FOR PURE ENGLISH

London, Dec. 8—The latest Oxford movement is an association of learned professors to encourage the campaign for the speaking and writing of pure English started by the poet laureate, Robert Bridges. It is supported by Thomas Hardy, novelist, Sir Walter Raleigh, professor of English literature at Oxford University, and other prominent men.

The exact objects of the society have not been announced but it is understood there will be lectures and publications in favor of the purity of the written and spoken language and against the incorporation of foreign words. An effort will be made to make polite speech consist of terse, vigorous English words instead of elaborate deriver synonyms and inacture pronunciation as "naycher" for "nature" which the poet laureate cited as a typical example of the manuer in which the speech of educated English persons is being deplorably changed.
