

## MIME FAILS TO BRING RELIEF TO MESSINA

### Present State of District No Better Than in Days Following Earthquake

King and Queen of Italy are Dissatisfled With Backward State of Affairs.

MESSINA, May 5—The present state of Messina, more than three months after the earthquake, is no better than in the days immediately following the catastrophe. Civilized life is non-existent and impossible. There is no accommodation; and no possiblity of erecting decent dwellings.

The refugees here are herding together in the manner of cattle. Their huts are stacked with belongings, leaving them barely room enough to move. Water is only obtainable from a few far-distant standpipes, food is cooked mostly outside the huts, and great fears are entertained that fire may break out. These wooden huts are built haphazard, one against the other. Many, for lack of huts, are forced to live in old houses left standing by the earthquake among the ruins with thousands of dead still surrounding them.

among the huts.

There are no arrangements for the removal or destruction of mattresses and furniture soaked with putrid matter from the dead and extracted from the ruins. These articles are left lying in the sun among the wreckage, while millions upon millions of large, bussing flies, swarm over them, carrying the deadly germs broadcast among the populace, and depositing the seeds of pestilence on the food sold in the huts, which are used as shops.

Among this food is much which has been recovered from the ruins of the shops in the town which were under blocks of flats.

There is practically no illumination at

blocks of flats.

There is practically no illumination at night in the ruined city nor any possibility of transit. No assistance whatever is given to commercial enterprise, and business firms cannot get concessions of ground and wood for building warehouses. Enterprising merchants are forced to use all available shops or warehouses among the ruins, whether the buildings are safe or not.

If this provision is enforced so that the interior of the bar can be seen from the office or lobby it will be likely to do away with the dark suspicion entertained by the police and temperance people that liquor is sold at unconventional hours in the hotels. It is said, however, that some difficulty will be found in making this provision of any practical effect.
