### HUSBAND WAS TRAITOR

Tragic Story of Russian Woman Revolutionist

Plotted to Betray His Wife Her Accidental Discovery

St. Petersburg, May 1.—The funeral resterday of Mme. Madezhda Baradina, a well-known revolutionist, who cles on account of her romantic his-

Mme. Baradina was the daughter of a rich manufacturer, of good social position, and left her home to engage in the revolutionary propaganda. She was sent to Kiev, where she was arrested and imprisoned for two years, being released in October, 1905, on condition that she went abroad, where she met M. Baradina, who was knewn as an energetic member of the organization, and married him.

A few days ago Mme. Baradina accidentally opened a letter showing that her husband was a traitor, who had successfully planned the arrest of an important group of terrorists and even proposed to bring his wife back to Russia, in order to deliver her into the hands of the police. The police advised him to delay the latter step in order to avert suspicion.

Mme. Baradina, after reading the letter, took poison. Her body was brought to St. Petersburg and was interred here yesterday, the coffin being buried under wreaths of crimson flowers.



London, April 30.—Dr. Alexander Graham-Bell said Sunday night that it was only a question of a brief period when the progress of aerial navigation would make it possible to have Inner in America and breakfast the ext morning in Europe, covering the istance across the Atlantic in considerably less than twenty hours.

"My expectation," said Dr. Bell, "is that an airship will be perfected capable of making 150 to 200 miles an hour. My opinion, however, is that the next step in aerial flight will take

that the Three Provinces Ask In Proposed Extension of the Boundaries-Manitoba Wants All the District of Keewatin, But Ontario Disputes Broad Claim As It Wants Northern Seaport.

The accompanying map shows the
provinces of Ontario and Manitoba
and the district of Keewatin which it
is proposed to divide between the two
provinces. Manitoba has asked for
the whole of Keewatin, as shown on
the map, which would give her a large
area to the north of Ontario, and between the latter province and the
shores of Hudson Bay.
Ontario has also asked that Keewatin be divided, but between the twe
provinces as shown in the cut, the division line following the present eastern boundary of Manitoba to the
Churchill River, and then along the
centre of that river to Hudson Bay,
leaving Fort Churchill in the territory
to be added to Manitoba.

This division would give each province a port on Hudson Bay aside
from that on James' Bay already in
the possession of Ontario, which has
long been claimed to be insufficient
for this province's needs.

In addition to the claims of the two
provinces mentioned, the new province of Saskatchewan is asking for an
extension of its territory northerly, so
as to secure a port on the great inland
sea. The portion of Keewatin desired
by Saskatchewan has not yet been
designated, and is, therefore, not
shown on the map.

The question of this extension was
raised by the application of Manitoba
for an increase of territory. The Dominion Government, with a view to
making an equitable distribution, to
enable the different claimants
together, in order to have their respective claims fully set forth before
the division is made.

Manitoba's claim apparently covers
all the territory under discussion except that to be allotted to Quebeo,
which includes that part of the district of Ungava which does not belong
to Labrador.

they should also extend eastward to
include the district of Keewatin, which
lies directly between Ontaric and
Hudson Bay, and would thereby out
off this province from access to that
body of water, except via James Bay
which is shallow.
Ontario's claim is that, while Manitoba should have her boundaries extended northward to Hudson Bay, all
the territory lying to the east of her
eastern boundary should go to this
province, including access to Fort
Churchill, which investigations have
shown, is the only deep water harbor
on the great inland sea.

In the memorandum submitted to
the Dominion Government, the claims
of Ontario are set forth as follows by

the Dominion Government, the claims of Ontario are set forth as follows by its representatives:

"(1) That in their opinion the boundaries of Manitoba should be extended northward so as to take in Fort

Churchill.

"(2) That they do not care to discuss any question of the alteration of the boundaries of Saskatchewan.

"(3) That in order to carry out the suggestion in paragraph 1, the eastern boundary of Manitoba should be produced northward until it strikes the Churchill River, that the middle of the channel of the said river should then become the boundary until the river debouches into Hudson Bay.

"(4) That the remainder of the territory of Keewatin lying to the eastward of such boundary line be allotted to the Province of Ontario."

These are backed up by a long and sarefully prepared argument dealing with the whole matter from its inception.

These suggestions if carried out would enlarge Manitoba's present area of 73,700 square miles to about 250,000 square miles, and that of the Frovince of Ontario from 260,868 square miles to about 450,000 square miles. Saskatchewan at the present time has an area of 250,560 square miles.

Accompanying their communication Ontario's representatives forwarded a memorandum containing extracts
from a number of reports of the Geological Department and other sources,
bearing out the contention that Port
Churchill is the only real port on Hudson Bay. The mouth of the Albany
River, Ontario's present northerly
boundary, cannot be entered by vessels drawing more than 10 or 11 feet
of water, and by them only at high
water.

Churchill River possesses a fine harbor. It has a depth of seven to ten fathoms and four fathoms at low water, and is perfectly sheltered for nearly a square mile in extent. The harbor is a safe one, its approaches are well marked, and it is admirably suited for a railway terminas. The necessary docks could be easily and cheaply-built, and the deep water basin enlarged at small cost. Stone is lying at the water's edge to be laid into docks and piers.

Policemen Green and Denny dashed upstairs, broke open the door, and saw Mrs. Mary Page, with a two-year-old girl baby in her arms, unconscious on the floor. A few feet away lay William, seven years old, and Teddy, five. The little child at the window was Hannah, nine years old. Denny picked up the mother and child and staggered to the street with them in his arms. Green turned to Hannah.

