[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Ont., April 29.-The first half hour of this morning's session was devoted to a discussion of the Mail and Empire position. Mr. J. B. Clark, K. C., for the paper, pointed out that possibly they had been careless owing to all the newspapers having commented upon the case all along. Chancellor Boyd said there was no doubt that contempt had been committed. However, with the admission of the writer that the article was regretted, and the understanding that there would not be another violation, the matter end there.

Important Ruling of Supreme Court Judges.

Upheld-Claim of the Eastern Provinces Thrown Out.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, April 29.-The supreme court today gave judgment on the constitutional question submitted to it to determine the number of representatives in the House of Commons to which Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are entitled under the last census.

These provinces contended that their representation should not be reduced, and based their claim on sub-section of section 51 of the British North America Act, which provides that no reduction shall take place if a provpopulation of Canada. They argued that by the word "Canada" was meant only the four original provinces of Confederation, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The Dominion Government argued to the contrary, holding that it referred to the aggregate population of Canada, including those provinces admitted to Confederation since the passage of the British North America Act.



INTRIGUING AGAINST SULTAN

The Real Theater of War Will Be Along the Mediterranean Seaboard.




