Report by Acting British Consul is Subject of a Parliamentary Paper

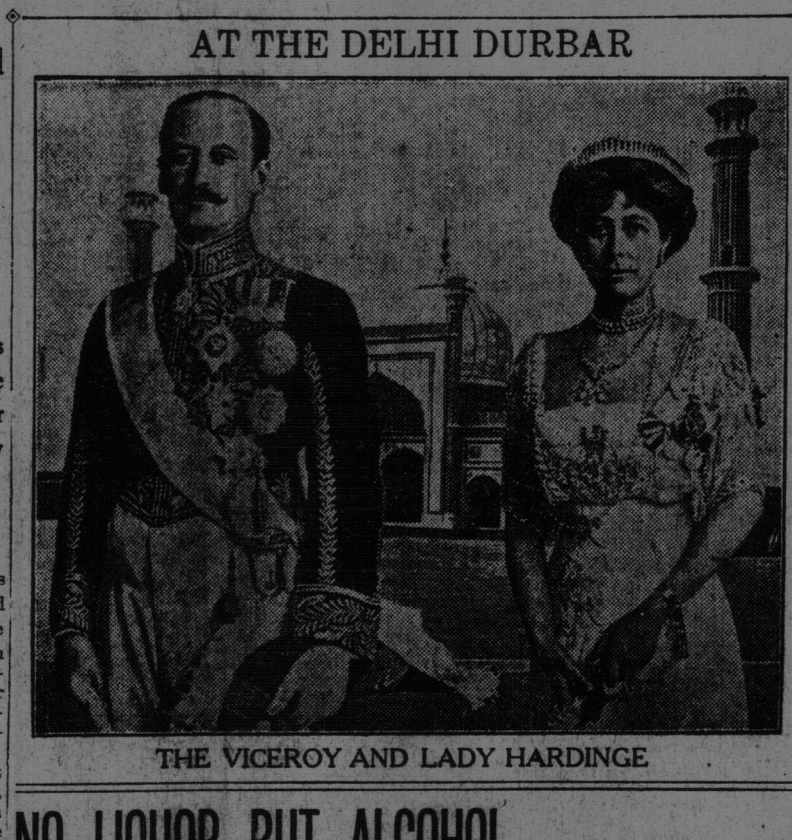

SUFFRAGETTES TO TWO MONTHS JAIL. London, Dec. 12.—Twenty-two suffragettes arrested with 200 companions in connection with the demonstration at the House of Commons on Nov. 21, were sentenced today. About 200 had been summarily sentenced by the police magistrate in the Bow street police court on minor charges. The accused, who appeared today, had on their first appearance been committed to prison from similar lawlessness.

(Note.—The poetry and the parable are in no way to be associated with the unambiguous discussion now proceeding as to the union of all Christian bodies.)

Now it came to pass in those days that a certain heathen, having by misadventure come upon the land of the Christians, heard tidings of the Kingdom of Heaven. And having made diligent inquiry concerning it, he was persuaded that it was good, and he set out to seek it, saying, "Behold, I will ask of these Christians as I go and each of them will make answer straight and tell me the road that shall lead me to that I would find, and there shall I dwell in peace." And so saying, he faced forth. And the heathen was a strong man, of great limbs and mighty of heart.

WOMEN WHO SMOKE CIGARETTES
There is no doubt that some of the women of Ottawa smoke cigarettes. That is not undoubted, but there is some difference of opinion as to how many of the fair sex of the Dominion's capital are smokers at the shrine of My Lady Nicotina.

The editor of the Ottawa Free Press, who should be wearing sackcloth and ashes over the discovery, turns out to be a misguided fellow who pretends that there is something humorous about the whole affair. It seems that the W. C. T. Slater Forsakes Luxuries for \$6 a Week Job in Mills

Norwich, Conn., Dec. 12—Heir to many millions and owner of yachts, automobiles, and fast horses, William A. Slater, Jr., twenty-one years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Slater, of Washington, D. C., formerly of this city, has gone to work as a day laborer in the Slater mills at Jewett City, near here, to learn the textile trade.

To show the earnestness of his purpose to gain a practical mastery of all the intricacies of the business, as his father and his grandfather did before him, Mr. Slater is doing the most menial and grimeiest work in the big mills. The task to which he has set himself commands a weekly wage of \$6, but he must do nine hours a day for six days to find that stipend in his pay envelope.

