

THE CAR SHOPS FOR LONDON The proposition of the Grand Trunk Railway Company to build their car shops in this city, laid before the aldermen last night, is the most important subject that has claimed the attention of the citizens of London for years.

in It has been known for some time past that negotiations were in progress, but not until last Saturday was the draft agreement arrived at. Under it, for a bonus of \$100,000 from the city, payable as the work proceeds, the Grand Trunk Company stipulates to entire system of railways west of Toronto. On the buildings must be spent not only the \$100,000 voted, but \$50,000 additional of the are slimly represented in the London company's money. The company under-takes to employ 500 men continuously at work under conditions set forth in the agreement. If the shops are moved or the agreement is broken by the company the bonus must be refunded.

The Council last night considered the draft agreement arrived at by the city solicitor, the Mayor and Ald. Ivey with the company's representatives, and indorsed its provisions with a few trifling amendments, at which it is not probable that the railway company will cavil. One amendment is important; it stipulates that if the shops are burned down they must be rebuilt within a

At an early date, as soon as the agree ment has been drawn up in legal form, it will be formally passed by the Council and a bylaw founded on its provisions submitted to the taxpayers. That it will by a substantial majority there is little doubt. It is no small matter to have 500 workmen and their families added to the population of the city, sharing in the sustenance of its business interests and paying their full quota of taxes. The establishment of the car works here means the addition to our population of probably 2,000 persons. At a time when, through one cause or another, business is dull and so many of the industrial establishments are either shut up or working short time, something must be done to aid in bringing about a change.

London occupies a splendid position for the establishment of the G. T. R. shops, and though other cities have been bidding for the works the company prefers London, all things being equal. The bonus of \$100,000 will bring the desired results. It is for the ratepayers to say whether or not it shall be granted. The ADVERTISER is prepared to support the bargain brought forward by the aldermen. Though \$100,000 seems a large sum, the interest on that investment, at the rate which we hope to obtain when the debt is refunded, will be but \$5,000 a year, and the sum, with a very small additional amount as sinking fund to wipe out the principal, is all that the city will have to pay. Under the rearrangement of our civic indebtedness we will certainly save from \$35,000 to \$40,000 a year on interest, as compared with our present expenditure for that purpose. Thus it would be easy to pay the car shops bonus out of this saving, and still have that reduction in the general tax rate which we all desire. There is the further probability that, in the new bargain regarding the London and Port Stanley Railway, which the Grand Trunk authorities are anxious to arrange for, we will be able to make somewhat better terms than those now prevailing, and here again a saving may be expected. Thus the taxpayers can rest assured that the car shops bonus can be paid without adding to the taxes now collected, while the prospects are that the change in the rate of interest paid by the corporation, to be arranged for in the near future, will enable the aldermen to effect some reduction in the tax rate.

Five divisions have now taken place in Parliament. In the first division the Government had a majority of 27; in the second 27; in the third it was defeated; in the fourth its majority was 18, and last night 14. The squeeze becomes close as the session advances.

A NEW MOVE.
Sir Hector Langevin wants Parliament adjourn for several months. The Liberals can never consent to an arrange ment of that sort. Not till the McGreevy-Langevin scandal is probed to the bottom and disposed of by Parliament would the Governor-General be justified in granting a prorogation. It would be too apparent an attempt to gain time, and afford too many opportunities to defeat the ends of justice that the investigation now i progress is calculated to facilitate.

HIS FIRST TRIUMPHS. A legal gentleman who spent his student

years in the office of Sir John A. Macdonald at Kingston, asserts that the biographers of the statesman are all wrong when they say that he made his first big strike at the bar as counsel for Von Shultz, the alien charged with fomenting the rebellion of 1837-9. Our informant maintains that Von Shultz was among the prisoners who were tried by court martial, they being aliens and not answerable to the charge of treason to this country. Disposed of in this way, Von Shultz was not entitled to counsel. The case in which young Macdonald made the brilliant defense that first made him famous as a barrister was either a charge of criminal assault on a woman or murder. The prisoner's name was Brass, and Mac lonald defended him with great ability, but he was found guilty and hanged. Another case in which he displayed splendid ability as an advocate was the suit of Bray vs. Sandow, an action for false imprisonnent. The plaintiff was the father of Dr. Bray, of Chatham, and the defendant comnodore of the lakes. This suit he won, notwithstanding that the experienced Robert Baldwin, Attorney-General for the West, was the opposing counsel.

CANADIANS BOYCOTTED.

A correspondent of the new London paper Emigration complains that in the High Commissioner's office at London but one man (Mr. Colmer) has resided in Canada, and he is not a native-born Canadian. He says the public would be better served if the offices were filled with native Canadians, and "inquiring emigrants would then be able to get practical and truthful information respecting the resources of the country without resorting to the reading matter and maps only." This is a serious allegation. Some one in Parliament should take steps to compel the application of a remedy. 


