet wounds in his chest. He died instantly, too soon to see the quick vengeance of many daggers that flashed in his defense, or to know that Pasquale Tenuerio is a prisoner in Fordham Hospital, charged with the shooting.

The celebration of St. Anthony had drawn thousands of Italians to Villia avenue, which was strung with ropes of electric lights and thousands of flags. There were few things more beautiful than those who venerate St. Anthony than his public demonstration in his honor. It was an occasion that good Italians never forget, and it was arranged by the Italian societies of The Bronx.

Those who came entertained themselves in their own fashion, and a large sup was being had in the pleasure in a game of "bluff" held on the sidewalk in front of the candy store at 3181 Villia avenue. Crowds jostled the players on all sides and overflowed into the street. It was growing late, and those who were nearly ready to go home from the open-air celebration.

The excitement they found was not what they expected. Those nearest the shooting were almost crazed with fear, and began to scatter. Others, pressed nearer, and made quick, short jerks with their arms. The blaze of electric light was dashed back in long steady glints. There was quiet, then a howl, as one figure broke away from the others and began to run towards the Grand Concourse.

It was Tenuerio, with a mob at his heels. He bore several wounds and was bleeding profusely. Those who followed knew that he could not run far. He didn't, but landed in the arms of Patrolman James McElroy at the Bronx Park station, who had heard the shots. McElroy took him to the police booth at 2034th street and the Concourse, and summoned an ambulance which took him to the hospital and admitted that he shot Di Cola.

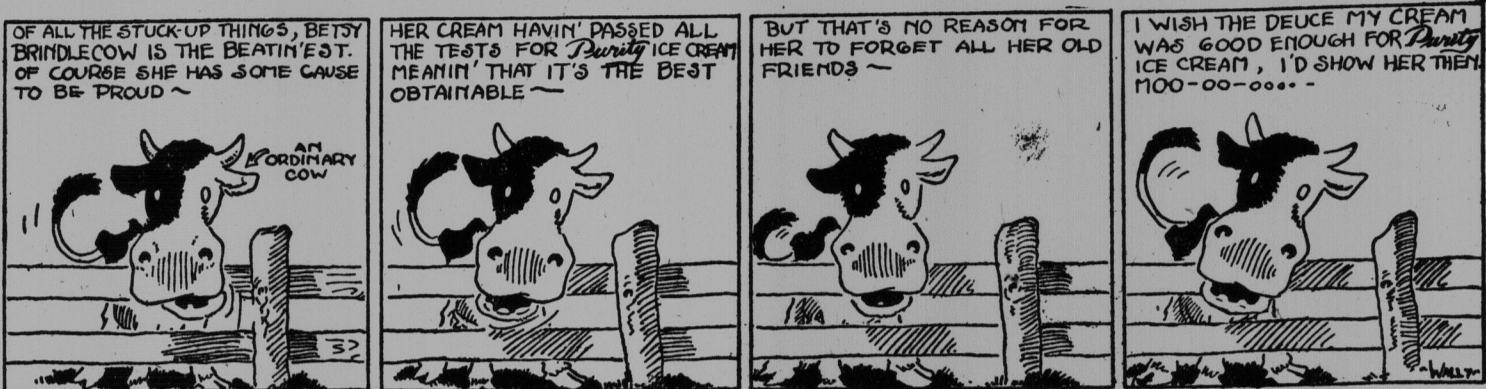
**GENTLE ROAST FOR SEC. MACLACHLAN**

Halifax Chronicle Pays Its Respects to Him and His \$15,000,000 for Russia.

