

ANNUAL MEETING, SAINT DAVID'S CHURCH.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., January 19, 1887.

IN pursuance of a notice posted in the vestibule of this Church for the past four weeks, in terms of the Act of Assembly in such case made and provided, and also from a notice read from the pulpit of the Church last Sabbath at both diets of worship, by the Pastor, the Reverend George Bruce, the meeting was convened, and constituted with prayer.

Rev. GEORGE BRUCE in the Chair.

On motion, Resolved, That Mr. JOHN WILLET be requested to act as Secretary of the Meeting.

The Minutes of last Congregational Meeting was asked for and read, and, on motion, the same were confirmed as read.

The Secretary-Treasurer of Trustees read their REPORT and FINANCIAL STATEMENT, which were, on motion of Mr. P. Chisholm, seconded by Mr. Alex. Watson, received for consideration, and, after consideration, on motion of Mr. James Seaton, Resolved, That the Report be received and adopted.

On motion of Mr. J. Arch. Millian, seconded by Mr. James Manson, that the thanks of the Congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their diligence in the past year, which were tendered to the Chairman of the Board by the Chairman of the Meeting.

The Moderator of Session presented the Annual Report of that Court, and, on motion of Mr. Andrew Malcolm, seconded by Mr. James Scott, the Report was adopted, and the progress intimated in same duly noticed by the Congregation.

Mr. Andrew Dodds presented the Report of the Sabbath School, and, on motion of Mr. John Willet, seconded by Mr. R. C. McIntyre, the Report was received and adopted.

The Report of the I_tadies' Association was read by the Chairman. On motion of Mr. A. Dodds, seconded by Mr. R. Cruikshank, the same was adopted.

The Report of the WILLING WORKERS' SOCIETY was read by Mr. J. Arch. MILLIGAN, and on motion of that gentleman the same was adopted.

The Report of the Young Ladies' Auxiliary Society was read by Mr. A. Malcolm, and on motion of that gentleman, seconded by Mr. Alex. Watson, the same was adopted.

Mr. ROBERT CRUIKSHANK read the Report of the MITE SOCIETY, and on motion of Mr. John Stewart the same was received and adopted.

Mr. ALEXANDER WATSON read the Report of the Young Men's Association, which was received.

The matter of printing the Annual Reports being discussed. On motion of Mr. John Stewart, seconded by Mr. P. Chisholm, that the matter be left to a joint meeting of the Session and Trustees. On motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Bobert Cruikshank, in amendment, that the Reports be printed as read. The amendment was carried.

The Committee to prepare Reports for printing were then appointed, they being the same gentlemen as appointed last

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year, namely, The CHAIRMAN, Messis, John Stewart, Robert Cruikshank and R. C. McIntyre.

On motion, Resolved, That we proceed with the Election of Trustees for the present year by nomination and ballot, and that the number of Trustees for the year be nine.

Mr. A. Dodds moved that for the future the three senior Trustees retire each year, and that the same be not eligible for election for three years. The motion not being seconded, and the Chairman having intimated doubts as to the legality of the motion, it was dropped.

Messrs. George Younger, P. Chisholm, D. Duthie, D. McClelland and Wm. Smith having been appointed Scrutineers, and they having taken up the ballots and counted the same, report that Messrs.

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REPORT OF THE SESSION

SAINT DAVID'S CHURCH, For the Year ending 31st December, 1886.

To the Members and Adherents of St. David's Church:

DEAR BRETHREN :- In presenting you with a Statement of the Congregational life and work, for the past year, we gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity to record our profound gratitude and thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for His mercy and goodness to us since we met in our Annual Meeting, twelve months ago. We who now address you, and you to whom we speak, are the living to praise Him. And for this, as well as for the many mercies with which our lives have been crowned, we would unitedly praise Him in whom we live and move and have our being.

Our loss by death has not been so great in number as in some former years, but we remember none the less the sorrow of those who have been bereaved, and we tender them our sincere and affectionate sympathy. We also recall, with profound sorrow, the removal of one of our number, who has been known and honored in this community and congregation for many years. On the 14th of April, Mr. JAMES ALLAN, one of the first Elders of St. David's Church, and one of the tried and trusted friends of the congregation, was called to rest after a long and painful illness. It is a great comfort to feel that the influence of such lives continues almost undiminished in the affectionate remembrance of those who knew them.

