M'ILWRAITH ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY OBSERVES 179 BIRDS DURING THE YEAR

successful and enjoyable yet experienced by members of the McIlwraith Ornithological Club. The composite list of birds observed is published herewith, and totals 179. Several of the members individually saw over 160 species, but a list such as that may only be obtained by one who is willing to spend considerable time afield, and during April and May, to forego those extra "forty winks" in the morning, rising with the break of day to spend the early hours in some favorite woods or swamp.

The good luck, if such it may be called, which followed the club during the season, was manifest quite early in the year, for on the usual New Year's Day trip from Hyde Park to the city the members noted no less than 24 species, which is about double the usual

species, which is about double the usual number. The success or failure in making a "big list" for the year is in no small degree dependent upon the winter birds. Many of these are rare and most of them irregular in their habits, some years invading the south in force and other seasons being entirely absent.

The Crossbills.

Among these might be mentioned the Crossbills, peculiar birds the mandibles of whose bills do not meet evenly, but cross as their name suggests. The projecting points, however, are found most convenient for extracting the seeds from the hemlock cones, which is their principal food in winter. There are two varieties, the American or Red Crossbill. Both were seen New Year's Day (1920), it being the first and also the last appearance of the latter, which is somewhat the rarer of the two. The Red Crossbill, however, stayed around until the middle of May, being seen at different times and in a variety of places.

Another group of winter birds are the Grosbeaks. There are two varieties of these also, the Pine Grosbeak and the Evening Grosbeak. The former visits us in small numbers almost every year, but until quite recently the latter was a decidedly rare bird, and its occurrence was considered the event of the season. The seeds of the Manitoba maple are a great attraction to them, and in 1911 a large flock spent some time in and around the Ontario Hospital grounds, where a number of those trees are growing. Their re-appearance since 1911 has each year been looked for eagerly, but not until 1920 did they really come again in numbers. They were first reported on January 5th, and remained until May 21st.

Other Winter Birds whose names may be seen on the list are: Redpoli, Pine Siskin, Brown-Capped Chickadee, Bohemian Waxwing, Northern Shrike and Snowbird, but while the winter of 1919-1920 was notable for the invasion of these northern birds, it was also remarkable for the number of species remaining over, whose members usually all leave for warmer climes before even the first snowfall. In this latter list we have the Rusty Blackbird, Fox-Colored Sparrow, Yellow-Bellied Woodpecker, Robin, White-Throated Sparrow, Red-Winged Blackbird, Black Duck, Song Sparrow, Bronzed Grackle and Kingfisher. The three first mentioned have never been reported from here in winter before, and are, therefore, new records. It seemed unusual to have so many staying over, as the weather was exceptionally severe, but it is impossible for mere humans to understand the ways of the birds. We can only study them and strive to learn what we can of their habits of life.

Rarer Birds.

Among the rarer birds seen during the spring and summer months might

the spring and summer months might be mentioned the Bald Eagle, Ring-Billed Gull, Bonaparte's Gull, Yellow Rall, Least Bittern, Prothonotary Warbler, Henslow's Sparrow, Hölboell's Grebe, Short-Eared Owl, Turkey Buzzard, Long-Billed Marsh Wren and Black Tern, but it would hardly do to take time and space to mention more than their names.

The largest number of species seen on one day was eighty, on May 24th, and as it may be of interest to some these have been marked with a star on the appended list

The club appreciates very much the couriesy of the daily press in publishing the series of "Bird Notes" contributed by the club last spring, and it is possible that with their kind cooperation these may be resumed as interesting incidents come to notice from time to time.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8, — A negative report was ordered today by the Senate naval committee on the resolution of Senator Borah (Republican, Idaho), asking for the committee's opinion whether it was practicable or advisable for the Government to suspend naval building operations for six reporting. months.

The committee's action on the Borah resolution was said to have been taken without division. It followed extensive hearings of the navy general board and haval officers, with no witnesses appearing to advocate temporary or partial suspension of the present building program.

LLOYD GEORGE **URGES SUPPORT** FOR COALITION

Says Present World Perils Are Too Great For Party Fights.

REFERS TO IRELAND

Contends That Irish Want Navy and Army—Declares They Won't Get It.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—"We are engaged in a terrible task," said Mr. Lloyd George in a speech today to the Welsh National Liberal Council, in which in impassioned words he defended the Coalition Government and pleaded ard-ently for a continuation of political unity. ently for a continuation of pointess unity.

"It is something more important than defending myself and my administration." he said.

He asked whether anyone could say that the need for unity had passed and exclaimed: "I wish to God everybody could, because it worries me; it fills me sometimes with dread.

"If someone could tell me that the danger is past; someone with authority, someone with vision, someone whose word we could take. I should be so giad that I would sign my resignation tomorrow."

World is Reeling.

A world reeling under the most terrible blow ever dealt, was the way the prime minister described the situation of today; gigantic events were in the making, and old factional fights among the various parties should not be resurrected until the perli was over. They won't get it, and it they don't get it, we are told, they will kill our policemen, our solders—not in open fighting, but hiding in homes, walking as respectable tenant farmers, or swaggering along the road until they come to a hiding place, where they find rifles, passing perhaps the very policeman they are about to murder, as though they were innocent men.

"Are we to allow that sort of thing "Are we to allow that sort of thing to be done without protecting the people we are sending there? (Cries of 'No.') There is no issue between us and our political opponents on home rule. We have gone one better than the Gladstonian home rule.

"There is one issue about setting up an independent country by our very gates—the placks where submarines used to lurk and sink our ships and endanger our commerce and the life of the nation. There is an issue as to whether the policemen and soldiers who are there upholding the honor of our flag are to be shot down by men who lurk in houses. I know of no other issue."

QUEBEC LIQUOR BILL ENDS PRESCRIPTIONS, STOPS SPIRIT EXPORT

New Legislation Is Introduced in Provincial Legis-

lature.

QUEBEC, Feb. 8 .- (By the Canadian ress.)-No liquor will be exported to ther parts of Canada from the province of Quebec after May 1, if the new legislation brought down by the Proincial Government today is accepted by the Legislature.

One of the officers was prepared the liquor bill stated positively this evening that everything connected with the liquor traffic, including the export, will be in the hands of the commission of five members who will be appointed to administer the act. He said that there would be no export of spirituous liquors to outside points. These liquors will be imported by the commission and sold only in authorized depots in the province in quantities of one bottle at a time. DR. R. C.
