With his employer's permission, he drove that evening to London with Doty. On the way in, Doty asked him to vote for Beattle. Witness said

he would vote for the best man. He spent the night at Mrs. Christie's private boarding house on Richmond street north, where Doty boarded. After breakfast he was driven to the polis by Doty, and he voted. He asked Doty to drive him home or give him his railway fare. Doty said he would see witness again. Later on in the day witness was given 50 cents by Mr. John McAdam, liveryman, which paid his fare home. The 50 cents had been

sent through Doty.

The respondent necessarily suffered from the purposeful looseness of the Conservative organization. The absence writing in an election matter might be said to be prima facie evidence of intended fraud. The Conservative party destroyed all written records so as to give their agents considerable latitude. They had Doty, a man without means, but an enthusiastic Conservative, hiring a rig, providing two meals and a bed for the voter, and paying \$5 for the same. Another of Nissouri's Oldest Pionee Settlers Gone.

Lakeside, Feb. 8.—Mrs. Eliza Mit-chell, widow of the late Charles Mitchell, died at the residence of her son, Mortimer Mitchell, of Lakeside, on Jan. 31, aged 93 years, 11 months and Mrs. Mitchell was born in Massachusetts. Her father was Capt. Joseph Parker, uncle of Theodore Parker, the noted American preacher. Her mother was Abigail Whittier, aunt to John Greenleaf Whittier, the late American poet. She moved with her family to Oswego county, New York, and thence to Canada in 1826, where she married Mr. Mitchell, who had preceded her but a few months. She lived in Dorchester a short time, her husband working in Mr. Putman's mill. In 1827 they bought a small farm in East Zorra, where, in their humble log cabin, they entertained the first two Scotchmen that settled in that township. In 1833 they came to East Nissouri, and settled on the banks of the little lake, where Mr. Mitchell died in 1887. Mrs. Mitchell was well known and universally respected. She was noted for her amiable disposition and her great kindness to the new settlers. She had quite a military spirit, and told with pride of the stirring scenes of 1837, when her husband served with the loyalists, and she was left alone with four small children.



London, Feb. 9 .- Through the collapse of the scaffolding of a viaduct on a railroad in Cornwall today, twelve men fell a distance of 150 feet and were killed.

WHISTLED HIMSELF CRAZY.

New York Man Who Can't Stop It-Placed in Bellevue Hospital.

New York, Feb. 9.-In Bellevue Hospital the nurses refer to a man in ward 38 as the "Whistling Patient." The patient's illness takes the form of a mania for whistling, and the con-tinuation of the habit will probably cause him to be sent to an insane

asylum. The man is John L. Wolf, a middle aged clerk, who works in a down-town office. He lived with his wife and several small children on the first floor of the tenement at 31 Broome street. He was attacked by the strange malady and was arrested by a policeman, who endeavored unuccessfully to quiet him.

STEAMER ANGLOMAN WRECKED. Liverpool, Feb. 9 .- The Angloman, Capt. Lewis, from Boston on Jan. 30, for this port, has gone ashore off the Skerries. A dense fog prevalls. The Angloman will probably be a total loss. All the members of the crew have been saved.

THE PLAGUE STILL SPREADS. Bombay, Feb. 9.-The Viceroy of India, the Earl of Elgin, has given his sanction to Madras being made a port of departure for the pilgrims en route to Mecca. The citizens of Madras. however, have entered a vigorous protest. The plague is increasing here, at Karachi and at Poona.

DEATH OF MR. FRANK MAY. Railway Matters.

THE LONGEST RAILWAY RUN WITHOUT A STOPPAGE. The longest regular daily run made without a stop by any rallway in the world, has just been placed on the schedule of the Great Western Rail-

way of England. It is made between Paddington sta-tion in London, and Exeter, a distance of 194 miles, in 3 hours and 36 minutes, by what is known as the Cornwall Express. It is remarkable, no so much owing to the time, as for the fact that not a stop is made from one end of the run to the other. There have been longer runs made without a stop, but they have been made by special and not regular trains. 




