General Mangin's Franco-American Forces North of the Ourcq Begin Attack At Daybreak From Le Plessier-Huleu To Fere - En - Tardenois and Advance Rapidly Despite Heavy Resistance-Enemy Troops in Delicate Position.

Cathedral Quarter of Rheims Aflame Once More As Is Also Western Part of That Martyred City -Total Number of German Prisoners Taken From July 15 To July 31 Is 33,400.

With the French Armies, Aug. 1—(Evening)—General Mangin's Franco-American forces north of the Ourcq began an attack at daybreak today from Le Plessier-Huleu to Fere-En-Tardenois. Before noon Hill 205, overlooking all the communications as far as Fismes, was taken in violent fighting.

Cramoiselle and the entire Mouniere Wood were captured in the stiffest struggle. Enemy tsoops, now occupying the Hartennes-Grand Rozoy salient and enfiladed by the Allied artillery fire, are in the most delicate situation.

The enemy artillery on Wednesday carried out a heavy bombardment along the whole line, including the regions east and west of Rheims, and made raids at several points, presumably in an effort to "feel out" the Allied intentions.

The cathedral quarter of Rheims was aflame yesterday evening, as was also the western part of that martyred city.

GERMANS FLEE NORTH-WARD BEFORE THE ALLIES

VIOLENT FIGHTING CONTINUED LAST NIGHT NEAR SOISSONS

Allied Observers Report That Bodies of Germans Are Fleeing Precipitately Northward Along BONAR LAW ALSO Road Leanding From Launoy, Which Lies Midway Between Soissons and Fere-En-Tardenois.

With the French Army in France, Aug. 1—(By The Associated Press)—(Evening)—With the fall of darkness tonight fighting continued between the Allies and the Gerns on the western side of the Soissons-Rheims salient. Allied observers reported that bodies of Germans were fleeing precipitately northward along the road leading from Launby, which lies about midway between Soissons and Fere-en-

With the American Army on the Aisne-Marne Front, Aug. 1-(Eight p.m., by TheAssociated Press)-The American troops pushed forward their lines at certain points Thursday on the centre of the Rheims-Soissons salient, notwithstanding the resistance of the Germans, who did not give ground on some sectors until they actually had been shot from their positions.

The Germans are desperately clinging to their strongholds at Nesles and in the Bois Meuniere, northeast of Roncheres, but the Americans have gained a hold on the northern edge of the Meuniere Wood. The Nesles Forest is under the MERE BOYS HOLD range of the American heavy guns.







Private Thompson, who now wears the three blue stripes, which show three years service, was turned down several times at first on account of his age, but on going overseas was drafted in the 24th Montreal Hattalion, with which he saw much service. During the Canadians' heroic taking of Passchendaele Ridge, he was wounded in the heel and lost the sight of his right eye. In order to stay with his comrades, Private Thompson neglected his wound and septic poisoning resulted. The young hero had hoped to go back to France; but his eye will debar him from service in the trenches, talthough he still hopes to serve in some capacity.

Private Thompson had only the highest praise for the work of the Y. M. C. A., in giving the men an opportunity to buy comforts which otherwise could not be obtained near the lines, in cheering the boys with various recreations, in distributing free writing paper, and in giving out free mugs of soup and coffee under fire. The soldlers could not get along without the Y. M. C. A., he declared. After being so long among the impoverished people of France, and in England, where only essentials are thought of. Private Thompson found Canada and its peace and luxuries a striking contrast. No admiration, he considered, is warm enough for the heroic French anation. The refugees who leave the shattered remnants of their homes behind them are never heard to complain, any more than are the pollus fighting for them in the trenches. Pte. Thompson is spending his furlough with Mrs. Andrew Boyd.