(Halifax Chronicle.)  
How touching is the offer of J. B. MacLachlan, local Mine Workers' Secretary, to "the Russian people," of a loan of fifteen million dollars! It may look a bit reckless in comparison with the donation of the Genoa Conference and the Paris association of bankers, but those were mere "bourgeois" gatherings, and devoid of hearts such as glow in the bosoms of true "proletarians" and find becoming expression through such "offers" as that of Mr. MacLachlan of Capt. Preston, to Mr. Lenin, of whereabouts not at present known, and Mr. Trotsky of Russia. Everybody knows, of course, that Mr. MacLachlan loves Mr. Lenin and Mr. Trotsky, for he was overheard uttering a public prayer, not long ago, that he might some day have the supreme privilege of shaking hands with them. But how many there are who will not only shake hands with condemned criminals, but even bestow flowers and candies upon them, who yet would hesitate to hand over fifteen million dollars, or fifteen dollars, or fifteen cents to them, or any of them, without security for, or the hope of return.  
However, in justice to Mr. MacLachlan's business qualifications, as well as to his heart, it must be stated that he does not intend to lend the whole fifteen millions from his own pocket. He very properly feels that his salary as Secretary of No. 26 would hardly justify him in such personal forgetfulness. And, besides, he remembers "the little starving children of Glace Bay," who were his particular anxiety a few weeks ago. So he proposes, if Mr. Lenin and Mr. Trotsky are willing to accept his beneficence, to "start a campaign among labor unions to urge the Dominion Government" to lend them the money. Mr. MacLachlan displays such a wonderful gift for business in this proposition of his, that his offer might almost seem to savor of the detestable thing called "Capitalism." He formerly stipulates that "the loan be spent in Canada." A less prudent and worldly-wise philanthropist and political economist might never have thought of that.  
There are unquestionably some Canadians who would be small-minded enough to object to handing over to Mr. Lenin and Mr. Trotsky fifteen million dollars, which those distinguished "proletarians" might, and almost certain would, devote to the better equipment of their army. Mr. MacLachlan foresees that objection. He will take the fifteen millions which he intends to lend Mr. Lenin and Mr. Trotsky, and buy wheat with it, so that he is merely going to lend the wheat to the two "army" Russian gentlemen named, who are under the trifling, temporary disadvantage of not being able to furnish any security, and who dislike making promises almost as much as keeping them. Mr. Lenin and Mr. Trotsky will thus be enabled, without inconvenience either to themselves or Mr. MacLachlan, to keep fifteen million dollars worth of what they have left for their own peculiar, patriotic purposes. Mr. MacLachlan, with his clear vision, sees that they may need that money now that there is so little of anything remaining in Russia which they can honestly yet firmly steal and convert into cash. Mr. MacLachlan has not only clear vision, but a

