THE PREPARATION.
The official Globe, an ardent supporter of the Hazen administration, has the following in its Friday's issue:
"Apparently there is to be a great many new demands upon the Provincial treasury during the present year. The increase in the cost of the undertaking, as well as the increase in the Provincial revenue, will probably make easy compliance with some of these demands. But to grant aid to all the enterprises that are seeking it will involve the expenditure of more money than is at the command of the administration, and, as possible, borrowing will be resorted to. It would probably be a good deal better in the public interest if these cases were all tried before a judge in court as they are in Nova Scotia."

A young girl once asked Mark Twain if he liked books for Christmas gifts. "Well, that depends," drawled the great humorist. "If a book has a leather cover it is really valuable as a razor. If it is a brief comic work, to put under the short leg of a woolly table. An old-fashioned book with a clasp can't be beat as a missile to hurl at a dog, and a large book, like a geography, is as good as a piece of tin to nail over a broken pane of glass."

Evidently the financial stringency did not hit the Banks very hard. Minister Graham says that the Intercolonial will not be sold or leased and he ought to know.

Capt. Hank Brown, of Portland, Me., must be the oldest man in the Universe. He remembers when eggs were 12 cents a dozen the year round.

The Bank of Nova Scotia with profits of more than half a million dollars and a large increase in deposits makes a rather handsome showing for an off year.

There are 300 paint factories in the United States, making over 100,000,000 gallons of paint each year and the business demand is increasing faster than the facilities.

The Straits Settlements is what is known as a free colony. The only duty in force is on beer, wine, liquor and opium, all other facilities being admitted free of duty.

The number of registered letters for England has increased eight per cent. in a year, so there must be some progress made by the new arrivals, even in times that are not the best.

One of the leaders of the militant suffragettes in England, Mrs. Charlotte Despard, is a sister of General French. There can be no doubt, therefore, of her determination to carry her cause to victory.

One result of the bumper harvest in Western Canada has been an unprecedented demand for pianos and more than one Winnipeg dealer has been sold out. This is suggestive of the "jingle of prosperity" likewise other jingles in the farmhouse on the prairie.

The State of California and Wisconsin have each adopted the principle of deciding to adopt the principles of the Lemaire Act almost in full. The only change of importance is one by which a permanent Board of Conservation is to be created instead of the nominations of separate Boards for each individual district.

The Scottish Agricultural Commission is bearing fruit in the English and Scottish newspapers, and while the articles contain some criticism of our methods the recent visitors have much to say in praise of our agricultural lands and they are thus giving these provinces much valuable advertising among the classes from which we should draw settlers.

There is just enough truth in that English observer's observation about the dreary isolation life in the western plains to be worth considering. Fortunately with the exception of a few Doukhobors the settlers are mostly hard-headed people whose nerves have not been strained by the luxurious habits of civilization. As for the Englishman, he gets hold of a couple of horses and is all right.

WISDOM FOR WOMEN

Old-Fashioned Raised Doughnuts
One egg, 1 cup sour milk, 1 tablespoonful cream or 1-2 tablespoonful hard-spoonful soda, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 rubbed in the flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup salt, add just enough flour to knead. Beat well and set in a warm place until light (cover the pan while rising). Then roll them about 1-2 inch thick, fry in hot fat until a nice brown. Nice with maple syrup or honey.

Beef Tea for the Sick
One or 2 pounds lean beef, cut into small pieces. Put into jar with cold water, cover tightly, set in a pot of cold water. Heat gradually to a boil and continue this steadily for three or four hours, until the juice is all drawn out. Season with pepper to taste and when cold skim. The patients often prefer this cold.

Cabbage Stew
Cook the corned-beef and cabbage in separate pans. Save water from the corned beef. You can have a boiled dinner and make the stew from the remains. Now take 1-2 small cabbage put in the beef water, add 4 or 5 small potatoes cut up fine, 3 small onions cut fine, add the left-over corned-beef, or any left over beef will do, add pepper and salt to taste. Cook until soft (about 1-2 hours). Before taking off mix a tablespoonful of flour with a little water and mix with the stew. This makes a nice dinner or supper dish for a change.

Dominoes
Have a platter baked in rather deep sheets and cut small oblong pieces the size of a domino. Frost the top and sides. When the frosting is hard, draw the back lines and make the dots with a small brush dipped in melted butter.

Cream Puffs
Boil for one moment two tablespoons butter in 1-2 pint of water; add gradually 1-2 pint flour until smooth and thick, take from the fire and when cool break in 1 egg, beat until well mixed. Add another egg and beat again, and so continue until you have added 4 eggs. Bake by dropping single tablespoonfuls onto greased (shadow pans); do not let them touch each other.