His great-grand-uncle, Samuel Slater, founded the first machine cotton factory in America. His grandfather, the late John P. Slater, established the Jewett City mills and made an immense fortune. His charities were great, one of his benefactions having been a gift in 1882 of \$1,000,000 for the education of negroes.

C. P. R. ELEVATOR PLANT AT OWEN SOUND DESTROYED

Million Bushels of Grain Also Lost in Fire Last Night

Owen Sound, Ont., Dec. 12—Fire last night wiped out the entire elevator plant of the Canadian Pacific Railway here. Included in the destruction is about 1,000,000 bushels of grain, wheat, oats and barley.

The fire started in elevator "A" about nine o'clock, and gained a foothold in the timbers at the base of the building. The construction of the elevator gave a direct draft to the top of the structure and the flames soon shot out at the west side at the grain leg.

CONY ISLAND FIRE

New York, Dec. 12—Fire, which for a time threatened to burn out the heart of Long Island, the great show place of Coney Island, raged for an hour and a half last night, but was extinguished by the firemen of the Luna Park restaurant and an amusement resort adjoining, known as the "Pleasure Palace."

Both these structures were practically destroyed at a loss ranging from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Big Liner Was Aground

Hamburg, Dec. 12—The Hamburg American line steamer President Grant, which grounded on Sunday off Blankenese, on the Elbe, was floated yesterday and prepared for New York. Part of her cargo had been taken on in lighters, so that she could get clear.

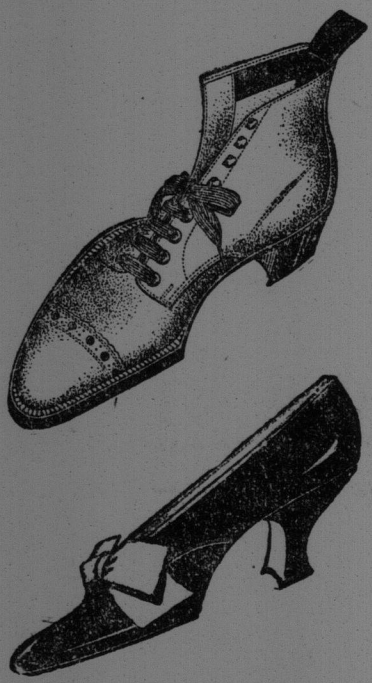

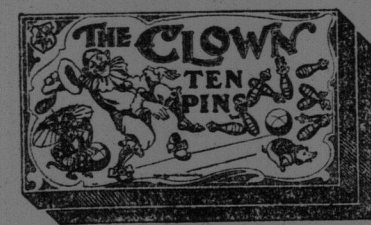

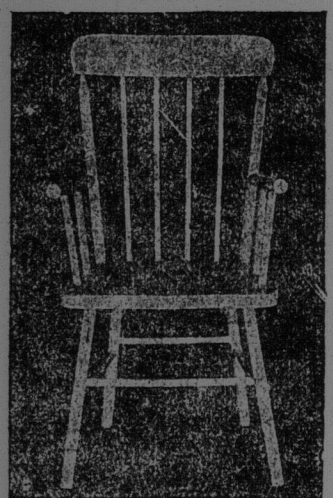

TIME TO END THE WAR HAS COME

Loss of Life in Tripoli Struggle Has Been Great

MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

Estimate Shows That 75,000 People Have Been Killed or Incapacitated and That War Has Already Cost \$375,000,000

Malta, Dec. 12.—A curious calculation has been made here. It is thought to be roughly correct and may be found instructive and interesting.

The conflict in Tripolitania has consequently already brought death or ruin to 60,000 combatants, and perhaps a quarter as many non-combatants have died or are crippled by sickness, exile and loss of means of living.

ARE GIRLS SOLD IN BONDAGE IN MONTREAL CITY?

Court to Deal With Case of Guadeloupe Servant and Others May Follow

Montreal, Dec. 11.—Does slavery exist in Montreal? The arrest of one of the colored girls from Guadeloupe on a charge of desertion from her employment, where she was under contract, will bring up the question and the trial next Thursday will give the answer.

When they landed from Guadeloupe in New York, before being taken on the train to Montreal, they were given a contract to sign, by which they were bound to work as domestic servants for \$3 a month for an indefinite term, which contract is alleged by the lawyers acting for the Allen Labor Act.

