WILLIAM SMITHSON, who was a native of Yorkshire, England. When about nineteen years of age he was converted to God and in a few months after, at Thirsk, connected himself with the Methodist Church. In 1822 or 1823 he commenced to warn sinners to "flee from the wrath to come." He was received by the Conference of 1825 as a candidate for the Ministry, and from that period until his death, for forty one years, was incessantly engaged in the prosecution of his great work. His first appointment was to the Shetland Isles, and the next year, 1826, he was removed to a Circuit in the London District About the first of May, 1827, he left L ndon for Saint John, having been appointed to the Province of New Brunswick, then a field of purely Missionary labour. He was stationed in Portland, St. John, at the time of the cholera visitation in 1834. By a remarkable coincidence, twenty years after, when the cholera again raged in the city, he was filling the same appointment ; and without

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intermission, by day and by night, he braved the pestilence and tracked the cholera-stricken city, whenever or wherever duty called him, to the homes of the rich or the poor, of the people of his own charge or of strangers. The last three years of his public life were spent in the Halifax District, of which he was Chairman. He was eminently distinguished for catholicity of spirit, for great singleness of purpose, and for unwearied zeal in the cause of God. Possessing a naturally cheerful disposition, and much of the power of true. religion, he thoroughly enjoyed life and carried sunshine into every circle in which he moved. He loved his work, and was permitted to engage in it until the last. At the close of the Monday evening prayer meeting he was struck with paralysis, lingered through the night, but never spoke, and at a quarter past ten on Tuesday morning, the 15th of May, passed calmly away to the rest of Heaven. His departure was translation rather than death, and his own desire, often expressed, was fully realized,-"My body with my charge lay down. And cease at once to work and live."

What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Contingent and Home Mission Fund ?

#### VANSWER.

1. In view of the crisis of affairs affecting this fund, the Conference requests the Financial Secretary, Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., to introduce to the notice of the Missionary Committee and the British Conference, the financial history of our Conference, especially in relation to the extent to which the work of God, and the interests of the Church, have been promoted by the grants to this Fund from the Committee, together with the necessity which still exists, (owing to the purely missionary character of much of our work.) for a continuance

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of the kind assistance which has hitherto been given by the Parent Conference.

2. The Conference would call the serious attention of our Church and congregations to the large deficiencies of the Ministers on the dependent Circuits, amounting this year to nearly *five thousand dollars*, which there are no funds to meet; and would also express its deep regret that the applications for aid, in the cases of severe personal and domestic affliction, brought under the notice of the Committee, could recive little more than *thirteen per cent*. on the amounts recommended by the District Meetings to be granted.

3. That, in the opinion of the Conference, the time has come to bring directly and fully before our people the claims of Home Missions, by holding a Home Missionary meeting on all our Circuits this year. Financial District meetings are therefore directed to make all necessary arrangements for the accomplishment of this object.

4. That the cordial thanks of the Conference he presented to the Treasurers of this fund; and also to Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., Financial Secretary of the Conference, for his valued services in this department of our finance, and for his faithful attention to the matters entrusted to him for negotiation with the British Conference and its Committees.

5. The thanks of the Conference are cordially given to Rev. James Taylor, Secretary of the Fund, and of the Com-, mittee of Distribution, for his diligent and faithful services for the past year.

## BOOK ROOM AND PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN. Question XV.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the affairs of the Book Room and the *Provincial Wesleyan*?

ANSWER. 1. The Conference expresses its gratification that the affairs of the Book Room, are, to some degree, in an improving state. It cannot be expected to become all that we desire, or obtain permanent prosperity, unless our brethren are, one and all, disposed to put forth still more earnest and united efforts to secure for it increasing patronage. The Conference would bespeak for this important institution of the Church, the kind consideration and support of our people generally.

2. The Conference regrets that the business aspect of the *Provincial Wesleyan* Office is very unfavorable, owing chiefly to the large amounts of unpaid subscriptions. A radical change is called for, and is essential to its present relief and future success. It is therefore, *Resolved*—That, in the opinion of the Conference, the *Provincial Wesleyan* cannot be sustained unless the yearly subscriptions are punctually paid. The Conference directs that the price of the paper from January 1, 1867, shall, in all cases, be paid in advance,

and that the paper shall be sent only to such subscribers as shall comply with the rule.

3. The Ministers are requested to give their attention to the collection of the arrears due on the paper up to the present time, and, as speedily as they can, make remittances to the Book Steward and Editor.

4. The respectful thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. John McMurray, for his unremitting attention to the interests of our Book Room, and Wesleyan Office, and for his faithful discharge of the varied, important and onerous duties of Book Steward and Editor for the past year.

## • PARSONAGE AID FUND. as study sid

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What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Parsonage Aid Fund ?

## ANSWER.

1. The Conference, having ascertained that since the formation of this Fund in 1862, twelve new Parsonages have been creeted, five houses have been purchased, and six have been entirely relieved from the burden of debt, securing, with the assistance of grants from this Fund, a large outlay on the part of our people, would strongly recommend this most important object to the favourable consideration of our members and congregations, since it is extremely desirable that every Circuit to which a married preacher is appointed, should have a comfortable Parsonage, free from the encumbrance of debt. 2. In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a Parsonage, it shall be necessary, in order to obtain a grant in aid of such a purchase from the Parsonage Aid Fund, for the parties to communicate with the Secretary of the Fund, and furnish all the required particulars : and until the permission of the Committee of the Fund is given, the purchase of the property is not to be completed.