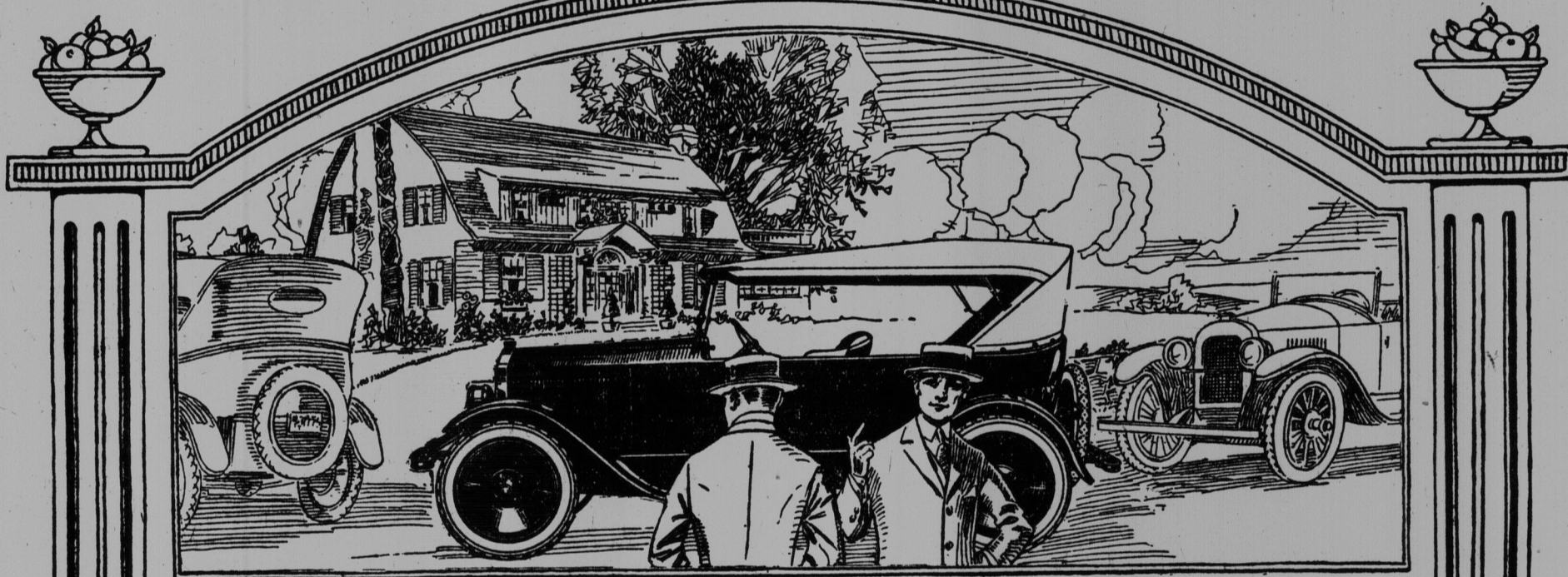

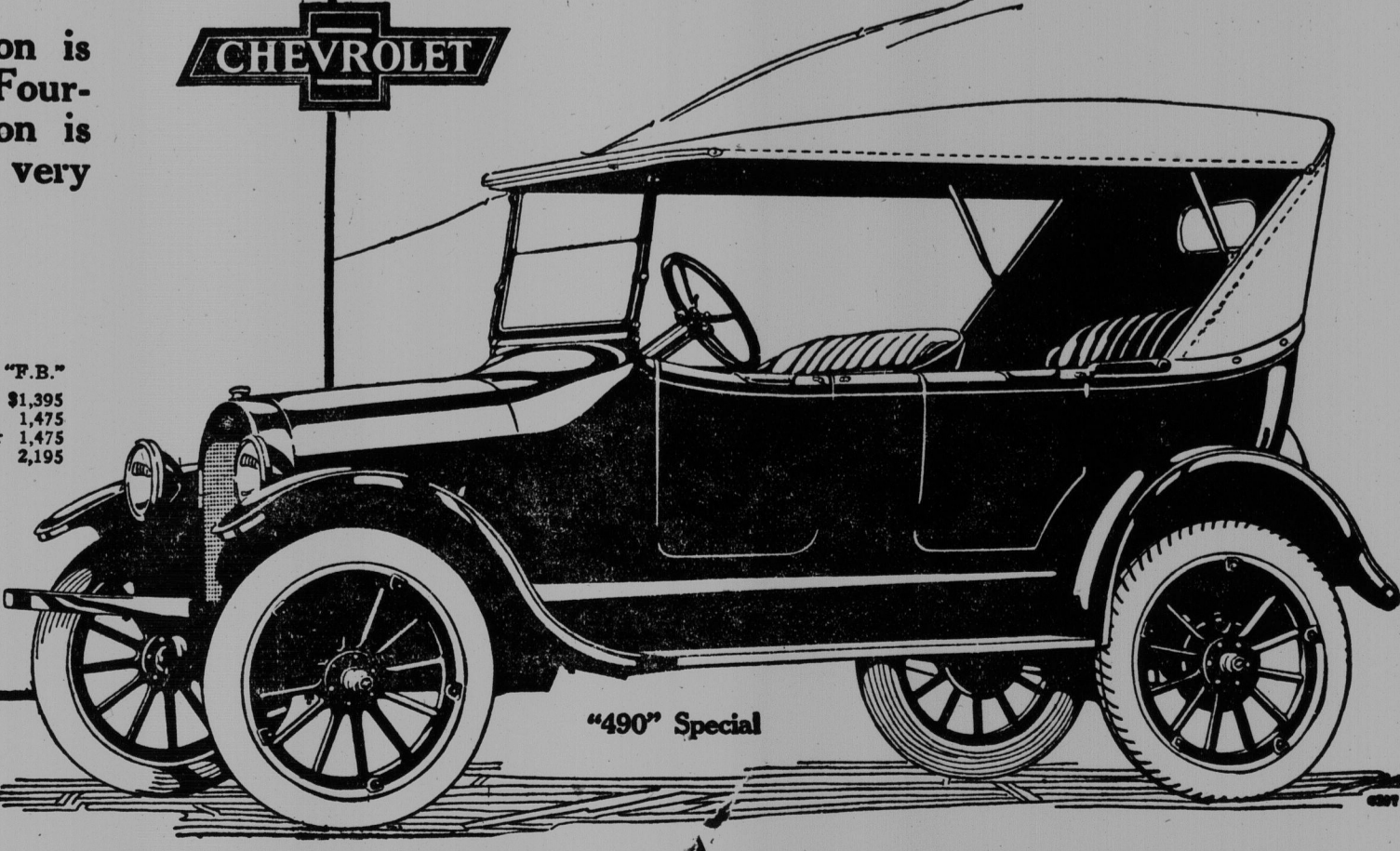

John Cogger was sponsor for the boys and Mrs. P. J. Fitzpatrick for the girls. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc returned last evening after attending the closing exercises at the University of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook. He expressed himself as particularly pleased with the excellent showing made by the St. John boys during the year just closed. His Lordship stopped at St. Joseph's on his way home from Quebec, where he attended the consecration of Mr. Marie John Julian Levesque, vicar apostolic of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, with headquarters at Seven Islands, Canada. Begin officiated and Bishop Patrick Chaisson, former vicar apostolic of the St. Lawrence district, was also in attendance. Many church dignitaries from the Province of Quebec were present.

### THE EMPRESS AND MELITA AT QUEBEC WITH 1088

#### Bring News of Slow but Sure Improvement in Conditions in the Old Country.

Quebec, June 17.—The Canadian Pacific S. S. Empress of Britain, Captain J. Turnbull, arrived in Quebec this morning at 10:20 o'clock with 381 passengers, mail and cargo. Captain Turnbull reports a magnificent trip, with fine weather all the way. There were seventy passengers in the saloon, one-half of whom were returned Canadians and Americans. Among these were Hon. Lancelot Guest, London, brother of Viscount Winboorne, former vice-regal representative to Ireland; also brother of Hon. Frederick Guest, secretary of state of British air forces. Mr. Guest is on a business tour to Canada and New York and will return to England in six weeks. Colonel J. M. Wood of Ottawa was also among the saloon passengers. He said the United Kingdom was slowly but surely returning to normal. Speaking of Right Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian high commissioner to England, Mr. Guest