When the girls arrived in Montreal they were turned over to their employers who paid \$80, presumably for expenses. Counting the fare from Guadeloupe to New York, meals and the fare to Montreal, the girls' lawyers figure that the contract could not have been more than \$33. Yet the charge was \$80, and this was charged against the girls.

A girl who wanted to leave her employer a couple of weeks ago, said her belongings were confiscated by the employer until she paid a sum of \$74, which was still unpaid after six months of work at five dollars a month.

The girl sought legal advice. She was immediately given possession of her belongings, but was arrested for desertion, and consigned before the recorder last week. Gustave Dutaud, of Bossette & Dutaud, appeared for her, and she pleaded not guilty. Leonora Lecanier, N. C., president of L'Alliance Francaise, furnished bond, and the case was postponed to the following Thursday.

Some of these girls also say that they have been transferred from one employer to another without their being consulted. The process was simply that the new employer paid the old employer the girl's indenture and the contract and the girl was transferred.

The case is a hot one, and if the decision is against the employer, others of the girls who are not satisfied with the contracts will appeal to the courts to have them cancelled.

DR. SHEARER'S OBSERVATIONS ON A VISIT TO NEW YORK

(Toronto News).

Rev. Dr. Shearer, of the Social and Moral Reform League of Canada, has just returned from an interesting visit to New York, where he spent some ten days at Spring Street Neighborhood House, the centre of the great work now being carried on by the eminent Presbyterian divine.

"There, at Spring Street House," said Dr. Shearer, "they are carrying out a great work in fallen humanity. That house was once a tenement building, with twenty-five rooms, then occupied by 39 families—today it is a great institution with a nursery, a domestic science kitchen, sewing circle, a gymnasium, recreation parlour and dispensary work—a rendezvous of criminals transformed into a healthy church institution, whose entire labors are permeated with New Testament evangelism, and where large numbers of formerly the most hopeless slaves of vice are now formed into a self-supporting congregation as respectable as any to be found anywhere."

"Never, until recently it was impossible to get from the lower end of Manhattan to the upper, and all the lower end was filled with slavers and huge tenement buildings. Nowhere in the world is population so dense. One single block is reported to hold 7,800 human beings—dwellers. Manifestly, it is thus impossible to get fresh air and sunshine."

"Now, one of the factors necessary to prevent such a state of affairs in our own city is cheap and rapid transit from the crowded tenements where inexpensive tenement homes will be accessible to practically all. I come back from my trip to New York as an even more enthusiastic advocate of the tube system proposed. Even if they could not be made to pay for some time to come, the city should construct them in the wide interests of humanity. In view of our perspective of the conditions prevailing in New York, our delay in this matter will be criminal."

"Before I left I appreciated the progressive leadership of Dr. Hastings. I return doubly enthusiastic in my admiration of the work accomplished by our health department, and it is my intention to aggressively support him in the various measures he is taking to protect the health and therefore the moral morality of the present and future generation of Toronto."

RETRIBUTION He was a suburban amateur gardener, whose mission in life was to bore all his friends by asking them down for weeks-end and showing them round his three-acre-by-two estate. Just now he was boring Jackson from the office.