(2.) That in every case when a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear that with the assistance of the grant, the property shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt. e the Cost

on Parsonages; (1.), Applications for grants can only be received from Circuits where there has been a distinct charge upon the Circuit accounts, and a claim upon the Contingent Fund for rent, das interest: a dain armen andereland) adi mall'. S

(2.) Satisfactory evidence must be presented to the Committee that with the assistance of the grant sought to be obtained, and the local effort, the debt shall be liquidated, and all charges for rent or interest shall cease.

4th. No grants can be made from this Fund, to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in repairs and alterations to Parsonages, or for the purpose o assisting in the erection of outbuildings in connection with Parsonages for which no grant is obtained.

5th. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District meetings, either Financial or Regular, before it can be considered by the Committee. 6th. The Treasurer of this Fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts, until he shall have received satisfactory evidence upon the following points, viz :--

(1.) That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan. (2.) That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available and secured, so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge for rent or interest. (3.) A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of mortgage, judgment, widow's thirds, or otherwise.

## QUESTION XVII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Mount Allison Educational Institutions?

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#### OUT VOITU I.-THE ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.

1. That while the Conference fully recognizes the serious loss to which its educational enterprize has been subjected, by the late consuming fire at Sackville, it offers its adoring gratitude to the Most High, that the destruction of property was not greater, and that no loss of human life was involved in that calamitous conflagration.

2. That the Conference learns with a high degree of satisfaction that, notwithstanding the sudden and severe pressure brought to bear upon the educational resources of the Mount Allison Institutions by the burning of the Male Academy, yet through the well-devised plans of Dr. Pickard, the faithful and valued Principal, aided by the cordial cooperation of the Academical Staff, the regular educational work of the year was but slightly interrupted, and has been, in due time, effectively conducted to a successful termination.

3. That the Conference rejoices in the growing efficiency and prosperity of the Ladies' Branch, and believes that the arrangements made for its working during the ensuing year, will fully sustain its high reputation, and justly entitle it to general and cordial patronage. That the Conference tenders its earnest thanks to Dr. Pickard, for the most valuable services which he has rendered to the Church during the past year, in a difficult position, amid circumstances as trying as they were unforseen, and in which he has strikingly displayed those qualities of unwearied diligence, untiring energy and penetrating sagasity, for which, during many laborious years, he has been so highly esteemed. The Conference assures Dr. Pickard and his able co-adjutors at Mount Allison, of its high appreciation of their educational labours, of its prayerful sympathy with them beneath their weighty responsibilities, and of its earnest desire to strengthen their hands in every practicable way.

5. That the Conference deems that the Board of Trustees of Sackville Academy rightly judged of the requirements of the emergency brought upon them by the loss of the Male Academy building, and truly subserved the best interests of the great educational work of the Church, by the wisdom and promptitude of their measures for the reconstruction of the burned academical edifice; and that the Conference notes with unfeigned pleasure and thankfulness the liberal, and, in in some instances, most munificent response made to the appeal of the Trustees for help, by large-hearted friends and a sympathizing public.

6. That the Conference, having ascertained that the sum, of twenty thousand dollars, additional to what has already been subscribed toward the erection of the new edifice, would not only complete and furnish that building, but also entirely free the Institution from debt; and baving been informed by its President, Dr. Scott, that in a general and successful effort to raise this sum, the Committee in London may be relied upon for one-fourth of this amount; and having. moreover, considered the immense advantage likely to accrue to those Institutions by being placed in a position of perfect freedom from pecuniary embarrassment, determines to put forth the most strenuous efforts, and to make the most earnest appeals to all its friends in the Lower Provinces, to ensure the accomplishment of this most desirable and necessary result.

#### II .--- THE COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENT.

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That the Conference is much pleased to learn that Sackville College has been in effective operation during the year; and records anew its strong conviction that the vigorous development of this department of its educational euterprize is imperatively necessary to the full discharge of its obligations to the Church and the world.

#### III, -THE THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

1. That the Conference has received with much satisfaction the reports of the Theological Professor and of the Examining Committee, and is thereby more than ever confirmed in the conviction that great advantages must result to our Connexion from the efficient maintenance of this department.

2. That the very cordial thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented to the Rev. C. DeWolfe, D. D., for bis valuable services as Theological Professor during the past year, together with the full assurance of our deep interest in his work, and of our prayers to Almighty God, that he may receive abundantly the grace needful for his responsible office, and that the students from time to time may come forth from the Institution well qualified to be able ministers of the New Testament.

3. That the Conference is gratified to learn that some progress has been made, through the efforts of the Treasurers of the C F. Allison Professorship Fund, in collecting unpaid subscriptions during the past year; and would still urge upon Superintendents of Circuits the importance of keeping in view any available sums remaining upon the subscription lists, and of endeavouring to collect them without any further delay.