said the new high commissioner was doing good work and gaining in popularity every day by his democratic and human manner of conducting his office affairs. Mr. Larkin was now centralizing all provincial government affairs with their official office staffs in the same Canadian building as himself. The second cabin passengers are primarily composed of Canadians from every part of Canada as far as Victoria, B. C., and were returning to their homes. In the third class accommodation there was a party of forty women domestics destined for settlement in Ontario, brought out under the auspices of the Salvation Army and conducted by Captain Marion Jones. This party also included farm laborers. The Canadian Pacific S. S. Melita, Captain Hamilton, arrived at Quebec from Antwerp and Southampton yesterday morning, at 1:45, bringing 288 cabin and 424 third-class passengers. The latter were landed for immigration inspection, and included 400 continental foreigners, all farmers, young married couples and farm laborers intelligent in appearance and apparently people of means. The farmers, for the most part, are booked for the western provinces, with a small quota for Toronto. The remainder are British and young farm laborers booked for Toronto, who have come out under the auspices of the Ontario government.

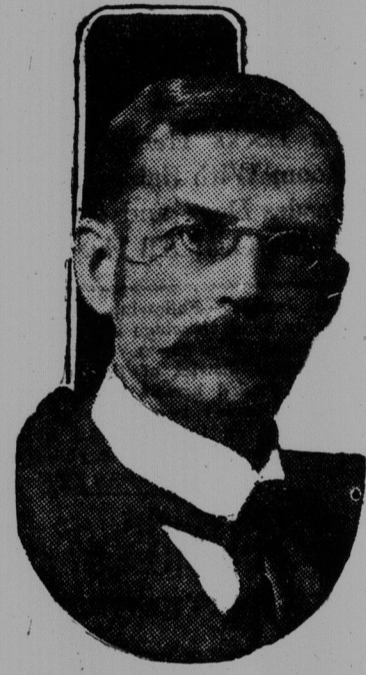

FIFTY NATIONS IN PEACE PACT

League Will and Must Live, Says Sir Herbert Ames—Already Prevented War.

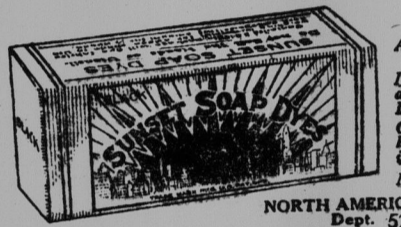


Sir Herbert Ames, director of the financial administration of the League of Nations Secretariat, who spoke at a luncheon in Toronto. He said of the league "It is merely a form of international relationship, through which a group of states hope and endeavor to lessen the possibilities of war by co-operation with each other. We want Germany to come in when she is more ready to comply with the constitution, and the same applies to Russia."