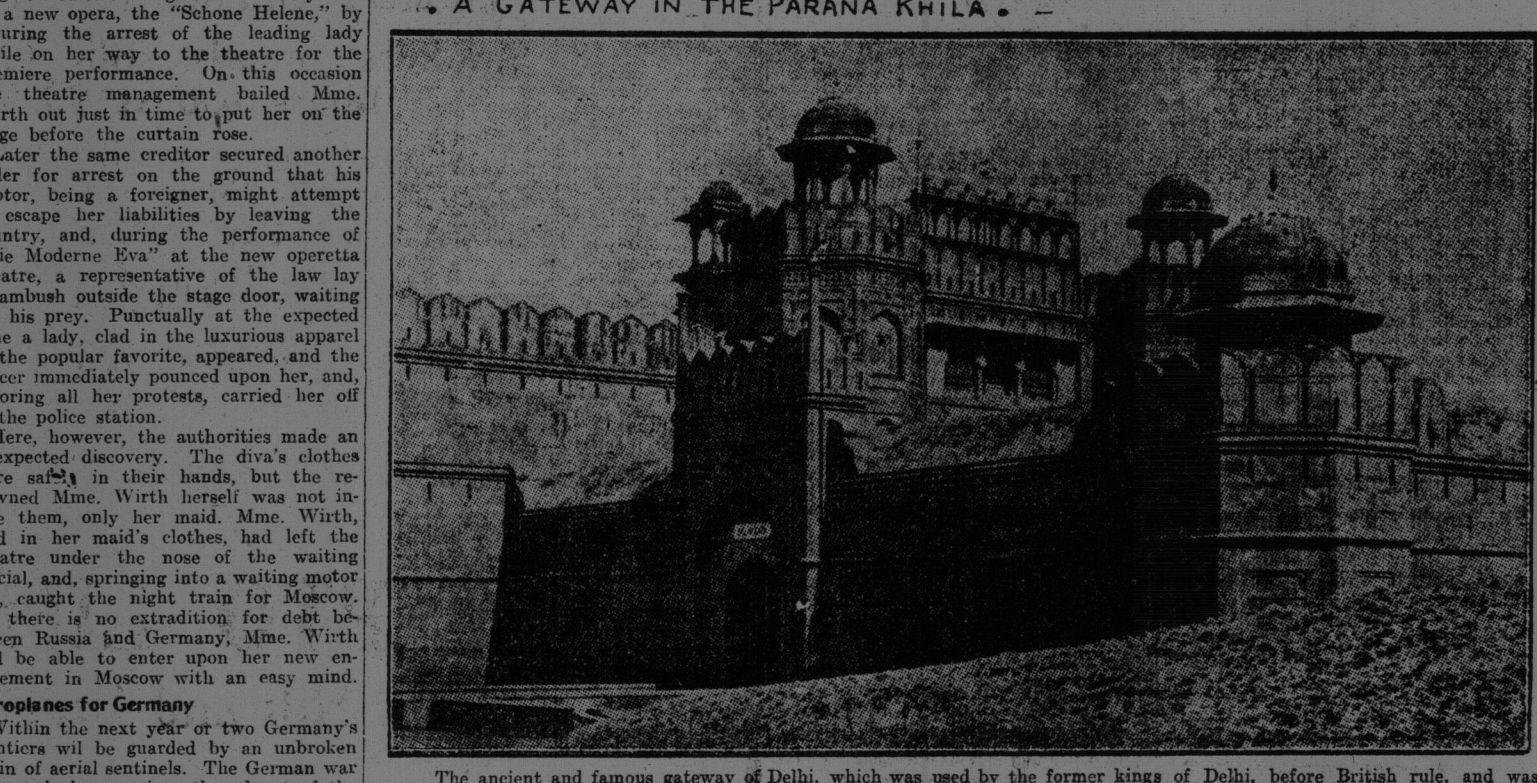
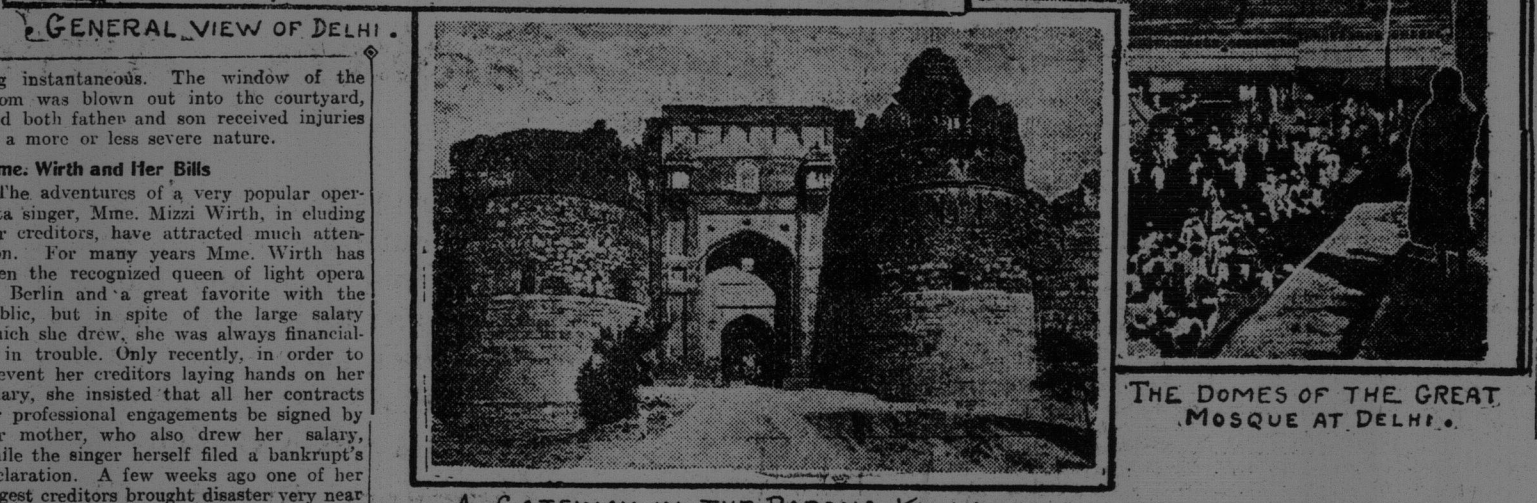