4. That the Conference fully recognizing the prerogative of Almighty God to call whomsoever he may please to the Christian Ministry, rejoices to know that some provision will before long be made, through the appropriation of the Jubilee Committee, to aid pious young men, approved by the Conference as candidates for our work, who may require assistance to prosecute a course of study necessary to fit them for this great work. that some here throu will a absol 6.

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5. That the Conference has learned with great satisfaction, that the Library of the Theological Institution has received some valuable additions during the year, which it would hereby most gratefully acknowledge; and devoutly hopes that through the liberality of friends of the Institution, this library will soon be supplied with such books of reference, &c., as are absolutely necessary for the efficiency of this department.

6. That the Chairman of each District shall make arrangements, at the Financial Meeting of the District, for the examination of young men on probation, and that the course of reading and study shall continue to be as follows, viz :--

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## EDUCATIONAL FUND.

#### QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Educational Fund for Minister's Children?

#### ANSWER.

1. The Conference hails with much gratification a healthy advance in the receipts of the year in behalf of this Fund. and regarding this circumstance as indicative of growing sympathy with this department of our Connexional finance. would with strengthened confidence and expectation anew appeal to our people for their continued and still more generous support.

2. That the Conference re-affirms the Resolutions of last vear, viz :---

(1.) That those senior members of the Conference who do not expect to derive benefit from this Fund in the education of their children, shall pay \$2,00 annually. That all other members of the Fund shall pay an annual subscription of \$3.00, except those who are actually receiving from the Fund, who shall pay \$4.00 per annum.

(2.) That the attention of our people be especially called to this Fund, and that its claims upon their generous support be affectionately and strongly urged in all our congregations.

3. That the Chairmen of the respective Districts be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Fund for the amounts due to the claimants within their charge.

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#### THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

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QUESTION XIX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Children's Fund ?

1. That John Starr, Esq., and Rev. James Taylor, are requested to act as General Treasurers of this Fund, for the ensuing year, and the Rev. Duncan D. Currie as General Secretary.

2. In accordance with the standing rule which makes provision towards the support of the children of our ministers, from a certain rate of contributions in proportion to the membership of the church, it is agreed that for the ensuing year, sixty eight members shall provide the allowance for one child. The following statement has accordingly been prepared, determining the number of children to be allotted, at the Financial District Meetings, to the Circuits, according to rule

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#### ANSWER.

The Conference gratefully accords its thankfulness to God for the deep interest evinced in our Sabbath Schools, and earnestly solicits those zealous and prayerful efforts of our people, which, by the Divine blessing, may augment their number, and secure the early conversion of their children to God.

The Conference adopts the following as a general plan or Constitution for the organization and management of Sabbath Schools, viz :---

1. That Sunday Schools should be strictly religious institutions, as it is only on this ground that the occupation of the Lord's day in tuition can be held to consist with the due observance of the Christian Sabbath; and should be so arranged as not to encroach upon the attendance of teachers and children on the public worship of God.

2. That our schools shall be denominated "Wesleyan Methodist Sabbath Schools."

3. That in those places where any considerable number of the children of our people attend "Union Schools," it is very desirable that an effort should be made to organize such schools into separate Wesleyan Methodist Sabbath Schools.

4. That where it is at all practicable, the Ministers on their respective Circuits should, as frequently as possible, visit, examine and address the children in the Sabbath Schools on the Lord's day.

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5. That it is very advisable that the children should be called together by the Superintendent Minister, either regularly, or as frequently as possible, on the week day, for the purpose of speaking to them more particularly and more directly, upon the early conversion of their souls to God, and that such of them as evince a serious concern for their souls should be encouraged to meet in class.

6. That it is necessary at all times, but especially so now, that our children should be thoroughly instructed in all the doctrines of our Holy Christianity; and that, in pursuance of that object, our Conference Catechisms, in all their three parts, should be used, together with the Holy Bible, and that among the more advanced scholars Bible classes should be instituted.

7. That it is of vital importance that the officers and teachers of our schools should be members of our Society, as well as intellectually qualified for their important duries; and that only where such persons cannot be obtained, the best selection should be made from our congregations to meet the exigency.

8. That a Committee should be formed, chosen from among the teachers, under the supervision of the Circuit Minister, for the purpose of reviewing every book in our libraries, before circulation among our children, and that none be retained but those that accord with our doctrines.

9. That the said Committee should by all means obtain libraries in all our schools, and that the preference be given to such as are published by our own body.

10. That the supervision and right of control in all our Teacher's meetings, etc., should be regarded as, by virtue of office, appertaining to the Superintendent Minister.

### MISSIONARY JUBILEE.

#### QUESTION XXI.

What does the Conference resolve concerning the Jubilee Fund of the Wesleyan Missionary Society?

