Bid of Telegraph Construction Maintenance Company Has Been Accepted.

London, Dec. 3 .- The Pacific Cable Company has accepted, in behalf of the governnents of Great Britain, New South Wales Queensland and New Zealand, the bid of the Telegraph Construction & Maintenance Company to make and lay a cable from Vancouver to Queensland and New Zealand, via Fanning, Fiji and Norfolk Islands, for £1,795,000, the work to be finished by the end of 1902.