"The League of Nations has settled three disputes that would have meant war; it has kept the combatants apart in a fourth dispute; it has set up and prepared an organization that is constantly at work removing the causes of irritation and the provocation of war." In this terse paragraph, Sir Herbert Ames, financial administrator of the League of Nations, summed up before a Canadian Club audience in Toronto the outstanding accomplishments of the league to date. He had barely time to mention the host of other endeavors of

the international organization along the lines of health, international transit, reconstruction of devastated areas, and relief work, but on the big accomplishment of wars already avoided he dwelt in some detail. Stresses Three Problems. The three instances referred to by Sir Herbert were the squabble between Sweden and Finland over Aland Island, the Albanian problem and the Upper Silesian question, where the Poles and

the Germans were in dispute. He impressed upon his audience that in each instance the league was called upon to adjudicate in the matter by Great Britain, which nation stood strongly for peace. Sir Herbert gave the club members an insight into the economic practicality of the League of Nations, mentioning in one instance, that settlement of the Albanian dispute, which otherwise would have led to war, cost the league and the nations involved \$20,000. Club members applauded the contrast between the cost of settlement and the probable cost of the hostilities which were avoided.

League Must Live. In reply to the question often asked, "Would the league live?" Sir Herbert said that the league had to live, or die, some substitute for it set up its functions, he said, had been recognized internationally to an extent whereby it had imposed on it all kinds of duties lasting on into future years, such as the administration of neutral areas, custodianship of the Saar Basin and the city of Danzig. The league also was the repository for all the reports that came in concerning administration of mandated areas.

Britain Must Lead. "We shall welcome Germany when Germany is willing to come into the league and sign the covenant. We will welcome the United States at any time. We can welcome even Russia when Russia is willing to admit that the covenant as prepared is one that she can adhere to and agree with. We look forward to the day when the league will be universal."

WHAT IS NEEDED IN PRISON TRAINING. Manufacturers of Apparel Urge Change in Methods, So as to Make Them Useful. New York, June 16—Several important questions bearing on the present system of training prisoners in penal institutions were presented to the executive committee of the International Association of Garment Manufacturers at a special meeting in the offices of that organization at 305 Broadway. It is this meeting a joint committee on prisons will be appointed. The work of this committee will be to investigate thor-

oughly the existing system of prison training, with a view to bringing about reforms that will fit prisoners for work at which they can earn their living when released. "Can you imagine a safe-blower leaving prison to take a job at sewing machine making overalls?" asked A. F. Allison, secretary of the association yesterday. "If it is intended that a man in jail shall be trained in such a way that he may become a better citizen, and earn an honest living after his release, why don't the prison authorities give training which will really serve such purpose?"

"Thousands of prisoners in state penitentiaries and other penal institutions are taught to operate sewing machines, and there, in most cases, their training ends. We have been unable to learn of a single instance during the last twenty years where an ex-convict has applied to a garment manufacturer for the kind of work he learned in prison. "There is nothing constructive in this condition. A man who has been trained in any skilled manner or intellectual work before his conviction, and who is held in prison for any time, forgets practically everything he knew. He finds changes in methods and the things he still remembers do not apply. He is lost. His livelihood has been taken away from him and, no matter how earnestly he may try to live straight, he finds the cards are stacked against him. There is only one course—a return to crime, and the taxpayers, consequently, continue to pay high taxes for police, courts and prisons."

"A prisoner cannot, in civil life, pursue the manufacture of garments which he learned in jail, because it has been proved that he is not fitted to do the work. Women and girls are employed exclusively in garment factories, except when men are employed in managerial or executive positions. Even the losses of women, because it has been found that women can do the work efficiently and satisfactorily where men fall completely. Sewing is women's work in the garment trade has found the truth of that statement. So have the ex-convicts who have been taught to sew in prison. Even if they could do the work it is doubtful if any man would be willing to work as a seamstress when he can keep from starving any other way. "The International Association of Garment Manufacturers and the organizations which are co-operating in this campaign are convinced that radical changes are required in prison "sewing shop" systems, and our campaign will be carried out to its ultimate conclusion in every state of the Union."