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That the endowment Fund of the Theological Professorship of Wesley College be aided to the amount of one fourth part of the whole of the Jubilee Fund.
 That of the remaining amount, two tenths shall be invested to aid in meeting the expenses of training candidates for our ministry.
 Three-tenths shall be funded for our general work; one half of the interest that may accuse from this amount to be applied to the support of our Home Missions, and the other half shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Parsonage Aid Fund.
 Three-tenths shall be appropriated to the Conference

(4.) *Three-tenths* shall be appropriated to the Conference Office and Book Room. (5.) The remaining *two-tenths* shall be added to the sum invested for assisting in the education of Minister's children.

2. The Conference enjoins on every Superintendent to use his utmost endeavours to secure the immediate payment of the balance due by subscribers to the Jubilee Fund, that, if possible, the business of this fund may be closed at the Financial District Meetings to be held in the ensuing autumn.

3. That the Chairmon of the several Districts be authorized to receive the sums yet to be collected for this Fand; and they are hereby instructed to forward what they may receive to the General Treasurers, immediately after the Financial meeting in their respective Districts.

### VIII.-QUARTERLY FASTS, ETC.

11. That the days upon which the Quarterly Fasts are to be observed through the Connexion, for the following year, shall be Fridays, Oct 5th, Jan. 4th, March 29th, and June 28th. The Ministers are desired to hold special religious services in their principal Churches, on the Fast days, and to preach on each preceding' Sabbath, a sermon on the revival of the work of God. The Conference directs that at the ensuing Financial District Meetings, very special attention be devoted to a consideration of the spiritual state of the Church, with a view to the adoption of such measures as may be best adapted to promote religious prosperity.

### IX .- CLASSIFICATION OF CIRCUITS.

In regard to a classification of the Circuits embraced in the Conference, the following regulations are adopted, viz :---

1. That the Circuits which receive at least one married preacher each, and meet the full expenditure, including the claims of the Children's Fund, shall be considered as constituting the *First Class*.

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3. That the *Third Class* shall include all other Circuits which are occupied each by a married preacher, and raise annually, towards meeting Circuit expenses, not less than \$400; and also all Circuits to which unmarried men only are appointed, and which meet all the claims for Circuit • expenses, including that for the Children's Fund.

Note.-Every. Circuit in the above class having had the services of an unmarried preacher four years, must be prepared then to receive a married man.

4. All other Circuits shall be considered as constituting *Home Missions*,

The Chairmen of the respective Districts are directed to call the attention of the approaching Financial District Meetings to these regulations.

NOTE.—The foregoing classification is one which regards the *financial concerns* of the Circuits, and not at all the standing of the ministers employed on those Circuits.

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### PASTORAL ADDRESS

### TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

### DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Assembled in our Annual Conference, we gladly avail ourselves of this opportunity of conveying to you the assurance of our undiminished regard for your welfare. Our interests are inseparably connected with yours. In your joys we share, and in all your sorrows we sympathize. We have no greater joy than to know that you walk in the truth.

We are living and acting amid eventful scenes. Changes are going on fraught with the most important issues, and destined to influence largely the history of our country and of our race .- changes which in some directions may occasion temporary embarrassment, and it may be, for a time, financial pressure, but which, under the guidance of "men of understanding to know what Israel should do," and under the higher control of Him who makes all human events to subserve His gracious designs, will work together for good, and secure to us valuable and permanent advantages. We have faith in the progressive character of God's purposes in reference to our world. As in ancient and inspired prophetic vision, the mystic chariot of Providence moves an ongst the nations of the earth with awfully lofty sweep, and with apparently complicated course ; but there is no retrograde motion. It is straight onward to the brightness of the coming time.

On the eve, it may be, of national upheaving and worldwide commotion, we are called upon to plead with unwonted fervour for the peace of our country, and for the defence of our beloved Sovereign. The safety of our empire and the

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stability of our throne are not secured so much by military prowess or diplomatic wisdom, as by that righteousness which exalteth any nation, and by the favor of God, which is the strength and stay of any people. And we feel how appropriate, in this connection, is the language of humble acknowledgment,—" We do not present our humble supplications before thee for our righteousness, but for Thy great mercies." To most of the Connexional Funds the contributions have been considerably increased; and many departments of our work have been, during the past year, strengthened and consolidated.

No part of the Conferential deliberations is approached with more profound and prayerful solicitude than that which has reference to the work of God in the several Circuits of the Conference, and to the results of the year, so far as they can be tabulated. After filling up vacancies occasioned by death and otherwise, an increase of more than two hundred and forty is reported in the membership of the church—of those who have given themselves first unto God, and then unto us by the will of God.

But our accessions and advancement have not been equal to our agencies or our anticipations. We would not undervalue the work of the past, for one soul is worth more than a world. But, with an ecclesiastical organization admirably adapted to all the purposes for which it was framed,—a system of appliances, for evangelistic effort, thoroughly tested and approved,—a grand and glorious message of a present, free, full, and perfect salvation,—we have a right to expect great results. The present spiritual condition of our Church—and it is no alleviation of the painful fact that the same statement is applicable to other religious communities—is low and unsatisfactory. We lack power,—moral power to move the souls of perishing men, and to impress the world around us. We mourn the absence of that continued revival influence which has in former days rested upon, and which ought still to be regarded as the normal state of, the Christian Church. Memories of a more effective ministry still linger amongst us. Our fathers have told us of the work done in their days, in the times of old, when the sinners by hundreds were pierced to the heart, and when multitudes of converted men were daily added to the church. Must the glory for ever depart from our sanctuaries, and from our solemn assemblies? And yet it were better that we should perish from the earth, than that we lose forever that ancient, revival, soul-saving power, which accompanied the ministry of our founders and fathers. We are assured, dear brethren, that you will join with us in the earnest prayer that God would, in mercy to us and to the perishing ones around us, and for his own honor and glory—

vd budgetange "Haste again those days of grace."

