Dr. Cecil Harris of Sheffield Mills who practised here for a while before going to Berwick, and lately left for Yarmouth, is now a member of the Military Medical Board now setting at Yarmouth.

Corporal A. F. Borden who left the County early in the war has returned to his home in Kingsport after a most trying experience. His career was cut quite short in the trenches as he was seriously wounded and captured by the Germans and they performed a successful operation on his skull wound after being in several prison camps he was sent home and glad was he to reach old Nova Scotia again. He was at Kentville on Thursday night and gave a most interesting account of his prison life and some of the scenes he witnessed. He said the lives of prisoners of war were saved by the parcels sent through the Red Cross as no one could live long under the prison rations alone served by the Germans. Corporal Borden went to Yarmouth on Friday to visit his sister, Mrs. W. H. Earnham and he spoke at Yarmouth Friday evening in the interests of the Y. M. C. A. Military Fund Campaign. He was a prisoner for twenty months and before he enlisted he was in charge of Fort Churchill, Hudson Bay for the Mounted Police. He has certainly had an experience in his short life.



The regular meeting of Town Council was held on Wednesday May 1st present Mayor Yould, Councillors Carroll, Hartlen, Wade, Blair, Porter, Young and Clerk.

In re North account from Halifax Industrial School Council Porter reported, this as settled as County clerk had accepted bill as joint account.

Streets Chairman Blair reported expenditure for April of 189.70 or total to date \$412.02 Waterworks Chairman Wade reported expenditure of 76.66 total to date \$323.46.

Schools Chairman Hartlen reported expenditure of \$10.76 for April total to date \$299.40.

Police Chairman Carroll reported expenditure of \$90.33 total \$403.28.

Paupers Chairman Porter reported expenditure of 62.43 or a total of \$160.36.

Finance Chairman, Porter reported receipts for month \$1688.78 and expenditure \$1733.44 Bank overdraft \$5728.37.

All these reports were received Petition from E. J. Bishop and others in re-obstruction on Church Avenue and fixing of sidewalk was referred to street Committee.

Mr. R. A. Neary was heard in reference to overassessment on stock and it was referred to Finance committee.

The clerk was instructed to pay A. W. Pattenon the sum of \$125.00 for furnace in town hall.

J. R. Neville was on motion, appointed fire inspector. Revisors were appointed as follows: H. G. Harris, J. R. Webster, and C. B. Lockhart.

On motion resolved that Coun's Wade, Blair and Carroll wait on Hon. H. H. Wickwire to get an appointment made as stipendiary Magistrate for the town.

Mayor Yould reported that Supt. Miller was asking for repairs to the Meadow Road from Sanatorium grounds and also for better lighting. Referred to Street Committee.

On motion resolved that a street light be put in between the Tully gate and Experimental Farm.

The Council announced a general clean up week from May 13th and all citizens are requested to observe same and make their premises as clean and tidy as possible.

The Town Clerk was allowed Wednesday afternoons off duty during the period the stores were closed for Wednesday afternoons.

And we know how bright that prospect is to the young but at the call of duty did not hesitate. So remembering this, let us be fully aroused to our duty and obligations to those who are making the sacrifice and contribute generously to the cause that means so much for the comfort and well-being of our men. Also remembering that even if we gave all we possessed materially, (unless we gave ourselves,) we would not be making any sacrifice comparable to theirs.
