C., Feb. 5.-A five years' contract has been entered into between the British government and the Canadian Paqific Railway for the conveyance of troops, mails, stores, etc. between Halifax, Quebec, Montreal and Hong Kong, for which service the Can-adian line will receive £60,000 sterling as a subsidy yearly, of which the Can-adian overnment will contribute £15, 000. 





COPENHAGEN, Feb. 5.—The United Steamship Company's new 10,000 ton vessel Oscar II. will start on her maid-en trip to New York in the early part of Firch Two other 10,000 ton steam-ers have been ordered on the Clyde for the same service. The steamer Oscar II, which was thus christened with the consent of the King of Sweden and Norway, is built entirely of steel and is 515 feet long, 58 feet wide and 42 feet deep, from the upper deck to the keel. She has a double bottom, divided into ten water tight compartments and from the bot-tom to the upper deck she is divided in-to ten additional water tight compart-ments. She is overbuilt 60 feet fore and aft, and 176 feet amidship. On the main deck there are accommodations for 700 steerage passengers. It is ex-pected the Oscar II. will cover the dis-tance between New York and the Scan-dinavian points in 11 days.



HEALTH OF THE NAVY.

HEALTH OF THE NAVY. A report on the health of the Brit-ish navy shows a remarkably low death rate. For 1900 the figures were 7.37 per 1,000, which is some 3 per cent. lower than the healthiest town in Eng-land, and includes 74 deaths from wounds received in action in South Africa and China, and 17 sulcides. On the other hand, the figures for disease and injuries are high. 84,550 cases be-ing medically treated. This is in the ratio of 852.29 per 1,000, which makes the average dally number of men slok 3,665.8, and gives the astounding total of 1,316,118 days lost to the navy through sickness. Chickenpox, mumps, and plague all went to swell this list.






