TOWN COUNCIL

Meeting Held on Friday
Evening

NEW STREET

To be opened up in West
End—More Lamps for
Streets

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Friday evening the full board in attendance.

C. A. LeBlanc made application for license for a variety store. Referred to Police & License Com.

The Clerk read letters from A. D. MacKendrick and Dr. L. G. Pinault, declining to accept appointment as members of the Board of Health. The resignations were accepted.

A communication from W. L. McKee, manager of the Citizen's Band, asking for grant of \$150.00, was referred to Finance Com.

The applications of Wm. Storey, Duncan & McLennan and Anslow Bros. for water motor service was referred to Water & Sewerage Com.

A requisition from the Fire Brigade for 11 pairs hip rubber boots and 11 caps as well as a request that a tower for drying hose be erected and a suitable alarm system installed, were referred to the Fire Com.

Coun. McLennan from Police and License Com., submitted a report recommending that Chas. B. Gray be appointed Chief of Police at a salary of \$50.00 per month, duties to commence May 24th and also that Policeman Duncan's sal-

ary be increased to \$40.00 per month from May 1st. Both recommendations were adopted by Council.

Accounts for supplies for the different departments were passed. Coun. Mowat from Electric Light Com., submitted report recommending that three arc lamps be added to street service as follows:—

One on Dufferin St. west of Adams St.

One on Patterson St. at its junction with Athol St.

One on Sugar Loaf St. near the Intercolonial railway crossing. Report adopted.

Coun. Mowat from Electric Light Com. also brought in a recommendation that all flat rate customers now using electric light be placed on meters, except the Intercolonial railway; and that the salary of C. B. Scott be increased to \$2.00 per day after June 1st. Report adopted.

Coun. Taylor from public property and street committee submitted report recommending that the application from Joseph Damboise for a street crossing opposite his hotel be not granted and that the request at Ward three ratepayers for a new street, westerly from Sugar Loaf St. be granted.

This report was adopted and the committee were instructed to procure a plan of proposed St. to submit to Council for approval.

Measrs. A. McE. McDonald and W. H. Wallace were appointed members of the Board of Health to fill vacancies caused by resignation of A. D. MacKendrick and Dr. L. G. Pinault.

The council then adjourned.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Henry Leveque Committed
for Trial for Theft.

Henry Leveque, the man charged with theft at Matapedia station, was on Friday sent up for trial by Justice Stiles of Matapedia. J. H. Kelly, M. P. P. of New Carlisle, appeared for the prosecution. Leveque was taken to New Carlisle on Saturday by I. C. R. Detective Noble and lodged in jail. The prisoner appeared before Judge Tremblay at New Carlisle on Monday and elected to be tried under the Speedy Trials Act on the 11th of June, after pleading not guilty.

Detective Noble by a clever ruse secured information from the prisoner after his commitment which led to the recovery of another suit of clothes which it is alleged he stole from Matapedia station. The only clew Noble had to work on was the tickets found in the prisoners pocket after his arrest which had been cut off the clothing.

Shocking Murder in New York.

(Special to Events).

New York, May 23.—A shocking and most sensational murder was perpetrated some time yesterday in a field at Elmhurst, Queensborough Long Island. The victim was Amelia Stafford, 16 years old, who lived at Elmhurst. She left home yesterday to gather dandelion greens and did not return. A search was made late in the afternoon and her body was found in a field with clothes torn off. There is every evidence of criminal assault. Two gaping knife wounds were found in the girls neck, one of which penetrated the brain and caused instant death. The weapon with which she was murdered was a sharp carving knife which she had taken to cut dandelions. The police were notified and worked all night but up to noon today no clue has been found.

Turkish Garrison Deserts.

Belgrade, Serbia, May 23.—The whole Turkish garrison at Uskob, consisting of 1000 men has deserted carrying arms with them. So far only 50 have been recaptured. Men claim ill treatment and bad food.

was at the head of the company
known as the Digby Coal Co. In
1897 Mr Parker returned to Camp-
bellton where he resided until his
death. Three sons, Robt. of Bis-
sac, Arizona, Harry at home and
John of Moncton and one daughter
deceased home, also three sisters
Mrs. Tom Andrew of Vancouver,
B. C., Mrs. John Conally and Mrs.
Hugh Miller and one brother, Rich-
ard of this town are left to
the loss of a loving father.
The funeral service
was held from his late resi-
dence on Friday afternoon May 17th
at 2 o'clock. The service was
conducted by Rev. W. W. Carr
assisted by Dr. Carr.



J. H. CROCKETT OUT ON BAIL

Editor of Gleaner Arrested Yesterday at Instance of Hon. H. R. Emmerson

Fredrickton, N. B., May 21.—Jas. H. Crockett, managing director of the Fredericton Gleaner was arrested this afternoon on a warrant issued by Police Magistrate Marsh at the instance of Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, charging him with defamatory libel.

The warrant was served by Police Sergeant Phillips in the police magistrate's office and the accused was immediately admitted to bail in the sum of \$500 being held in his own recognizance for \$400 and land sureties of \$100 each. The bondsmen are Harry F. McLeod and Chas. A. Burchill, both of this City.

The preliminary examination was fixed for next Wednesday 29th at 11 o'clock a. m.

The information in the case sets forth that defendant was responsible for publication in the Gleaner newspaper on March 27th last, of an article seriously reflecting on the moral character of Hon. Henry Emmerson thereby injuring his reputation and exposing him to hatred, contempt and ridicule. The article in question stated that Hon. Mr. Emmerson had been ejected from St. Lawrence Hall, Montreal in company of two women of ill-repute.