This year being the centenary of American Methodism, we cannot allow it to pass away without some special recognition. One hundred years ago the frail sapling of Methodism was planted upon this continent, and now its shadow fills the land. With not less than ten millions of people gathered into its numerous sanctuaries, or living beneath its influence, and communicants outnumbering any other section of the Protestant Church, we may well ask, with gratitude, and wonder, and joy, "what hath God wrought?" We cannot better commemorate this centennial year than by faith and prayer; and have resolved to set apart the month of October, in all our Circuits, for united supplication for the fresh outpouring of the spirit of God.

While endeavouring to meet the exigencies of the times, as they may arise, and to adapt ourselves to altered circumstances in which we are placed, we can attempt no new message or mission. The atonement is our theme, the object of

While men set for the defence of the truth are proving recreant to their solemn trust, stumbling in their intellectual pride at the wisdom of God, as revealed in the offering made for sin, attempting to move the foundation of Christianity from the "Cross and prison," to the lowly birth and human life of our blessed Saviour, or superseding, by dreary rationalism or excessive ritualism, the "truth as it is in Jesus," we can only, with greater tenacity, cling to, and, with the utmost clearness, proclaim, the central, fundamental themes of our holy religion,—"to wit, that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them, and hath committed unto us the word of reconciliation."

Aiming at doctrinal fidelity, we would, not less strenuously, strive for the promotion of practical godliness. We have heavenly laws for earthly life; and habitual disregard of these obligations, is incompatible with the sacredness of professed discipleship. There can, in this matter, be no compromise; and there should be, on the part of the avowed friends and followers of Jesus, no moment of hesitation. The mission of the church is to act upon the world, and by an all-pervading, all-subduing moral power, to overcome the world ; but in too many instances the world has been acting upon the church, leavening it with an unholy influence, lowering its status, silencing its testimony, paralizing its energies, and arresting its march of conquest. Each one is responsible for influence, and what we are singly, the church will be collectively. We have power to hinder or to help. Then, "if there be any consolation in Christ. if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any bowels and mercies," if any consciousness of high and hallowed obligation, if any passion for the salvation of souls, or for the

glory of God, "fulfil ye" our "joy," and, in clear, unequivocal testimony for the Lord Jesus, give evidence of the power and purity of the religion you profess, "that you may be blameless and harmless, the sons of God without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom ye shine as lights in the world."

"God buries his workmen, but carries on His work." From our ranks one eminently devoted and single-minded minister—the late Rev. Wm. Smithson—has passed away to the rest of heaven. To him, the brief, but comprehensive, record of Apostolic worth, may be emphatically applied,— "he was a good man, full of faith, and of the Holy Ghost." His oft-expressed desire was fully realized,

### "My body with my charge lay down, And cease at once to work and live."

From the ranks of our membership, accessions are made, year by year, to the ransomed throng—"the dead in Christ." Can we mourn their departure? Can the husbandman sorrow for the loss of the golden grain, which ripened in his fields, when, cut down by the gleaming sickle, and gathered in precious sheaves by the joyful reapers, it has been safely garnered? Even so we joy "according to the joy of harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil." Our solicitude is that the thinned ranks upon earth may be filled up, and that others may be "baptized for the dead."

While regretting the comparative loss of the services of one aged and revered Minister, the Rav. T. H. Davies, who assumes a Supernumerary position, and the absolute necessity on the part of two dear brethren, for resting at least for one year, from the exhaustive toil of circuit work, it has been a source of no ordinary joy, that we have been called upon to set apart, by the laying on of the hands of the

The intercourse which we are permitted to enjoy, from year to year, in coming together from different parts of our widely extended work, always hallowing and stimulating, has, on this occasion, been of deepened and intensified interest, from the presence of honoured Ministers, who have come to us as representatives of other sections of the Methodistie Church. We have been favoured, by appointment of the British Conference, with the Presidency of the Rev. Dr. Scott, who, before his arrival, was not unknown, by reputation; and whose courteous, firm, and judicious administration of official duty, faithful and authoritative exposition of New Testament Theology, and narratives of evangelical toil and triumph, thrilling the hearts of all who listened, have been of incalculable advantage to our youthful Conference, and strengthening and refreshing to all our spirits.

We have regretted the absence of our beloved brother, the Rev. Dr. Wood, who was appointed to visit us as Representative of the Canadian Conference, but we have cordially welcomed the Rev. Wellington Jeffers, D.D., and the Rev.Richard Jones, who came to us with the fraternal greetings of their brethren, and with encouraging statements of the rapid extension of the work of God in their own land. They have been deputed to ascertain the mind of this Conference in reference to, and to initiate any such incipient measures as may be deemed most desirable for a closer union of the two Conferences, in the vast connexional church, including the whele of British American territory, extending from Newfoundland to British Columbia.

