New York, May 23—A shocking and most sensational murder was perpetrated some time yesterday in a field at Elmhurst, Queenborough' Long Island. The victim was Amelia Statford, 16 years old, who lived at Elmhurst. She left home yesterday to gather dandelion greens and did not return. A search was made late in the afternoon and her body was found in a field with clothes torn off. There is every evidence of criminal assault. Two gaping knife wounds were found in the girls neck, one of which penetrated the brain and caused instant death. The weapon with which she was murdered was a sharpe carving knife which she had taken to cut dandalise.