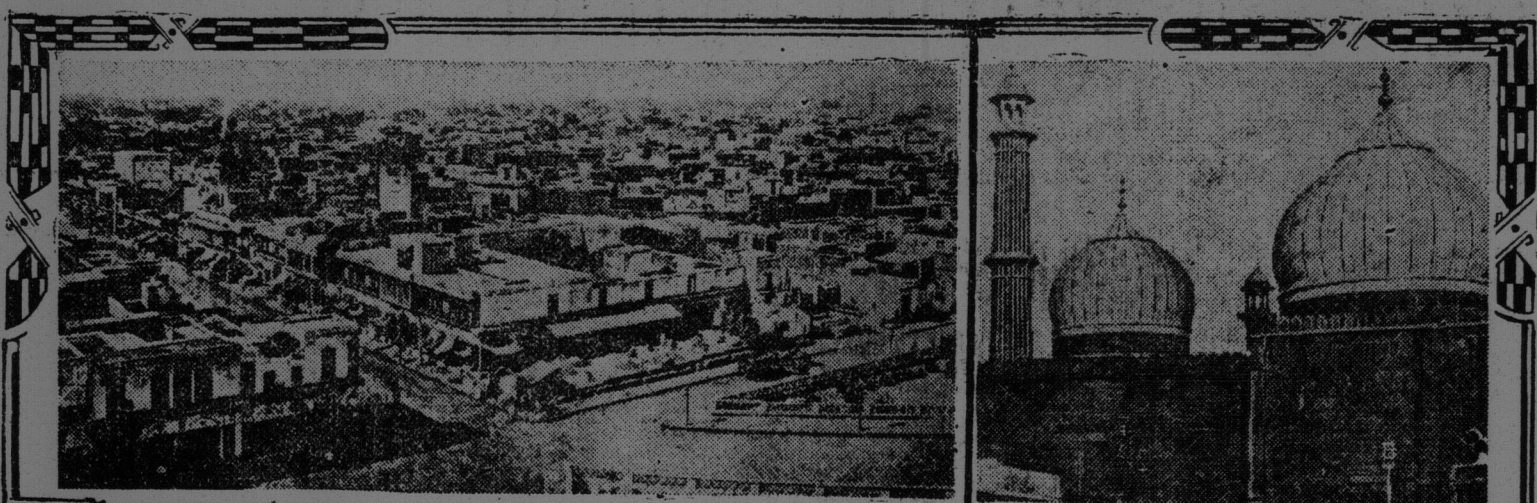