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encouraging and successful, and such as to give us abundant cause for thanksgiving. We have had the evidence of God's presence in the spirit of earnestness in the congregation, and in the willing activity of many in the various departments of Church work. Perhaps in nothing has the presence of the Spirit been more encouragingly and graciously manifest than in the ready and earnest response which has been given in the conversations in reference to personal religion. And the Session earnestly ask the prayers of God's people that this spirit may be deepened and extended amongst us.

With regard to their own immediate work the Session have been able, as was anticipated, by their enlarged numbers, to organize more completely for the oversight of their respective districts. They have been enabled to overtake a greater amount of work more efficiently, as they trust, and with a greater degree of comfort than formerly, when the districts were so large as to be almost beyond their reach.

During the year, as a result of communications between the Session and the Trustees, several joint meetings of the two Boards were held, at which the financial affairs of the congregation were fully considered. The congregation was divided into districts, as it is for Sessional oversight. Each Trustee taking special charge of his own district, and having an Elder associated with him. A general revision of the lists of contributors was made, and decision arrived at that joint meetings should be held quarterly, and at any other time when it may be deemed advisable. There is no doubt that beneficial results will follow this revision and systematising of the work in the temporal affairs of the Church.

The Session would remind the Congregation that system

and regularity are as essential to success in this as in business affairs. The thought that only large contributions are worthy of being given is a most serious mistake. The millions of a national revenue are chiefly made up of very small amounts contributed by the many, as a river is made up of fain drops, one drop may seem of small account, but the withholding of a sufficient number of these drops will dry up the river. Besides, no matter how large cr small the givings of others may be, my giving is a matter of my own personal relation to God. No one can do my praying or sing praise for me, nor give for me, nor do the work which I ought to do for God. The judgment will be to "give to every man according as his work shall be."

In regard to the SABBATH SCHOOL the Session note the resignation of one of their number, Mr. John Stewart, who has filled this very responsible and honorable position for many years with a faithfulness and earnestness which have endeared him to all who are now connected with the school, as well as to the large number who have given service at one time and another to it during these many years The Session desire to place on record their high sense of the value and devotedness of Mr. Stewart's labours; and to join, not only with the Sabbath School, but with the Congregation, in the prayer that the blessing of God may continue to rest upon him and his family. The School is at present in a very encouraging condition, increasing in attendance and interest. And the Session would earnestly ask a more general interest in this most important work by the parents and all members of the Church. A number of the children of the Church are not yet in attendance, and older scholars are too ready to forsake the School.

In reference to the other departments of work there is

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scarcely space to make even the briefest statement. In the Ladies' Association, the Young Ladies' Auxiliary Society, the Mite Society, the Willing Workers, the Collectors for the Bible Society, and the Woman's Home Missionary Society, work has been done which the Session would like exceedingly to specify and acknowledge in behalf of the Congregation, for its value and for the encouragement and strength which these Associations have been to the Congregation, by the earnestness of the members, and by the development of spiritual life among themselves and in the Church. But, as their Reports will be presented, rema k is limited to this single sentence.

The Young Men's Association, though not what we hope it may soon become in numbers, has continued to do excellent service, as the Congregation well know it has done in the past. The want of a proper place of meeting is a very serious hindrance to this Society, as well as to the other Associations, and the young men are setting themselves. with a great deal of energy, to try, as soon as possible, to have this difficulty removed. The Session feel, however, that if the young men of the Church knew how much they could do to develop their own Christian life, as well as to increase the power of the Church, they would take hold of work in greater numbers. Speaking directly, and looking with very deep interest to your growing influence, the Session would affectionately remind each of you that to every one has been given a talent to use for God. What are you doing? What account will you be able to give when the Master comes ?

