General Intelligence. Colonial. Domestic. THE FIRE.—The Christian Messenger of May 20, says—We may inform our numerous enquiring friends who feel so much interest in our unfortunate position, occasioned by the fire, that we are still without redress. In accordance with advice given by the Committee of the House of Assembly, we have commenced proceedings against the HALIFAX FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY for the sum for which the house was partially insured, and for damages, against the parties concerned in putting it down. Nothing on the assurance made to us by parties concerned, that no doubt existed of our recovering for the amount sustained without difficulty; and it was important to avoid loss of time and further incumbrance on the property; we obtained the advice of friends, and in accordance with that advice have commenced rebuilding on the same site. Since doing so, however, we have found that the case cannot be brought before the Supreme Court until the Michaelmas term in December next. In the meantime we are left to meet the demands still due, for alterations and additions to the house previous to its destruction, as well as what will be shortly required for rebuilding, as we best can.

United States. THE MORMONS.—The National Intelligencer publishes a letter which presents very startling views of the power and designs of the Mormons. It is written by a gentleman who is said to have lately spent twelve months in the Salt Lake Valley, engaged in business connected with the transit of mail through the Territory and from the Pacific and while residing in the Mormon community, studied attentively the character and government of Brigham Young, the supreme head, as well as the customs, habits, morals, and laws of the community, if laws they may be called, which consists simply in the will of a despot. He confirms fully the statements and apprehensions of Dr. Drummond, and insists upon the necessity of taking some very prompt and decisive measures to protect the country from the dangers which threaten it from this quarter. He says the Mormons are 100,000 strong in Utah, besides having 200,000 slaves and agents scattered throughout the country, and being in close alliance with 300,000 Indians upon our Western border. The statements of his letter are entitled to the most careful attention.

Revival Intelligence. We have been favored with the perusal of a private letter dated "Strait of Canoe, April 3rd," and permitted to make the following extract: "After long waiting to have something pleasant to communicate, we at length endeavor to give you an account of the state of religion in this place. Mr. Naraway, during the month of March last, came down into Ship Harbor and agencies, and held protracted meetings; the result of which has been, in the hands of our dear Lord, a gracious revival, through the use of means which you are well acquainted. The Lord poured out His Holy Spirit, and this day in the chapel at Ship Harbor Mr. Naraway administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to somewhere about fifty or sixty persons, from both sides of the Strait.