In addition to the International Association of Garment Manufacturers, six important trade organizations have already agreed to take up the work of obtaining proper training for prisoners.

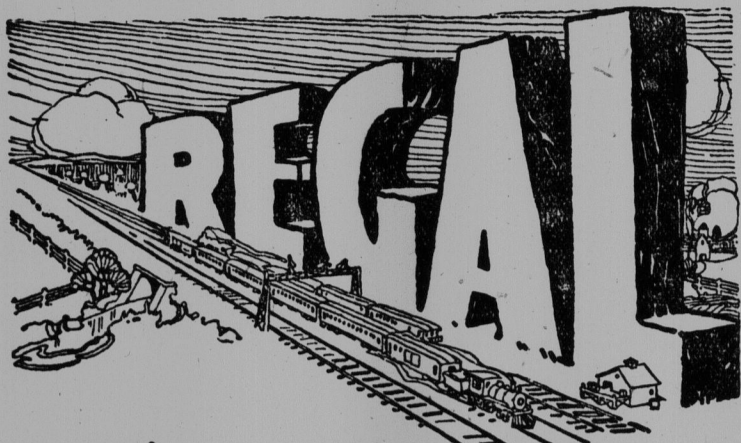

M. LaFollette attacking and condemning what he termed the "judicial oligarchy."

"We have created, or at least have suffered to grow up within our land, a Frankenstein which must be destroyed or else it will destroy us," shouted the speaker, as he offered for the approval of labor a proposed constitutional amendment to curb the powers of the Supreme Court and federal courts and "restore their government to the people."

The convention, upon conclusion of LaFollette's address, decided to organize a special committee to consider all the decisions of the Supreme Court and federal courts affecting labor and draw up a protest and outline a campaign to remedy the situation.

"The best minds of labor," it was said, "will be drafted for membership on this committee."

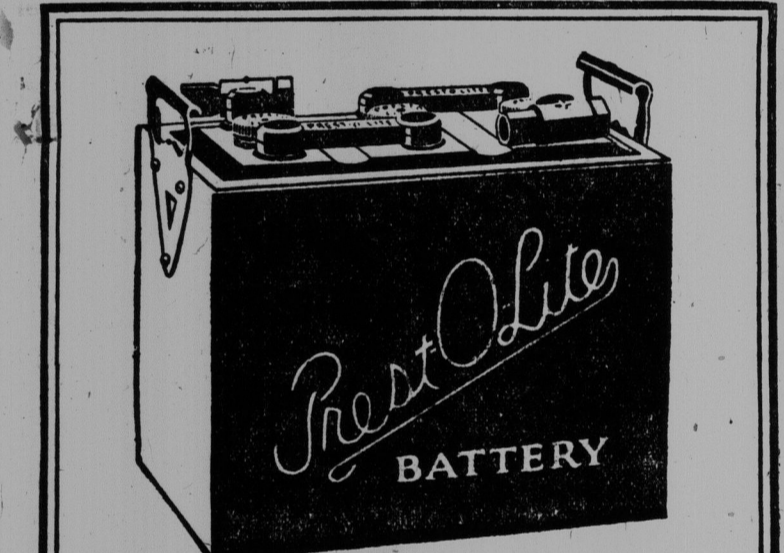
The screams of the maid drew Mrs. Chambers' attention, but before she knew what had happened the intruder burst into her room.

