

composed and endeavored to smile. Kavanagh said he was so near the scene of the execution that he heard one of the victims cry "Oh." The tall victim (Burke), was lying in the road after this exclamation. The other victim was standing in the road with an umbrella in his hand. Kavanagh afterwards saw him lying in the road as before stated.

Kavanagh's evidence is held to be conclusive. Little can be added to it as the Crown will accept evidence of the actual participants. The prisoners evidently feel that the game is up. All of them now exhibit defiant demeanor except Jas. Carney, who sits motionless gazing fixedly at the bench. The others move about, hold violent conferences, and sometimes laugh at any incident.

Kavanagh further deposed that Fitzharris, on one occasion, told him that they were after Judge Lawson. Kavanagh said he became an informer on Thursday last, he had been sworn into the society by Kelly; the task assigned him was to drive the boys.

Independent witnesses corroborated having seen Kavanagh previous to the Phoenix Park murders at the public houses he mentioned in his evidence as having visited before he drove to the Park. The case was adjourned to Thursday next.

The Inundations.

Pittsburg, Feb. 8.—The floods along the Monongahela river reached their highest point, 28 feet, at three o'clock this morning, and soon began to recede. The damage from the inundation is considerable, all the mills and factories are submerged, and operations are suspended. Many stores in the lower portion of the city are flooded, and hundreds of families on the south side and in Allegheny have been compelled to leave their homes. Despatches from along the Monongahela report great damage from the inundations. The water at all points is subsiding, and no more damage is apprehended.

Pomeroy, Ohio, Feb. 8.—The city is completely under water, and the entire people have been compelled to seek safety on the hill-tops. The Ohio is higher than it has been known before, and is still rising. The weather is cold, and there is much suffering, especially among the poorer classes. Business men had no time to move their goods to a place of safety. Twenty-eight salt works are flooded, entailing a loss of 100,000 barrels of salt. The rolling mills are closed, and all other business is suspended. Similar reports come from points all along the river. The Journal and other newspapers buildings are washed out, and no mails are received.

Increased Pay.

The increases recently made in the pay of the employees of the I. C. Railway extend, we understand, to nearly all classes, and are general over the whole line. The mechanics whose pay had been previously increased, do not come in for additional favors now and the same rule seems to have been generally applied to clerks and officials of various grades. Trackmen, porters and laborers get 5 cents a day additional, section foremen 10 cents, station agents and operators about \$50 a year, and a number of clerks about the same. For conductors and brake men a new scale has been adopted, which gives them a considerable increase and greater advantages from continued service. It may be added that the pay of the laboring classes was not reduced in 79, when retrenchment was the order of the day, and the salaries of the better paid officials greatly cut down, so that any increase now is an increase on the best wages heretofore paid to that class.

The total of increases will add about fifty thousand dollars a year to the expenditure, and it is satisfactory to know that the revenues of the road warrant the additional outlay. We judge that great care has been taken in arranging the new schedule, and we doubt not that if the claims of any meritorious officer or employee have not been fairly considered, the attention of the authorities will yet be given thereto.—Moncton Times.

\$2,091 in an Emigrant's Undershirt.

August Dieffenbach, while on his way from Germany to join a brother in California about three months ago, dropped dead in a boarding-house on Greenwich street. He was buried in a pauper's grave in the Weehawken (N. J.) Cemetery, and the fact of his death was communicated to his brother, who declared that Dieffenbach had a large amount of money in his possession when he left Germany. The body was exhumed yesterday afternoon at Weehawken, when \$2,091 in bills were found in a pocket in the back of the undershirt.

A SUMMER RESORT.—The St. Croix Courier learns that arrangements have been made between Robert Reed, Esq., owner of the well-known "Red's Castle" in St. John, one of the finest properties in the Dominion, and Nate S. Reed, Esq., of St. Stephen, by which the Castle and grounds will probably become a fine summer resort for travellers seeking health and recreation in our Province during the heated term. Negotiations between the two gentlemen have been pending for some months, the result being the intended formation of a joint-stock company, headed by several New York capitalists, for the purchase and alteration of the whole property and its conversion into a first-class summer residence.

Mr. Reed stated to a Globe reporter that plans for the proposed improvements are now being prepared and in a short time he hopes to complete all his arrangements. The projected alterations and additions, he says, will give at least one hundred rooms. He will lay the matter before the Portland Town Council on Monday night with a view of obtaining exemption from taxes for a term of years.

How Ireland is Ruled.

(From the London Truth, Jan. 18.) The Castle system has been described by Mr. Herbert Gladstone and others as the worst form of Government in the world. Let us see what the Irish government is. It consists of the Lord Lieutenant and the Privy Council (a knot of judges whom it would be gross fatality to call old women), an Irish secretary and a host of permanent officials. These are the puppets. The people who pull the strings are a large number of white-livered, panic-stricken country gentlemen, and a select body of resident magistrates and police inspectors to whom it is a matter of great moment to get themselves talked in some way in order to be promoted. Except in the rare moments when English public opinion (forced by Parnell & Co) puts pressure on the "Castle," these officials do exactly what they like to do.
