Toronto. Feb. 9.—"It's rotten," said Rev. Ben Spence of the Dominion Alliance, when asked what he thought about the liquor bill introduced into the Quebec Legislature.

"It is along the line which I forecasted some time ago," he said. "It looks more like permissive legislation than prohibitory legislation. There is no way of improving the liquor business. The only thing to do is to wipe it out. It is a bad business, and you cannot improve a bad business."

"Have you any information as to whether the bill will go through as introduced?"

species, which is about double the usual number. The success or failure in making a "big list" for the year is in no small degree dependent upon the winter birds. Many of these are rare and most of them irregular in their habits, some years invading the south in force and other seasons being entirely absent.

The Crossbills.

Among these might be mentioned the Crossbills, peculiar birds the mandibles of whose bills do not meet evenly, but cross as their name suggests. The projecting points, however, are found most convenient for extracting the seeds from the hemlock cones, which is their principal food in winter. There are two varieties, the American or Red Crossbill. Both were seen New Year's Day (1920), it being the first and also the last appearance of the latter, which is somewhat the rarer of the two. The Red Crossbill, however, stayed around until the middle of May, being seen at different times and in a variety of places.

Another group of winter birds are the Grosbeaks. There are two varieties of these also, the Pine Grosbeak and the Evening Grosbeak. The former visits us in small numbers almost every year, but until quite recently the latter was a decidedly rare bird, and its occurrence was considered the event of the season. The seeds of the Manitoba maple are a great attraction to

its occurrence was considered the event of the season. The seeds of the Manitoba maple are a great attraction to them, and in 1911 a large flock spent some time in and around the Ontarlo Hospital grounds, where a number of those trees are growing. Their re-appearance since 1911 has each year been looked for eagerly, but not until 1920 dld they really come again in numbers. They were first reported on January 5th, and remained until. May 21st.

Other Winter Birds.

Other winter Birds whose names may be seen on the list are: Redpoll, Pine Siskin, Brown-Capped Chickadee, Bohemian Waxwing, Northern Shrike and Snowbird, but while the winter of 1919-1920 was notable for the invasion of these northern birds, it was also remarkable for the number of species remaining over, whose members usually all leave for warmer climes before even the first snowfall. In this latter list we have the Rusty Blackbird, Fox-Colored Sparrow, Yellow-Bellied Woodpecker, Robin, White-Throated Sparrow, Red-Winged Blackbird, Black Duck, Song Sparrow, Bronzed Grackle and Kingfisher. The three first mentioned have never been reported from here in winter before, and are, therefore, new records. It seemed unusual to have so many staying over, as the weather was exceptionally severe, but it is impossible for mere humans to understand the ways of the birds. We can only study them and strive to learn what we can of their habits of life.

Rarer Birds. Among the rarer birds seen during the spring and summer months might

the spring and summer months might be mentioned the Bald Eagle, Ring-Billed Gull, Bonaparte's Gull, Yellow Rall. Least Bittern, Prothonotary Warbler, Henslow's Sparrow, Holboell's Grebe, Short-Eared Owl, Turkey Buzzard, Long-Billed Marsh Wren and Black Tern, but it would hardly do to take time and space to mention more than their names.

The largest number of species seen on one day was eighty, on May 24th, and as it may be of interest to some these have been marked with a star on the appended list.

The club appreciates very much the couriesy of the daily press in publishing the series of "Bird Notes" contributed by the club last spring, and it is possible that with their kind coperation these may be resumed as interesting incidents come to notice from time to time.





THE PROBLEM

The problem is to draw a chain of circles once across the chart, from the first column on the left to the last column on the right, selecting the figures to encircle from which you can obtain the greatest difference between the sum total of the even and the sum total of the odd figures. The odd figures are 3, 5, 7 and 9, and the even, 2, 4, 6, 8, By "sum total" is meant the figures added together. That is, you are to take the odd figures you put circles around, and add them up; then the even figures, and the difference between the two totals is your solution. It makes no difference which of the two sum totals is the larger; the greatest difference you can obtain either way is what counts.

The chain must be drawn in continuous sections of either three, four or five circles to a section. By "section" is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line. You may use eith r number of circles you wish in each section. The sections of the chain may go either up or down, or to the right, but not to the left. 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QUEBEC LIQUOR BILL ENDS PRESCRIPTIONS, STOPS SPIRIT EXPORT

New Legislation Is Introduced · in Provincial Legis-

lature.

QUEBEC, Feb. 8 .- (By the Canadian Press.)—No liquor will be exported to other parts of Canada from the province of Quebec after May 1, if the new legislation brought down by the Provincial Government today is accept the Legislature.

One of the officers who prepared the liquor bill stated positively this evening that everything connected with the liquor traffic, including the export, will be in the hands of the commission of five members who will be appointed to administer the act. He said that there would be no export of spirituous liquors to outside points. These liquors will be imported by the commission and sold only in authorized depots in the province in quantities of one bottle at a time. W. Will Not Export.

"The Quebec Liquor Commission," he said "will not be a source of supply for other provinces. It will import for the needs of consumers in this province but positively not for export."

The same official added that there is nothing that will prevent the export of beer or of wines to outside points, but all such shipments must be made by the rallways and must be done publicly.

Abolishes System.

The bill, the provisions of which have been forecasted in dispatches from Quebc for weeks, provides for the entire abolition of the present system of handling liquor in Quebec.

The sale retail of all kinds of liquor will be in the hands of vendors appointed by the commission. The most drastic regulations will be imposed to prevent bootlegging and other infractions.