We have also had amongst us, several brethren from the United States-one of whom, the Rev. Dr. Butler, is the pioneer of the American Methodist Mission in Northern

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India. We have listened with unspeakable pleasure to their detailed accounts of the stupendous efforts put forth by the Methodist Episcopial Church, in the erection of sanctuaries, the endowment of collegiate and theological Institutions, and the noble centenary movement, celebrated amid almost general revival influence and power from on High.

It is earnestly hoped that our usual recommendations in relation to the Book Room and the *Provincial Wesleyan*, will not pass unnoticed, or be regarded as a mere matter of form; but that, in this age of spurious theology and pernicious literature, our beloved people will place within the reach of their families, a class of reading, purer in its character, and healthier in its influence.

The present year has been rendered marked and memorable in the history, of our Educational Institutions, by the destruction of the Male Academy buildings. Erected in the first place, mainly by the munificence of the late C. F. Allison, Esq., and for nearly a quarter of a century, under the able administration of the esteemed Principal, the Rev. Dr. Pickard, conducted with acknowledged efficiency, the Sackville Academy has done for our church, and for these colonies generally, invaluable service in the cause of education. We could not, therefore, without being recreant to a trust bequeathed to us by its sainted Founder, and to our responsibilities for the promotion of religious education, leave it in its ashes. We rejoice that the appeal in its behalf has met with a liberal response, and that a building, with increased accommodations, is in course of erection. Having been informed that a sum of twenty thousand dollars, in addition to the amount already subscribed, would complete the erection, with its full equipment for academical work, and also liquidate the entire amount of debt resting upon the several Institutions at Mount Allison, and that one-fourth of that

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amount would be contributed by the British Conference, we have resolved that a most strenuous effort shall be made for the accomplishment of this important object. With united purpose, and the blessing of God, we shall see our educational establishment at Mount Allison, with its Academies for our sons and for our daughters, with collegiate and theological departments, standing where it ought to stand, free from pecuniary embarrassment, respected by the country, and enshrined in the affections of our own people.

"Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you. Amen."

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# THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WEALWAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We welcome the address from you which has been read in our Conference, and cordially reciprocate the sentiments of esteem and brotherly love which it conveys. We rejoice with you in that fellowship which brings all believers in Christ into one fold, and which constitutes them one catholic church, under their one living Head. "Called in one hope," and having "one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all," we gladly renew our annual token of the "communion of Saints." It is a pledge and a foretaste to us of that richer and more perfect fellowship for which we look in the "city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God."

In view of your own spiritual prosperity, we heartily return the gratulations which you address to us, for the success with which the Head of the church still condescends to crown our labours. We earnestly pray that, both with you and with us, He may yet more abundantly bless the sower's seed, hastening the accomplishment of those lofty purposes of His grace which our past successes, no less than His word of promise, authorize us confidently to expect.

We thank you for the condolence with which you speak of the removal of one with whom you were favoured in holding personal intercourse for a brief season, but who has long held a foremost place in our Connexion. We have bowed in humble submission to the sudden stroke which deprived us of our late President-yours and ours, -so genial in all his intercourse with his brethren, so devout in spirit, so happy in "serving his own generation by the will of God ;" but our natural tears have not been unmingled with joy for the honour which God put upon him in death as well as in life. Our sorrow has been followed by earnest resolves to follow more diligently the steps of the "elders" who have "obtained a good report," and by renewed acts of self-dedication to the hallowed service of our common Lord. While our brethren and fathers, one after another, in such quick succession, pass away to their eternal reward, we feel that the best tribute we can pay to their memory is, to prosecute with all the more energy the work which they loved so well, and which, as a sacred trust, they bequeath to us.

We share with you in the conviction that Methodism, so long as true to her origin and earlyspirit, is ,, everywhere the uncompromising witness to the , Faith once delivered to the

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We participate in your gladness, also, in having been favoured with "outpourings of the spirit during the past year." though the result has not been seen in an increase of the numbers in your societies. We, on our side, notwithstanding many signs that the "God of Jacob is with us," can only report a comparatively small increase for the year. But we are not disposed to measure success, either for you or for ourselves, simply by the addition, more or less rapid, of members to our ranks. There are successive stages in erecting the temple-stages in which the activities and aegncies appropriate for one day are not precisely those required by the exigencies of another; times wherein, to the eye of the architest, the word accomplished "without observation," is no less important than that which by its conspicuousness catches the eye and engages the attention of every beholder. The pauses of a skilful captain should be considered no less carefully than his boldest exploits. In estimating the effectiveness of sincere " workers with God," it is needful to bear in mind the inereasing difficulties with which the church has ever to contend in communities intellectually enlightened, but not truly christianized—evangelized, but not converted. "Antichrists" are not less numerous, nor are they less seductive, as the world grows older. On the contrary, the spreading worldlymindedness of the times, the subtile antinomianism which springs up wherever the gospel is proffered only to be neglected, the scepticism which owes its origin to evil passions rather than to the presence of real difficulties in comprehending the "truth as it is in Jesus,"—these obstacles to our progress may possibly be greater, or are to be met with at more numerous points than formerly; and the Church of Christ may be compelled to take tardy steps, or at times even to come to an apparent stand-still, though the power she is really putting forth is no less than in days of visible prosperity.

