WANTED.
There is one in the world? How many good people there are who drive souls away from Christ instead of bringing them to his religious kingdom, who upset more than they right. Their gun has a crooked barrel, and kicks as it goes off. They are like a clumsy comrade who goes along with skillful hunters at the very moment he ought to be most quiet he is cracking an alder or falling over a log and frightening away the game.

The archers of old times studied their art. They were very precise in the matter. The old books gave special directions as to how the archer should go and where the arrow should alight. His stand erect and firm, his left foot a little in advance of his right foot. With his left hand he must take hold of the bow in the middle, and then with the three fingers and the thumb of his right hand he should lay hold of the arrow and aim it to the string, so precise was the direction given. How clumsy we are about religious work! How little skill and care we exercise! How often our arrows miss the mark! Oh, that we might learn the art of doing good and become "mighty hunters before the Lord!"

In the first place, if you want to be effective in doing good, you must be very sure of your weapon. There was something very fascinating about the archery of the olden times. Now, my Christian friends, we have a mightier weapon than that. It is the arrow of the gospel; it is a straight arrow; it is feathered from the wing of God's Spirit; it flies from a bow made out of the wood of the cross. As far as I can estimate or calculate, it has brought down four hundred million souls. Paul knew how to bring

on to that bowstring, and the whole world heard through the Corinthian theatres, and through the court-room, until the knees of Felix knocked together. It was that arrow that struck in Luther's heart, and he cried out, "Oh, my sin, oh, my sin!" If it strike a man in the head, it kills his scepticism; if it strike him in the heel, it turns his heel; if it strike him in the heart, he throws up his hands, as did one of old when wounded in the battle, crying, "Oh, Galilee, Thou hast conquered."

In the annals of the Earl of Pembroke, there are old records which show that the arrow of the English used to go through the breastplate, through the body of the warrior, and out through the back. What a symbol of that Gospel which is sharper than a two-edged sword, piercing to the dividing sunder of soul and body, and of the joints and marrow! Would to God we had more faith in that Gospel! The humblest man in this house, if he had enough faith in him, could bring a hundred souls to Jesus—perhaps five hundred. Just in proportion as this age seems to believe less and less in it, I believe more and more in it. What are men about that they will not accept their own deliverance? There is nothing proposed by men that can do it.