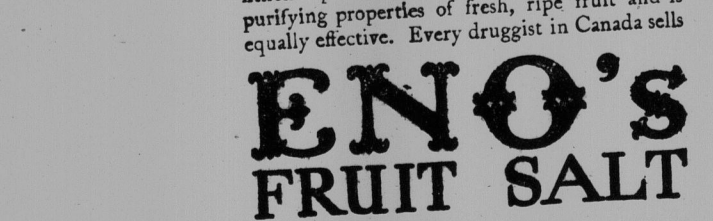

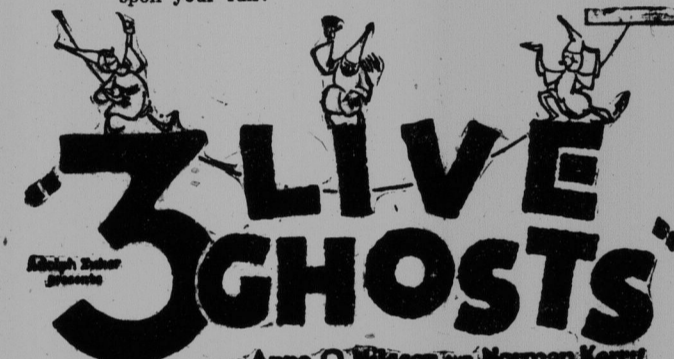

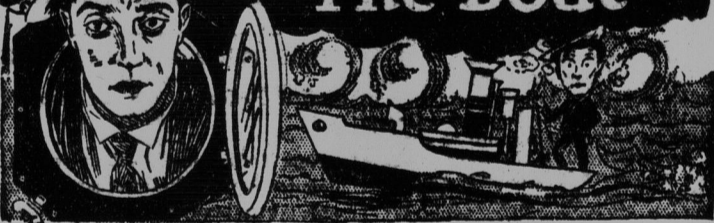

WAY TO INCREASE GASOLINE OUTPUT

More Complete Condensation of Still Vapors Would Yield 120,000,000 Gallons More—Findings of Mines Bureau.

Washington, June 16—Possibility of increasing the output of gasoline by 120,000,000 gallons through more complete condensation of still vapors at petroleum refineries is suggested by an investigation by D. B. Dow, the bureau's petroleum engineer.

For condensed use, in scarce, greater recoveries could be made than in the large refineries studied. This should be especially true of Oklahoma, North Texas and Louisiana skimming plants, where summer temperatures are high and where cold water is scarce.

The thirteen refineries studied by the Bureau of Mines are obtaining 128,651 gallons of gasoline daily from uncondensed still vapors.

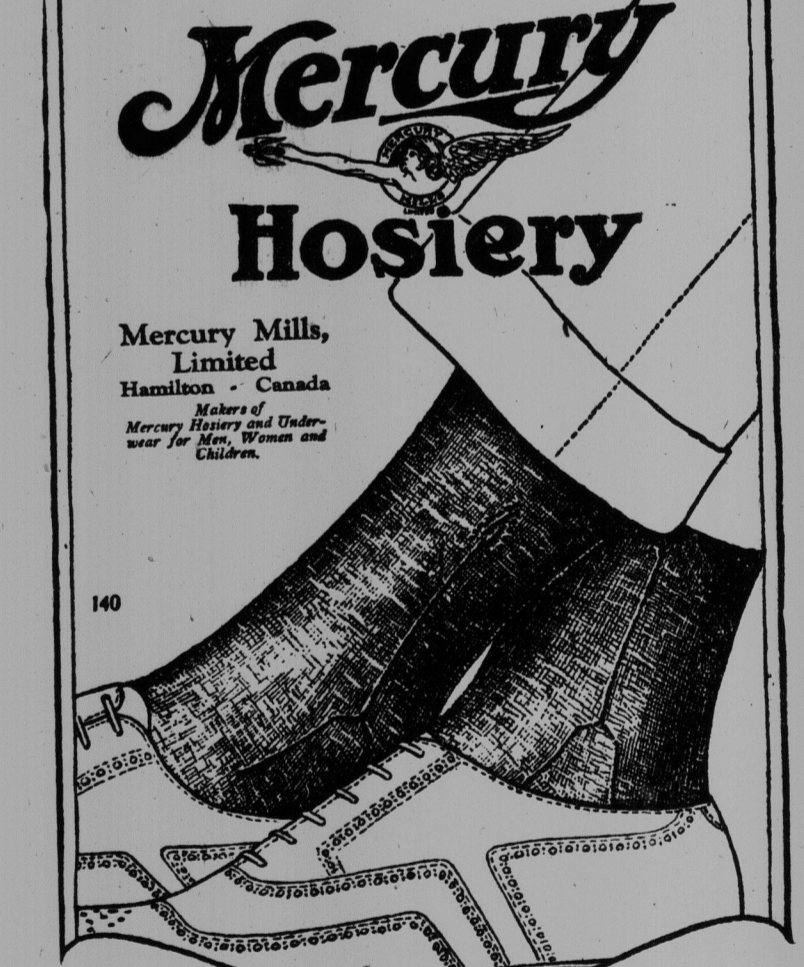