Yet this very fact makes us desire the more ardently, for you and for ourselves, that quickening from the Holy One, which shall be at once the remedy for all our defects, and the means of our advancing, in the spirit of the first christians, to rapid conquests in the Redeemer's cause. We recognize this as the one need of the church. The more intimate presence of the Holy Spirit with us would soon show itself in outward fruits-in a more earnest manner of preaching, in addresses that should reach the hearts of our hearers, in a more prayerful study of Holy Scripture, and in a less dependence upon any mere instrument which God sees fit to use in "bringing His sons to glory." All such instruments, indeed, even the best of them-our sanctuaries, our ordinances, our religious organizations-cease to be of real value in proportion as our reliance is placed upon them. Let us but give God the glory for their efficiency, and the truths chiefly insisted on by our Fathers in this ministry, if urged in their soul-seeking fervour, are still able to pull down

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It has given us deep pleasure to recognize in your Jubilee celebration the evidences of a spiritual life and joy which have "abounded unto the riches of your liberality." We have accepted for the Master's use a noble "gift" from our own people—a gift in our view doubly precious as coming from those who "first gave their own selves to the Lord, and to us by the will of God." The results of our Jubilee movement we trust to see more or less realized, both at home and abroad, in every department of our work.

That your Educational Institutions continue to prosper, is also a cause to us of unfeigned satisfaction. Next in importance to vital godliness in the Christian ministry, must be reckoned its intellectual vigour; and we join with you in hoping, especially in these days of so rapid advancement in all the departments of philosophy and science, that a godly ministry among you may be also a ministry of advanced thought, ripe intelligence, and wisdom. No acquirement will compensate for the absence of piety in the pastor, but the *next* gift, doubtless, is the skill of him who can "rightly divide the word of truth," and who can place it clearly and agreeably before those who listen to him.

We have appointed as your next President, the Rev. George Scott, a brother beloved, whose services to the cause of Christ, in other lands and in our own, you will not need to be informed of, and from whose visit you will doubtless derive much satisfaction and advantage. We also appoint the Rev. James England as Co-Delegate.

May the Holy Spirit be abundantly granted to you by the Head of the church, and may He give you manifest tokens of His gracious presence in all your solemn assemblies, guiding your counsels, and prospering all your holy enterprizes

We now again commend you, dear Brethren, to the grace of God, and to him from whom we have received our high commission. We live in the joyous expectation of seeing. Him, together with you, in the day of our "manifestation," and of sitting down in His kingdom to enjoy the common reward of our common faith—the one rest from our widely scattered labours.

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### ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

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OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

### REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

Permitted in the good providence of God to convene in Annual Conference, we hasten to discharge what we have ever esteemed our first and most pleasing duty, of conveying to you, the honoured head of the Wesleyan family, our accustomed expression of filial veneration and esteem.

The high gratification afforded by your Address—so well suited to encourage and instruct,—was greatly enhanced by the presence, in our midst, of the Rev. George Scott, D.D., of whose appointment, as the President of our Conference, it conveyed the official intelligence. The designation of so distinguished a servant of God to this position, we cordially

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given, of the deep and affectionate interest you take in our vouthful Connexion. From what we could not but know of his life and labours. as identified with Weslevan Missionary enterprise, we were strongly prepossessed in his favour; and from the moment of his arrival on our shores, to the present, whether we consider the eminent service which he has rendered in our various pulpits, the administrative ability and Christian courtesy marking his performance of Presidential duty, or the genial spirit pervading his entire intercourse with us, we have been led to regard him as being in a more than ordinary degree, "a chosen vessel unto God." While grateful to God for His great goodness in bringing him to us in safety and health, we earnestly pray that in due time he may be restored to you in the enjoyment of the same blessings; and that there may yet be awarded to him, by approving Heaven, many years of increasing happiness to himself, and growingly successful consecration to those sacred interests which lie so near his heart.

The hallowed joy of our session has been much increased by the presence of a Deputation from our sister Conference in Canada, consisting of the Rev. Wellington Jeffers, D.D., Co-Delegate, and the Rev. Richard Jones, Ex-President. The object of their visit was, not only to assure us of the fraternal affection and sympathy of the Methodist Church of Canada, but to propose, what we hope may be as practicable as it is desirable, such a consolidation of our entire mutual work and interests, as may result in the constitution of what may be properly designated, "The Wesleyan Methodist Church of British North America." To the christian and manly utterances of these honoured Brethren, upon this deaply interesting subject, we have listened with unqualified pleasure; and admitting, as we unbesitatingly do, the soundness of the principle upon which their proposal is made, we have, after due consideration, appointed the Rev. Matthew Richey, D.D., and the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D., as a deputation to the Canadian Conference of 1867, for the purpose of conferring with them on this highly important subject.