LIBERALS TAKE SLICE OFF WHITNEY MAJORITY IN ONTARIO

Toronto, Dec. 11.—The Ontario provincial elections today resulted very much as was expected, in the return of the administration of Sir James Whitney with a slightly reduced but still preponderant majority of the members of the legislature.

The standing of the parties, which in the last house was 87 Conservatives, 18 Liberals and one independent, will in the next legislature probably be 82 Conservatives, 23 Liberals and one independent, giving Sir James a safe majority of 58 over his Liberal and independent opponents in a total of 106 seats, as compared with a majority of 48 in the last house.

The most important issue in the campaign was the question of bilingual schools, but both parties handled it with caution, and its only visible effect was in the two strongly French ridings of Sturgeon Falls and Prescott, where the Conservative candidates were defeated.

The Liberal gains, eleven in all, comprised the following ridings: Centre Bruce, Glenora, East Middlesex, Monck, North Norfolk, South Ontario, Prescott, Sturgeon Falls, East Wellington and North Westwood and East Kent.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE CHARTER
Citizens Committee Go Over Some More of the Clauses

DISCUSS CHURCH UNION

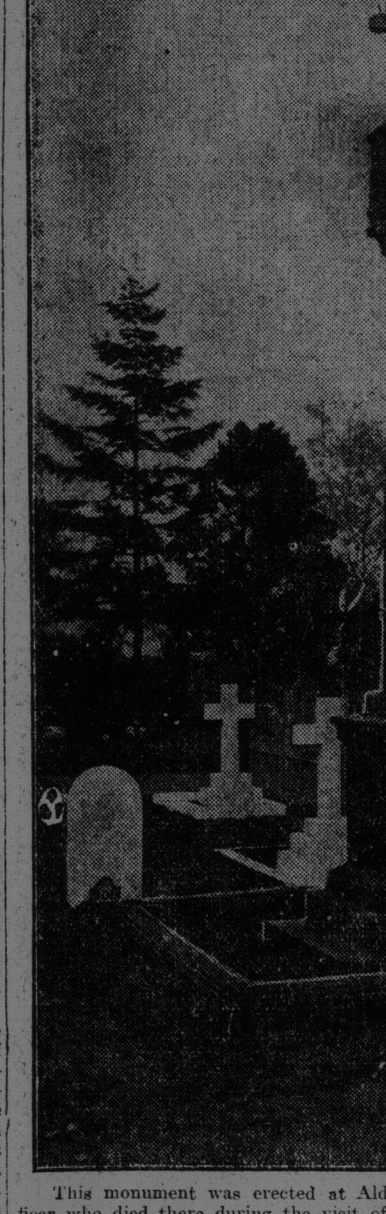
That Many Presbyterians Will Band Together Against it is Statement Made at St. Stephen's Guild Meeting

The declaration that hundreds of ministers and members of the Presbyterian church are opposed to church union under the proposed agreement and that if the union is attempted they will band together to resist it, being the subject of discussion at the St. Stephen's church hall under the auspices of the Young People's Guild last evening.

Hon. J. G. Forbes who championed the union of the three bodies is a member of the Union Committee and as such is thoroughly familiar with the details of the negotiations. His chief argument was the overwhelming need of greater efforts on the part of the churches in the northwest and in the foreign field and he argued that under such a union the saving of effort effected by the elimination of competition would set free a large amount of money and a great number of men for the work of extension. He commended the basis of union and dismissed the doctrinal objections as matters of less importance than the work which the church must face.

Three Members of Firm in Police Court—Bail is Refused

Israel, Morris and Hyman Goldberg, members of the firm of M. Goldberg & Son, junk dealers, who assigned here some weeks ago and who were arrested, were arraigned in the police court this morning. There was a gathering of spectators in the court when the trio were brought in. Israel is the oldest of the three, and his age on the police books is given as fifty-five. He was charged with fraudulently concealing the property of the firm after an assignment had been made. The other two partners were charged with being members of the firm doing business in the City of St. John not keeping proper records of their business transactions. B. L. Gerow appeared for the prisoners; J. King Kelley for Cyrus J. Incebe, the assignee, and F. B. Taylor for the Bank of British North America. Mr. Gerow asked the court to allow the matter to stand over until Friday morning and His Honor and the counsel for the plaintiffs agreed. The question of bail was brought up, but the court announced that as the defence had asked for the adjournment it would be impossible to allow the prisoners out on bail. The three were therefore remanded until Friday morning at ten o'clock, when the preliminary examination will be begun.

ROBBERY IN SMYTHE STREET WAREHOUSE

J. S. Frost's Place of Business Broken Into and Case of Whisky Stolen

A bold piece of thievery was successfully effected some time on Sunday, when the warehouse of Major J. S. Frost, in Smythe street, was entered and a case of whisky, valued at about \$7, was stolen. It is thought that there were two men implicated, and that one kept watch in the street while the other went to the side of the warehouse and broke in. A fairly large stone was first thrown through the window, and entrance thus made possible on the glass being removed. The case of spirits was first seen, and it was lifted to the outside, but when it dropped some of the bottles were broken, two of them being found later, with the straw covering intact, floating in the slip nearby.
