ASK THE CITY TO GUARANTEE THE MIDLAND RAILWAY BONDS

Board of Trade Are Inclined to Favor the Scheme of Mr. A. E. Welch-People Would Have to Vote on the Question II the Council Should Decide to Take It Up.

The council of the board of trade, at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, considered a proposition to assist in the financing of the Midland Railway, which is being promoted by Mr. A. E. Welch. The proposition, as outlined, is that the city shall guarantee the interest on \$250,000 worth of bonds, and the municipalities must guarantee

In return for this these municipalities will be given a first mortgage on a road costing \$1,000,000. The rest of the money will be raised by the promoters, by the sale of stock, etc. The council of the board were quite favorable to the suggestion, but

nothing definite was done. PEOPLE MUST VOTE.

Some details of the scheme must be worked out, and then the board will proably recommend that the agreement be sent to the city council. The aldermen will have to secure an expression of opinion from people on the question. If the council agree to accept it, a vote will be asked for probably some time this summer. If an extension of time is given to the company, it may not come up until January next. In any event, the ratepayers will have to vote on the proposition.

GEN. R. E. LEE'S BRAVE BUT HOPELESS BATTLES

Interesting Address on Incidents of American Civil War by Inspector Edwards.

ng of the London Schoolmasters' Club yesterday afternoon. Edwards was the speaker, and gave a most interesting address on "General Robert E. Lee." After giving a very masterly survey of the early days of nection therewith, he went on to dis-cuss the last dramatic chapter of that struggle, when after Gettysburg, the supreme effort of the confederacy, the Southern army made its last gallant stand. It was an evidence of the great belief in Lee, said the speaker, that this great defeat did not in any way cause his soldiers to lose faith in him. The speaker described graphically the terrible sufferings of the winter of man, six feet tall, and weigh nearly 1863 to 1864, and showed how Lee had in every detail shared the sufferings in every detail shared the sufferings of the common soldier. Then on May 2 there began Grant's systematic eflift great fort to "hammer" the south, where Lee with 62,000 men had to face Grant one day I overdid it, with 147,000, in one almost continuous wrenched battle till June 1, during which time the Wilderness, Chancellorsville, Spottsylvania and Cold Harbor, at which place Grant lost 10,000 men in an hour's fighting; gained a sanguinary acuteness of the situation as regards Lee had to flee with only 8,000 of his question.