Macaroni With Cheese
One-fourth stick macaroni broken in four lengths. Cook in 3 quarts of boiling salted water. Boil one-half hour; pour over it cold water and drain. Take 1 tablespoonful of butter, 1/2 teaspoon oil, 1/2 cup cold milk and four to five macaroni. Add 1-2 cup cold milk and stir until creamy. Add a little salt. Put a layer of cheese in a dish, then the macaroni, then custard until it is all used up. Cover top with bread crumbs and pieces of butter. Bake one hour and ten minutes.

Lemon Filling
Mix 2 small tablespoonfuls flour with 1 cup of sugar and a few grains salt. Stir them into 1 cup of boiling water, and when thick and smooth stand the pan over hot water and cook ten minutes. Stir in 1 egg, well beaten and the grated rind and juice of 1 lemon; cook a minute longer, and when cold spread on cake.

Banana Fritters
Mash 4 bananas to a pulp, add 2 well beaten eggs, 2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, about 2 cups milk, to make a drop batter; beat well together; have the fat heated as for doughnut frying, so that batter will rise promptly to the top; dip a spoon in the hot fat and use it to shape the fritters; do not make them too large; fry until well browned and drain on brown paper; eat while hot with maple syrup.

Potatoes on the Half Shell
Bake 6 medium-sized potatoes; when they are soft cut a slice from the top of each and scoop out the potato, leaving a shell about 1/2 inch thick. Mash 1/2 cup of each of the potatoes, add 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup butter, salt and pepper and the whites of 2 eggs beaten stiff; put this mixture back into the shells, and sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake for five minutes in a very hot oven.

One Way to Beat Boston Baked Beans
For a small family take one pint beans, pick over well and wash, cover with water and soak over night. In the morning boil for one hour. Put in a bean pot and add the water they were boiled and soaked in. Add a large tablespoon molasses, sugar spoon sugar, teaspoon salt, large pinch soda, large quarter pound of fat pork, cut the rind into strips. Keep covered with water and bake till a nice brown.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS
Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The homestead must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made in certain cases, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section elsewhere his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres there.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.

SOME STORIES CONCERNING THE BANK OF ENGLAND

Strange Things Have Befallen the Treasure House of Great Britain.

There is no indication that has more romance attaching to it than the Bank of England. It has been nearly ruined on several occasions. It has been looted by thieves—once gang robbers at the close of 1869, thirty years ago—forgery and fraud have been practiced upon it by the most accomplished criminals in history and yet the Bank of England is still a saying which in spite of the institution's many ups and downs is true to the letter.

One morning, just after the bank opened, an angry and excited crowd thronged the street, demanding cash for notes. There was actually double the money in notes in the hands of the mob to what there was in gold and in the bank and the outlook was a bad one. Gold had to be got to pay off every claimant, but that took time. So the directors sent men with notes into the crowd, whose claims they satisfied first, and paid each claim in sixpences and shillings. Some men walked away with sacks of shillings over their backs, but the time gained by this method of payment saved the bank, and every claim was paid.

After this the bank decided to reassure its depositors by displaying in the bank windows and near the cashier's desks, sacks overflowing with sovereigns, but the public did not know that the sacks were full of coin with only a layer of sovereigns on top. The man who gave the bank the most trouble was one named Charles Price, and he was given the nickname of "Old Pat" because he often wore a black patch over his right eye for no reason save as a disguise. He was one of the "best engravers" in the world, beating even the bank engravers. He had forged notes into circulation with surprising skill, and a battle royal began between him and the bank.

Had he not been a master of disguise he would have been caught long before he was, but he managed to "outwit" the bank out of more than £200,000 before he slipped into the hands of the law in a curious manner. He used to dress in a long black cloak which generally covered the lower part of his face, and although he employed more than a dozen agents had never been seen by one of them out of his disguise.

It was one of these agents who turned upon him. Realizing that the man was making a fortune, he lay in wait for him and struck out of corners of a doorway when the muffled figure drew near. Then leaping upon him he tore away his disguise and threatened to take him to the police unless he acceded to certain preposterous terms. Price refused, so his agent carried out his word and two months later the arch-criminal was convicted and hanged.

Only one man has succeeded in breaking into the bank and this happened about thirty years ago. One day the directors received a letter from an anonymous person saying that he would meet a person at the bank at a date fixed but that the person keeping the appointment must not be armed. At first it was thought to be a hoax, but as a great number of detectives searched the building vaults thoroughly and were quite satisfied that under no circumstances could a man enter those rooms, but they waited all through the night, and beyond a peculiar scraping noise which they attributed to rats they heard not a word.

A week later the bank directors were staggered at receiving a box in which lay several securities from the bank vaults, and signed with a note saying that if the directors would send a man to the vaults at midnight on the same day the writer would
