



Y., Sept. 24.—In a heavy fog that prevailed this morning the yesterday by soldiers and about 1,000 westbound fast mail on the Central ran into the West Shore passenger and express train that had been held in one of the blocks a short distance west of Little Falls. The mail train had been brought to slow speed because of the foggy conditions. Otherwise there probably would have been considerable loss of life. The injuries are confined to railway postal clerks, three of whom have been taken to the hospital at Little Falls. The severest injury is to W. E. Gilbert, of Syracuse, who has a broken jaw. The express messenger on the mail train was slightly injured, and several of the postal clerks have slight bruises. Passengers in the sleeping car on the passenger train were thrown about to some extent, but the railroad company reports that there were no infuries beyond those of slight nature.






