

A Violent Attack on Major-General Gascoigne,



Dr. Cl. T. Campbell Objects to Using Sewer Money for Street Work.

Engineer Chipman's Report Concerning Section "A" of the Sewer.

Ald. Cooper Calls Mr. Pritchard Down for Talking Too Much-The Wade & Beckett Job Defective.

Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, at the meeting of the sewer committee last night, placed himself on record as opposed to the council's questionable methods of reducing the tax rate. Dr. Campbell

"I want to place myself on record as opposed to the action of the council in exception of the appropriating money from the sewer debentures to repairs and improvements to streets. upon the matter. ENGINEER CHIPMAN'S REPORT. Consulting Engineer Chipman submitted his report re the proposed section "A" of the new sewer, as follows: "The proposed 30-inch trunk sewer from Evergreen avenue to farm 'A' will serve a population of 80,000, all taking water from your waterworks system, all being connected with the sewer system, and each person using 80 imperial gallons of water per day. If the population should increase to 80,000 within the next twenty years or so, it is probable that a considerable proportion would not be connected with the sewers, and it is certain that every man, woman and child would not be supplied with 80 gallons of water per day. The smaller the sewer between farm 'A' and the city, the greater the velocity. Two 22-inch pipes will practically carry the same as one 30-inch, laid at the same inclination. For ten years at least, probably for twenty years, one 22-inch pipe would be preferable to a larger pipe. The second 22-inch pipe could be laid when it became necessary, and not until then. As this sewer will be under a 'head,' it is to be of iron or steel. In my report of 1892 I favored a riveted steel pipe for this 30-inch sewer, as at that time it would have been cheaper than cast iron. For sizes less than 30 inches, cast iron pipes are now cheaper than riveted steel. In Canada cast iron pipes are made 20 inches in diameter and 24 inches, but I believe that for 22 inches it would be necessary to import them. I would, therefore, recommend that two cast iron pipes be substituted for the 30-inch pipe in sections 'A, and 'B' of the trunk sewer, the 20-inch pipe be laid now, and the 24-inch when the capacity of the 20-inch has been reached. The structures for carrying the pipe across the Coves should now be constructed for both pipes. The original location for these sewers, 'A' and B,' should be adhered to. This line is almost a straight line from the west

end of Evergreen avenue sewer to a point on the Learn tract on farm 'A,' about 200 feet south of the electric railway's right of way.
"I am of the opinion that it would be advisable to secure for the city all land between the proposed sewer and Raliway, also as much of the available land between the sewer and the pipe line road as possible. "The accompanying plans show the proposed location of these sewers; also the location of the proposed overflow west of the west cove. This overflow will be about 360 feet in length. It will discharge at a point 750 feet west from the electric railway bridge, in seven feet of water, and 50 feet from shore. Section 'B' and overflow can be placed under contract as soon as the

The sympathies of the audi- that publications in French of legal and official notices are no longer necessary, and have drawn up the necessary ordinance doing away with French offficial advertisements. Some very strong protests have been raised against this proposed action, but they will not check the drift of sentiment. The French, or creole, influence is on the wane. Of the 134 delegates composing the convention only 21 are of Latin or French origin, speaking French as their mother tongue. All of them speak English with the Drummond county investigation fluency, and they see that the day of French has passed in Louisiana; indeed, many "creole parishes" are represented in the convention by delegates who do not know a dozen words

of French. It is the longest struggle of its kind ever known in America, for it has been nearly a century since the French-Spanish colony of Louisiana became a part of the American Union. During that century the French language held its own against all adverse influences. It has been the only language in the United States which survived so many years against the crushing domination of the English tongue. Dutch, in New York, yielded readily, and Spanish, in Florida, Texas and California, gave way in comparatively short time, but the French has proved itself more virile. It has taken 6 years even to get rid of it as the official tongue of Louisiana, and that in spite of the fact that there has been little French immigration to Louisiana to strengthen the creole, or Frenchspeaking population of the state.







The operators have so far tried to handle the well by passing the yield from one to another through a series of 30-barrel tanks, but as stated, the plan has not proved effective in separating the fluids, and a 500-barrel tank is now being constructed, in which it is expected the fluid will settle so that the water can be drawn off without wasting the oil.





EAST MIDDLESEX TEACHERS.

Continuation of Their Convention-Some Interesting Papers.

The East Middlesex Teachers' Association resumed their meeting yesterday afternoon in the county buildings, (with a large attendance. A number of well-prepared papers were given and much interest shown.

After roll call, Mr. G. B. Kennedy, of Pottersburg, gave a paper on "His-"History was a nation's life, and he considered its educational value far above what it is generally supposed to be. It imparted a vast amount of useful information and trained the memory. It also developed the style of reasoning and judgment which practical life most demand, and was superior to mathematics, which lacked the element of probability.

The paper was highly complimented President Liddicoatt followed with an excellent paper on "Composition." pointing out that vocal expression was instructive, but that speech came only by much speaking. By the art of writing the thoughts were preserved, and by the art of reading the contents of the written or unprinted page were again discussed. The teacher's main work was to lead the pupil to clear deas and increase his or her fund of language to express them. The teacher should seek to attain these two ends by conversations, stories, memory gems and written exercises. Mr. Spence, of Dorchester, gave a paper on "Reading as Thought Exercise." It contained some excellent

ideas. An informal meeting was held in the evening. A Toronto firm had examination charts and other school supplies exhibited. They were examined for some time by the teachers.