Proceedings have been taken under sections 333 and 334, chapter 146 of the revised statutes of Canada. Section 333 sets forth that any person who publishes a defamatory article, knowing it to be false, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable on conviction to a fine of \$500 or two years imprisonment or both.

Section 334 provided a penalty of \$500 or one year imprisonment or both for publication of a defamatory libel.

Some weeks ago civil proceedings were instituted by Mr. Emmerson against the Gleaner Company for libel. It is said that venue will be laid at Dorchester and the case will be tried at the September circuit court—Evening Times.



MILLIONS OF CO-OPERATORS.

The co-operators of the British Isles number nearly 2,250,000. The capital invested in their societies, without counting reserves, has reached a total of more than £36,500,000, or more than \$180,000,000. Their net profits for the year amounted to nearly £10,350,000. Their annual sale business of nearly £92,000,000, or \$460,000,000, reminds me of the figures of the national budget, not to say of astronomical calculations.

They have stores by the thousand; they employ people by the hundred thousand; they own workshops and plantations, and are, generally, the most flourishing of national concerns. And, broadly speaking, they are all workingmen.

What a difference, says K. A. D. Whiteing, in the Youth's Companion, between all this and the first gathering of co-operators at Rochdale, in Lancashire, some sixty years ago, when the modern movement was first started! They met in a little shanty, which, in the extant picture of it, looks like something belonging to the file of the dawn of the race. They agreed to start a co-operative store and to raise the needful capital of £8 by subscription of two-pence and three pence a week.

A new co-operative store is now started with the greatest ease. The whole system of procedure is perfectly known, and at every stage of it there is full guidance in precedent. The people who want to open the store subscribe the capital in shares of from \$5 to \$20. No one person may hold more than \$1,000 in shares. Any one may become a member on paying a small entrance fee; any one may purchase without being a member. Shareholders may put up their shares at the rate of three pence a week, or they may borrow the full sum required at moderate interest. The share, however, as such cannot earn more than 5 per cent. To get the full benefit of membership you must be a purchaser and divide profits.

The object of this is to keep the store a democratically managed concern and to save it from the tyranny of the capitalist. No matter what the amount of his investment, each member has only one vote in the management. Those who merely lend money to supply the capital—and this is sometimes done—have no controlling voice. They take their interest, and there is an end to it.

DIES FOR BENEFACTOR.

Black Snake said to have Saved the life of a man who befriended it.

The following snake story comes from Arnaught township, Penn.—When Edward Houghton, of that township, was preparing late last fall to do some threshing he discovered a black snake coiled about the cylinder of the machine, the reptile being exhausted by its efforts to escape. A few days ago he was working at some machinery, and just as a wrench slipped from a bolt he was trying to loosen and threw him on the ground he heard the warning buzz of a rattler. Upon looking up the prostrate man saw the venomous ophidian's head within a few inches of his face and coiled ready to strike. He turned cold with horror, but before he could move a muscle there was swish through the air in the opposite direction and a large black snake twined itself in the coils of the rattler.

The rattler was three feet six inches long and had twelve rattles and a button. Upon skinning it, he found that almost every bone in its body was broken. Mr. Houghton will preserve the body of the black snake in alcohol as a memento of his kindness to the reptile and the latter gratitude in which life was the price paid.

BAD OUTLOOK FOR MONTREAL

Montreal, May 20.—Montreal may lose some of its shipping owing to strike of longshoremen. Shipping companies today announced that they had made arrangements to make other ports, their port of lading. Other shippers refuse definite information but it is understood that Halifax, St. John, and Portland are three that will be most used in case strike continues to tie up the port. There is hope, however, for advertisement calling for men and 24 cents an hour increase has led to engagement of a good many more. C. P. R. announces that it has three hundred men at work and these are all they need. Reford and Co., have five ships in port, and are all being discharged a little, but the work is not satisfactory, and freight cars miles in length are awaiting discharge into vessels. Men met this morning again, as men, but not as a union. Only about ten per cent of the men are union men. They again decided to hold out for full five cents an hour. Warrants for 14 of the strikers were issued under city bylaw for breach of contract but none for breach of Lemieux Act.

ONE MILLION CHINESE ARE STARVING

Whole families dead Side by Side—Parents Sell their Children for a Meal

Boston, May 20.—"Not less than 1,000,000 people must die and it is not improbable that four times that number will starve," is the declaration contained in a report on the famine situation in China, made by Rev. John R. Hykas, agent of the American Bible Society at Shanghai. The report was made public last night. Mr. Hykas says that "with the food at present at hand and in sight the relief committee can keep 100,000 persons alive until the end of June, when it is hoped they will have at least a partial crop."

Mr. Hykas reports as follows: "The country has been denuded of every thing green. Roots of grass and weeds have been dug out of the frozen ground for food and the bark stripped from the trees and eagerly devoured. The more fortunate are able to buy bean-cake (ordinarily sold as a fertilizer), or a mixture of leaves and sweet potato vines, and for these they pay more than the price of the flour in normal years. Domestic animals, cats, dogs, donkeys and cattle, are devoured as soon as they die.

"Children are offered for sale or deserted by their parents and left to starve. A missionary reports a case where a little girl of ten or twelve years, was sold by her father for two bowls of rice. Others tell of parents deliberately throwing their children into the river, preferring to see them drown rather than suffer the pangs of slow starvation. Whole families have



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

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been found dead. The suffering are indescribable.

"A very conservative estimate of the population of the afflicted area is 15,000,000. The cause of the famine was excessive rains, which fell almost without intermission for nearly 100 days."
