

THE MAYNOOTH GRANT.

This foul blot on the statute book of a Protestant land will soon be obliterated, and we can confidently hope that it will be followed by a general avowal of the principles of duty and freedom throughout the wide spread dominion of England's Queen, yet we do not think it right to give the money of protestants to support a College which educates men to pull down the protestant religion, and those civil institutions, which are dear to the country. It must be repugnant to every loyal man, to behold the recent attempts of a foreign potentate, to exercise authority in the land of our forefathers—to interfere with the Queen's prerogative, and the sacred rights of the British people. When his holiness manifested the slightest degree of power or more interest of justice, and peace—a protestant place of worship to exist at Rome—when a stranger and usurper can reside in his dominions, without being subjected to an organised system of legal penalties, which have been inflicted on us, we may well say, in the act of justice itself—when he exhibits no apprehension of the result of ratification, interesting the far fields of Italy, in a word—he is thoroughly honest, up to the age, and indolently exact every thing just for beyond the seas. We trust, that the freedom, and quietude of England may be comparatively safe in treating with him—but he will feel ashamed to indulge his arrogant and dangerous pretensions—then the dark cloud of horrid superstition, which hangs like a pall over him, will be cast off, and the sun of truth, and the glorious rays of Gospel truth, will shine upon her people, and corrupt, blasphemous, ignorance and error, will speedily pass away. When all those glorious events shall happen, and happen they will, as surely as the day will come, we trust, that the boldness, and boldness of his claim for temporal advancement, and urge its position on the truthful ground that *Deus' theology*, is no longer the rule and guide of its inmates.

It is gratifying to find, throughout England and Scotland, that great exertions are now being made by the most zealous members of the next Parliament, who are decidedly opposed to the expenditure of the public money, in aid of the propagation of the Romish principle. In Liverpool, we find that Messrs. Fox, Mackenzie, and Turner, during their favorite careers, were recently, when attempting to address an audience, denied a hearing by their leading constituents, whose views regarding free trade and the grant to Maynooth, they have grossly misrepresented; while Messrs. Mackenzie and Turner have met with the warmest opposition, and热烈的抵抗, in every part of this ancient and loyal borough.

Messrs. Mackenzie and Turner, by the high and the humble, by rich and poor, have been received with a truly English welcome, in every part of Liverpool, where their addresses have attracted not only large audiences, but a heavy and increasing response.

At a numerous meeting of the electors of Pitt street and St. Peter's wards, when there were present a majority of the members of the House of Commons, of the middle, professional, and mercantile classes, Liverpool, Messrs. Mackenzie and Turner's political sentiments were received with the most unbounded enthusiasm.

Upon this occasion, the first named gentleman used the following words:

"When you informed him with having changed his opinions, even if the charges were shown to be correct, he would ask the meeting whether circumstances had not taken a course in modern times which would justify that change? (Hear, hear.) Had there been no Papal aggression? Had not the Pope asserted his supremacy over the Church of the Queen by appointing his own self-styled bishops with territorial titles? That alone might have been sufficient to induce any thinking man to change his opinion. But by far as it might be, the Pope's recent decision is still more powerful. They might demand that the College of Maynooth should have his most unfeeling opposition. He did not know, whether any of those present were much mixed up with the shipping interest. (Cries of 'Yes.') He voted against the repeal of the Navigation Laws, because he was then of the opinion that their repeal placed this country in an unsafe position relatively with other countries. He would ask, then, if it was not so? (Cries of 'Yes.') The foreign vessels not coming into our port did not use our harbors, and therefore excluded themselves; and their consumption of the various products required in the working of a ship taken from this port did not exceed one fourth of that taken by our own vessels. (Cries of 'Not a hundred part.') When he reflected on this, he could not help admiring that there had been an increase; but it might be observed, three-fourths of the aggregate number returned were foreign vessels, and only the remaining one-fourth were British. (Hear, hear.) The foreign vessels got neither room, nor passage, nor protection, nor safety, to enter our ports for all these. Did not a Spanish vessel get £4 per ton freight in their own port, when a British ship could not obtain £3? How did the Americans manage this? If a Spanish ship had been sent to America, she would have been compelled to pay the difference, and the expense of which the Americans were sure to get money. These being his opinions upon the shipping interest, he hoped, at least, to have the support of those engaged in that interest. (Impassioned cheering.)"

Whilst from the lips of Mr. Turner, we note the following remarks:

"The most important thought on the subject, is the influence of the Pope, who, in taking the most part of Protestants to support a Roman Catholic college, the greatest object of the priests interested there, in being to subvert the religion of Protestants. The Roman Catholics were attempting to gain sympathy by their political influence, and influence; it is, however, who had of civil and religious liberties, where that religion was in the ascendant. (Hear, hear.) In Italy, the principal seat of the Roman Catholic religion, Protestants were not allowed to erect a church for the worship of God in accordance with their own principles. Nothing could be more arrogant than this, than the edit to that country last year by the Pope, invading the prerogative of the Queen, and establishing territorial titles in this country without even asking permission of the legitimate government. This, I believe, that would have suffered such an act of assumption to take effect. Mr. Turner, then touched on the subject of the Navigation Laws. He had always admitted that something would be necessary to regulate the same; but enacting legislation in conformity with altered circumstances, was rather too much of a bourgeoisie to the British Government." The Army and Navy will be increased forthwith, we presume."

The Montreal Gazette remarks as follows:

"Had the question with Sir John Pakington been one affecting the rights, privileges, or liberties of the people of Canada, high 'Roman' lawyers, and others, would be likely to give it a decided answer in favor of the Americans.