It will be seen that there is much to encourage us. Still does it not seem that what is achieved is only the beginning. One who was laying down his life in the service of God

said, "Not as though I had already attained." And isthere not need for us, with him, to press forward. Have we all found what Christ would have us to do? Are we doing it? Are we putting off from day to day, till we can do some great thing? And are there not some among us deeply conscious that all is not well with their souls? Are you, too, putting off this great first step till a better time? Remember, not to-morrow, but to-day is the time. Let us all be warned by the events of the year just closed to use those precious opportunities. Soon they will be gone forever! Let us be as men who sow in the spring, not wasting time nor grudging toil, looking to the harvest, and the approving welcome of our Lord.

The Trustees of Saint David's Church beg leave to submit herewith the Auditor's Report for year ending December 31st, 1886.

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The Board think it desirable to show a Comparative Statement for past three years, as follows:

From this statement you will perceive that the collections have been steadily falling off for the past three years, but the contributions are increasing in amount.

We show this year a balance due Maclellan & Co. of \$482.24, against \$512.05 last year, but we have matured bills, due Dec. 31, to amount of \$300. Against the liabilities of overdrawn account and matured bills we have arrears of \$594, all of which, however, cannot be collected.

The Trustees called the Session in for conference with them as to the financial condition of the Church, and the first joint meeting of Trustees and Session was held on the evening of the 22nd Sept. last. At their meetings it was decided to send circular letters to all members on Roll, except wives of husbands already contributing. These circulars brought the financial condition of the Church to your notice, and asked for increased subscriptions from present subscribers who desire to give more, and subscriptions from those who have not yet given, but who may feel it a duty to aid the Church.

Up to the 30th September last the number of contributors on the Roll was 132. Since that date, in response to circular and personal visitation by Trustees, four old subscribers have increased, and thirty-three new contributors have been secured, making the number of contributors on the Roll at present 165.

The Trustees are much pleased to report so many of the congregation availing themselves of the privilege to contribute by envelopes, and take this opportunity of recording their appreciation of the kindly feeling extended to them during the late visitation of the congregation.

The Trustees feel that their successors in office can, with due care, watchfulness and diligence, bring up the revenue of the Church to a point which will make expenditure and revenue balance.

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ANNUAL REPORT of THE LADIES' ASSOCIATION OF ST. DAVID'S CHURCH.

Your Secretary has great pleasure in presenting the second Annual Report of the Ladies' Association of St, David's Church, and, while the membership has not increased as rapidly as we would have desired, yet there has been a steady growth, and the blessing of God has been manifestly given. It is a matter to be regretted that more have not availed themselves of the privilege of joining the Society, as the members who have taken part in the work have proved that God is not only the hearer, but the answerer of prayer, and that "where two or three are gathered together in His name, there is He in their midst."

Some of the subjects studied at our meetings were "The personal indwelling of the Holy Spirit," "Trust in God," "Witnessing for Jesus," "Home work in relation to other

work," "Christian armour," &c., &c.

The lesson to be studied is announced at the previous meeting. Subjects for prayer during the month are also taken.

Quite a number of requests for prayer have been sent to the Society, many of which, we have reason to believe,

have been answered.

The Committees appointed to visit the different Public Institutions, have reported thirty-eight visits to Old Ladies' Home, thirty-six to General Public Hospital, twenty-two to Marine Hospital. In visiting these Institutions, the pleasure with which we are received by the inmates is very noticeable. Reading, prayer and singing are taken part in, and in conversation we trust that the words dropped for the Master are not in vain.

Through the kindness of friends the ladies were enabled to provide warm clothing for one of the inmates of the Marine Hospital. Money to the amount of nine dollars

was donated to another person.

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The average attendance for last year was thirteen, this year fourteen, showing an increase of one.

Again we would invite the ladies of the congregation, who have not yet associated themselves with us in this work, and pray that in the year we have just entered God will work mightily in our midst.

Annual Meeting, Jan. 6th, 1887.

The Secretary of the Young Ladies' Auxiliary Society of St. David's Church begs to present the following Report for the year ending Jan. 8th, 1887. The meetings held during the year just closed have, on the whole, been better attended than those of the previous year. Through the months of June, July and August we held no meetings, owing to a great many being away for the summer holidays. During the year we have held twenty-seven meetinge, the average attendance of these being nine. The number of members is at present sixteen, four having, owing to various causes, left during the year, which vacancy we hope to see more than filled during the year 1887.