We have also been favoured with the presence of the Rev. Dr. Butler, of the New England Conference, accompanied by several other more or less prominent Ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States. They have not been the less welcome from the circumstance of their having come of their own free will, to express their admiration and love for English Wesleyan Methodism, and from a desire to witness for themselves its operations in these British Provinces.

You will rejoice to know that in various parts of the wide field over which our labours extend, there have been experienced during the year "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord," so that with somewhat of the joy assured unto those who sow in tears, it is our privilege to report an encouraging advance in the number of our own membership.

Convinced "that the word of faith" which we preach is the "word of the Lord which abideth forever," and strong in the persuasion that when and wherever that faith is proclaimed as it was by Holy Apostles, and by our sainted Methodist Fathers, it cannot fail to be "the power of God unto salvation," we, at this time, feel our largest need to be a repetition of those pentecostal effusions of Divine influence which signalized the earlier period of our church's history. Adoring Him, whose prerogative it is to give unto the ehurch apostles and prophets, pastors and teachers, for the raising up within the pale of Methodism, in modern times, and in days of old, a succession of men, whose names, beeau

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cause of their high daring for Christ and the souls of men, neither heaven nor earth will suffer to perish.—we fervently invoke for ourselves those richer investments of Divine wisdom, life, and power whereby their labours have been rendered productive of such glorious results.

Through the sparing merey of God our death roll this year is brief. One of our aged ministers, the Rev. William Smithson, who was last year compelled by growing infirmities to seek, in a Supernumerary relationship to us, a comparative retirement from the more active work of a Methodist Preacher, to which he had been for so many years both earnestly and usefully devoted, has within a few weeks realized the oft repeated desire of his heart, and "ceased at once to work and live."

The name of another venerable and deservedly esteemed member of our Conference, the Rev. T. H. Davies, who a few years since sustained, with credit to himself, and to the entire satisfaction of his brethren, the highest Conferential honors it was in their gift to bestow, has, in compliance with his own request, most reluctantly preferred, been placed this year on the list of our Supernumeraries.

Thirteen young men, of more than ordinary promise, have been set apart by ordination to the full work of the ministry; and six others have been received on trial as candidates for that sacred office.

Among other cheering tokens of Divine favour resting upon our operations, not only are all our Connexional Funds in a state of healthy development, but we are pleased to observe that the contribution of our Conference on behalf of the Missionary Society exceeds that of last year to the extent of four hundred and eighty dollars.

In view of the distressing fact that, in consequence of our having from the period of our organization as a Conference,

ear by year, extended the sphere of our efforts, and largely nultiplied the number of our agents, our financial income, as derived from both local and foreign sources, has failed to mee our annual expenditure to the amount of from \$5,000 to \$6,000, we have this year, after prayerful consideration, resolved to inaugurate a systematic appeal to our congregations, resembling as nearly as possible your own Home Missionary effort. Under these circumstances we feel no small solicitude that the intimated reduction in the metsure of parental support we have hitherto received, may be for the present delayed.

Of the heavy calamity that, in the permissive Providence of God has befallen us, in the destruction by fire of the Male Academy at Sackville, you have heard ; and you will learn with thankfulness that, amid all the sadness and perplexity occasioned by this seemingly untoward event, we have been greatly comforted by the practical sympathy which has been evoked throughout the bounds of our Conference. Despite the disadvantages unavoidably resulting from this afflictive disturbance of their arrangements, the condition of our Educational Institutions is such, that whether we turn to the theological class, the collegiate or academic departments, we are constrained to record our devout gratitude to God, for the increasing measure of prosperity He has been pleased to bestow upon this truly important part of our great work. Already measures have been devised and entered upon, in whose accomplishment, under the Divine blessing, we hope ere long to witness the completion of an edifice, in many respects superior to its prodecessor, within whose walls the sons of our church may for years to come be forwarded in the pursuit of a thorough and christian education. This enterprise will necessarily devolve weighty responsibility upon us as a Connexion; but strong in the conviction that we have been

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divinely directed to this issue, we have firmly resolved to trust in God and do our duty.

In this connection we would tender our most earnest thanks to the Missionary Committee for their liberal offer of \$5000 towards this object, and feel assured that their generous proposal will be gratefully appreciated by all our people, and operate as a most powerful stimulus to them, in their efforts to free the Institutions of learning from all pecuniary embarrassment.

We have requested the Rev. George Scott, D.D., our beloved President, to act as our Representative in the approaching British Conference.

We have also nominated the Rev. Matthew Richey, D.D., as President, and the Rev. Ingham Suteliffe, as Co-Delegate for the next year.

Nor would we close our communication without expressing the thankfulness of our hearts to Almighty God, under whose favour these lands have ever enjoyed the inestimable blessing of civil and religious liberty, for the preservation of our country inviolate from the threatened assaults of armed hordes of lawless and designing men; and in view of the evils which might have overtaken us, feel our bosoms beat in more perfect unison than ever with the illustrious throne and incomparable institutions of the British realm.

Imploring on your behalf, and that of every interest within the compass of your care, the ceaseless blessing of our exalted and all-powerful Redeemer,
