








Grand Jury Accuses Unionists of Conspiring Against Non-Union Competitor -Echo of Lockwood Inquiry.

New York, June 17—An indictment charging thirty-seven members and officers of Bakery and Confectionery Workers' International Union, Local 100, known as "the Jewish Bakers' Union," with conspiracy was returned by the with conspiracy was returned by the June Grand Jury. Morris Hillquit and Hyman Bushel, counsel to the union, were notified to produce the defendants before Justice Giegerich in the Supreme

were notified to produce the defendants before Justice Giegerich in the Supreme Court today. The indictment grew out of the Lock-wood committee's inquiry and followed the refusal to the bakers to ascede to the request of Samuel Untermyer, coun-sel to the committee, who demanded that the bakers give up their store estab-lished by the union next door to the shop of Max Schlesinger as 29 Avenue C, a non-union baker. Special Assistant District Attorney Henry Mayer presented the case to the Grand Jury and produced evidence to show that the union brought pressure to bear on the boss bakers to refuse to sell their wares to Schlesinger, and also to show that the union store sold bread, cakes and rolls below the cost of produc-tion to drive Schlesinger out of business. The indictments sets forth twelve overt acts alleged to have been committed by the defendants, who incude members of the union. By force, threats and In-timidation, it was alleged, the defen-dants sought to drive Schesinger out of business and to thereby commit an act injurius to trade and commerce. It was assurted in the indictment that a delegate of the union threatened that if Schlesinger did not sign up with the union an opposition store would be opened. When he failed to sign up, it was said, the threat was carried out. One of the overt acts alleged is that the union store sold bread for 5 cents a

> Lesson No. 29. THE DETECTOR.

The detector in the circuit of a radio receiver performs the important func-tion of converting the energy of the radio-frequent oscillations, intercepted by the antenna, into uni-directional pulsating currents which may be rendered au-dible by the receiving telephones.

the antenna, into uni-directional pulsating currents which may be rendered au-dible by the receiving telephones. • Certain types of minerals, such as galena, carborundum silicon, and others, possess the valuable property of rectification. By means of these crystals the radio-frequent currents, inducted in the aerial circuit by the advancing electro-magnetic waves, are rectified or converted into pulsating direct currents, so that with the aid of the receiving telephones, the incoming signals are render-ed audible to the ear. The radio-frequent currents oscillate with such rapidity as to be impossible of detection, without previous rectification, either by the diaphram of the receiving telephones or by the sensitive mechanism of the ear. In addition to the numerous forms of crystal detectors, the vacuum tube detector in its various phases holds a position of extreme importance. The valuable properties of the vacuum tube and the wonderful ways in which it may be used, both in the detection and amplification of radio signals, will be explained in lessons to follow. Certain Crystal detectors, carborundum for example, give better results when a small current from a local battery must flow in a certain direction, determined by experiment, through the crystal, and the amount of current must be carefully adjusted by means of a potentiometer in order to obtain satisfactory results. Crystals are usually mounted in a small metal cup which forms one con-

satisfactory results. Crystals are usually mounted in a small metal cup which forms one con-necting terminal. The other terminal is composed of a pointed contact, so ad-justable as to be moved over the surface of the crystal until a point is found where the signals may be clearly received and maximum audibility obtained. Some crystals, such as carborundum, require a firm pressure of the contact point to obtain signals of maximum audibility; others, galena for example, need only the light contact of a delicate wire on the sensitive surface. The value of a crystal detector rests in its property of sensitiveness to the incoming oscillations and its ability toremain in adjustment. In the recent highly specialized "broadcasting" the functions of the vacuum tube detector are so varied and its ability to detect and amplify signals is so valuable that the following lessons will give detailed descriptions of the con-struction and operation of the various types.

More Complete Condensation of Still Vapors Would Yield 120,000,000 Gallons More-Findings of Mines

More—Findings of Mines Bureau. Washington, June 16 — Possibility of increasing the output of gasoline by 120,000,000 galons through more com-plete condensation of still vapors at the petroleum refineries was suggested to day by the Bureau of Mines after an investigation by D. B. Dow, the bureau's petroleum engineer. Mr. Dow estimated that 50,000,000 gal-tons were recovered from uncondensed still vapors at refineries in 1921. "Application of the system to all re-fineries would give a possible gasoline recovery by this method of 170,000,000 gallons yearly," the bureau said in a statemet. "The calculations of the Bureau fain are fineries whose general methods are more efficient than those employed in the hundreds of analler skimming plants, that have no recovery systems. It is essumed that in the less efficient skim-ming plants, located in sections where the supply of cold water, so essential




recovery systems. The thirteen refin-eries studied by the Bureau of Mines are obtaining 128,651 gallons of gasoline daily from uncondensed still vapors. These plants are situated in the various refining centers, other then the Brites daily from uncondensed still vapols. These plants are situated in the various refining centres, other than the Pacific Coast, and are running crude represen-tative of all the producing fields cast of the Rocky Mountains. In addition, sev-eral are running Mexican crude. In-formation from California refineries information from California refineries in-dicates that on account of the smaller gasoline content of the California crude there are no recovery plants of impor-tance in that state. The average re-covery of gasoline at the refineries in-vestigated by the Bureau of Mines amounted to four-tenths gallon per bar-rel of crude oil charged. "Unless preventive measures are