The number of families receiving aid from our Society, during the past year, was ten, while in the previous year there were only six. For these families a number of articles of clothing have, from time to time, been made and given out. The number of articles sent out during the year has amounted to 95, while last year we only sent out 45.

The members of our Society again extend their heartfelt thanks to the several ladies in the congregation who have aided them, during the past year, by very liberal donations, also to our pastor, Rev. Mr. Bruce, for his advice and kind encouragement at all times. The number of donations has

amounted to eight.

While the work of the Society is to provide clothing for those in need, we have, during the past two months, turned our attention to another branch of work. As our work on hand was finished, and we had heard of no other persons requiring clothing, we commenced doing some fancy work for a sale proposed to be held about Easter, the proceeds of which are intended to go towards aiding the Y. This Society was organized the 6th January, A. D. 1885, its object being entirely the advancement of Foreign Mission work. Ladies of this congregation, and others who are interested, send in articles to make up, and the money we receive for doing this is used entirely for our Mission purposes.

Honorary members (of which we have this year 13) are admitted upon the payment of 25 cents per annum. Working members 10 cents upon joining, and one cent per week thereafter.

Though the meetings have not been so largely attended this year as in the previous one, yet the members have done their best to make it a successful year.

During this year the Society has held 28 meetings, the average attendance being seven. No meetings were held during the months of June, July and August. Work was resumed upon September 14th.

During the year the Society held a Concert, which realized \$20.28.

We are now sending \$25 a year to Mrs. Morton, at Trinidad, to pay for educating a scholar for future work in our Church.

Our meetings have been rendered very interesting by several ladies of the congregation attending and reading to us, also by the receipt of letters from Mrs. Morton, relative to the scholar whose education our efforts are advancing.

Not having enough order work to keep us busy, we have

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decided to have a table of work for sale on the evening of the Annual Sociable of this Church.

We desire to thank several ladies and gentlemen—some of whom have sent us very liberal donations—for their kindly aid.

While thanking other members of the congregation we must not forget our pastor and his esteemed wife, who have shown their interest in, and encouraged, this Society ever since its organization. And allow me also, on behalf of the Society, to remind the many young ladies in the congregation that there is still room in the vestry for many more, on Friday evenings, than attend our meetings at present.

In closing let me express the gratitude of the Society for the measure of success attending our work of the past year, and the hope that our members and usefulness may still be increased, and through the help of God we may indeed be "Willing Workers."

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REPORT OF THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION OF SAINT DAVID'S CHURCH for 1886.

Early in the year, now closed, several meetings were held, but owing to the difficulty of getting a sufficient number of young men together to conduct business, it was decided to suspend meetings during the summer months.

In September last a meeting was called by our pastor, Rev. Mr. Bruce, which met at his house. The meeting was comparatively large and quite enthusiastic. It was felt by all that the lack of proper accommodation was the greatest hindrance to our success, in the way of meetings at least. Through the kindness of Mr. Bruce we were permitted to hold several meetings at his house, all of which were better attended than those we have held in the Lower Vestry or School Room.

In reference to the lack of accommodation I may say we have taken some action in the matter, with the hope that this hindrance may be removed ultimately. The series of Lectures and Concerts now in progress have this for their object. We are also about opening a subscription list amongst the members of the Association, on the same principle as that which governs the Mite Society, monthly or quarterly payments, extending over a period of two years.

Our opinion is that the building of an Annex to the Church is the only way of overcoming the difficulty, and of furnishing suitable rooms for meeting.

At our next meeting we shall have before us for consideration the best way in which to continue our efforts of liquidation of the debt on the Church; nothing has been done in the matter by the Association for a year past. According to the Treasurer's Report the balance in the bank to

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the credit of the Debt Fund, on December 31st, 1886, was \$130.06.

In closing I would say we feel that there has been a growth of interest in the Association and its work in the past few months. We have adopted a new Constitution, and some thirty-four young men have already signed the same, and we are encouraged to hope that all the young men of the congregation may be found taking an active part in the work of the Association, and that shortly.
