THE "EMERGENCY" SIR ROBERT BORDEN WARNED THEM TO PREPARE TO HELP HIM TO MEET

GERMAN OFFENSIVE NORTH OF ARRAS IS COMPLETELY **BROKEN, IS FRENCH REPORT**

Parls, June 6.—German attacks of unusual violence were made yes-terday in the region north of Arras, northern France. The French war office announced today that the German offensive had broken down everywhere, with heavy losses to the attackers. The statement follows:

The statement follows: "In the region to the north of Arras the enemy undertook yester." day evening a very violent effort to re-capture the positions which he had lost recently. "The whole of the front from Ablain to Neuville, and particularly the sugar refinery at Souchez, underwent a bombardment almost con-tinually, to which our artillery replied energetically. "Five German counter-attacks were launched on the slope of Cha-pelle-De-Lorette. The counter-attacks have been incessant in the wood to the east of the road from Alx-Noulette to Souchez. "The German offensive was overwhelmed everywhere and we main-tained all our positions, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. Between the Alx-Noulette-Souchez road and the Ablain-Souchez read we took several trenches of the enemy in which we made about thirty prison erg."



Governor of Amara Surrenders Italian Naval Detachments Cut and Town Now in Possession of British Troops.

London, June 7-In a despatch from Copenhagen the Daily Teleondent savs:

"It is reported from Stockholm that a naval battle occurred Saturday near Gothland. For six ours a violent cannonade was heard from a southeasterly direction, and for a long time from twenty to twenty-five shots were fired every minute."

Rome, via London, June 6--The fol-lowing official statement was issued by the War Office tonight: "Naval detachments yesterday cut the cables uniting the continent to the islands of the Dalmatia archipe-lago. All the lighthouses and lookout stations of these islands were de-stroyed. The railway between Cat-taro and Ragusa, was bombarded and scriously damaged. "The same day a group of our de-stroyers, which were unsuccessfully attacked by Austrian aeroplanes, again bombarded Monfalcone and samk sev-eral sailing craft laden with merchan-dise. Large vessels supporting the destroyers cruised in the same waters without seeing the enemy." The ships of the British navy are being supplied with Carley lifebuoys. This picture, taken on a light cruiser, shows a large sized Carley lifebuoy, which will sustain forty-five men in the water. The space within the buoy is filled with wood grating, and the buoy is supplied with paddles.