"Take the others. I'll follow you," the child said resolutely.

She clung to his coat tails as he went downstairs with the other children in his arms. They were all scorched pretty badly, for the flames had reached the second floor and quickly gutted it, as had been the case on the third floor. Denny fell unconscious when he reached the sidewalk.







It is significant that at Fernie, where Mackenzie King explained the law to the miners, the vote was unanimously in favor of returning to work at the old scale until the board can complete its investigations and render a verdict. Mr. King says this shows clearly that if the other camps could understand clearly the effect of the new law they would return to work. The vote was as follows:

The Standard Chain Co., Limited, will operate the new works, which are to be constructed at a cost of \$200,000.

24-Knot Boats Will Run In Near Future.

London, April 30.—(C. A. P.)—The Canadian Associated Press yesterday had undoubted authority to state that the fast Atlantic service which has been so long in contemplation will in the very near future be an accomplished fact. There is to be a 24-knot service across the Atlantic and a fast service on the Pacific, cutting down the time to such an extent that the route will practically command business. It is regarded as the greatest Imperial project approached for many years, making, as it does, the route from the Mother Country and Canada to Eastern countries the world's thoroughfare. It is very well understood here that Lord Strathcona and Clifford Sifton have devoted a great deal of time and consideration to the matter, and will probably, if an agreement is reached with the Government's consent, undertake to make the necessary arrangements to carry the enterprise into effect. There will Bridge Across Straits.



### **CROWNED BY SERENITY**

SIR WM. PEARCE HOWLAND. ACTIVE IN HIS 96TH YEAR.

Ploneer of Upper Canada, and a Participant in the Consummation of Confederation, He Was An Early Advocate of the Purchase of the Northwest Territory-Kindly, Old-Fashioned Hospitality Marked His Regime As Lieutenant-Governor of

Ninety-five years of life, a busy commercial and public career, crowned by a serene old age, in health and strength, is the happy lot of Sir William Howland. Few living Canadians have had such a lengthy and interesting career as this highly-respected citizen of Toronto. A pioneer in Upper Canada, a participant in the consummation of Confederation, an early advocate of the purchase of the Northwest Territory, Sir William has lived to see his adopted country develop as

first cast in his lot with the early set-lers.

An ancestor who came to America on the Mayflower in 1620 is one of the facts of lineage of which Sir William can boast. He was himself born in Dutchess county, New York, May 29, 1811, where he spent the early years of his life in farm work. In 1830, when he had almost reached manhood's es-tate, he came to Canada, and settled at Cooksville, in Toronto township, He worked for a time in a country store, carried the mail to and from the stage coaches passing along Dundas street, carried the mail to and from the stage coaches passing along Dundas street, and otherwise labored hard and cheerily under pioneer conditions. A few years later he began business for himself, his partner being his brother, the late Mr. Peleg Howland. Their business comprised lumbering and flour milling, and soon it extended, with branches, until Toronto and the adjoining townships were pretty well joining townships were pretty well covered. Subsequently Mr. Howland engaged in a wholesale business in

were happily able to complete the purchase. Later, Mr. Howland formed one of a company which made the first practical move to open up that great

Mr. Howland was a firm believer in the Confederation principle, and was one of the three delegates from Upper Canada at the London conference. He Canada at the London conference. He continued to hold office in the changing Governments, with one or two short intermissions, until July, 1868, when he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor for the new Province of Ontario. This post he filled until November. 1872. making his regime memor. ber, 1873, making his regime memor-ber, 1873, making his regime memor-able for his kindly, generous and old-fashioned hospitality. The honor of K. C. M. G. followed in 1879. Sir Wil-llam has ever since been connected with business enterprises of different kinds, such as banks and insurance companies, and takes a keen interest in the everyday hangeings of the

companies, and takes a keen interest in the everyday happenings of the world. Last spring he underwent an operation for appendicitis, but he is now well and active. It is said that his time more recently has been devoted to preparing a volume of reminiscences of his long and interesting career. Sir William has a host of friends, who admire his public career and personal character, and who wish him continued life and good health.

Who that has been to Winnipeg has not seen Deer Lodge, the quaint old road house on the road to Portage la Prairie, near Lord Strathcoma's place, salled Silver Heights, where everybody goes to "see the buffalo." This old house was burned down a short time ago, and while many references were made to it, perhaps the most interesting was one in The Edmonton Bulletin, given below, compiled from the recollections of an old fur trader, who knew the house "in its first glory." recollections of an old fur trader, whe knew the house "in its first glory." The fire occurred on the same night that witnessed in Pennsylvania the burning of John Wannamaker's handsome country seat. In the latter the flames destroyed over a million dollars' worth of property, rare tapestry and paintings and antique furniture in fifty rooms. On the other hand Deer Lodge was only valued at \$10,000, but with its passing went one of the few historical buildings of our young West.

Built by a Fur Magnate.

It was built in 1859 by John Rowan, son of the Chief Factor Rowan, who built the first Big House within the walls of Fort Edmonton in the early part of last century, as Chief Factor Hardisty built the second Big House outside the fort. Mr. Harrison Young, from whom this information was obtained, states that this John Rowan was for many years employed with the Hudson Bay Co. in Edmonton district. He was for several years in charge of Fort Pitt. Mr. Rowan later went down to the Red River district, and was noted as being one of the old brigade of Hudson Bay factors, who was largely instrumental in the carrying through of the negotiations which finally resulted in the amalgamation of the Hudson Bay Co. and Northwest Trading Co.
