





INTERCOLONIAL CONFERENCE.

OTTAWA, July 2.—The intercolonia OTTAWA, July 2.—The intercolonial conference met again to-day, Sir Adolph Caron presiding. The subject of the Pacific cable was introduced by Mr. Sandford Fleming, the promoter, by reading a paper, after which there was a discussion. Nearly all the Australian delegates and the New Zealand delegate, Mr. Smith, were strongly in favor of subsidies for the scheme, but the attitude of the Canadian and Cape Colony delegates was a cautious one. delegates was a cautious one.

OTTAWA, July 4.—The first practical result of the Colonial Conference was announced today. After discussing the Pacific cable project for three days the commissioners passed a resolution on motion of the Hon. J. B. Su'ton, expressing the opinion that immediate pressing the opinion that immediat steps should be taken to provide tele graphic communication free from foreig control between the Dominion of Canad and Australia. After considerable di and Australia. After considerable dis-cussion respecting the best means to be employed to carry out the object the Hon. Mr. Foster proposed and Sir Henry Wrexen seconded a resolution which was unanimously adopted asking the imperial government to undetake aurvey of the ocean bad of the proposed routes, the expense to be borne in equa-proportion by Great Britain, Canada and the Australian colonies.

The following resolution, moved by
Hon. Mr. Sutton and seconded by Hon.
Mr. Fitzgerald, was also adopted:
'That this conference is of the opinion
that any provisions in existing treaties
between Great Britain and any foreign
power which prevents the self governing

Mills seconded by Sir Henry Devilhers and resolved, that it is for the interest of the empire that in case of the construction of a cable between Canada and Australia, such cable should be extended from Australia to the Cape of Good Hope and that for that purpose arrangements should be made between the imperial and South African governments for a survey of the latter route. July 5—The Colonial Conference was engaged all day discussing the subject of reciprocal trade between England and her colonies on a preferential basis. The motion was submitted by Mr. Foster. 
