spected—British Ships Ready to Open Fire in Case of Hostility

There was a tower built in the build-

were lowered from the warships and immediatly after the vessels came around bows on and advanced in a line toward the Government pier. Each large launch carried a machine gun forward. There was a great crowd at the pier, but no hostile demonstration was made. The landing party marched without opposition to the custom house and hoisted the British flag thereon. A part of the marines occupy the principal square of the city. Rear Admiral Stephenson has declared martial law.

Order is maintained by the British marines, who patrol the streets. The populace is quiet. The landing party was commanded by Captain Frederick French, of the Royal Arthur. who immediately issued a proclamation assuring the citizens that their rights would be respected, and that they might pursue their vocations without fear of molestation. The proclamation also contained a warning that any acts of hostility would be opposed with the full force of the fleet.

A Colon despatch says that the Nicaraguan forces at Corinto withdrew, crossing the lagoon separating the town from the main land, and are now strongly entrenched there. The British ships had taken a position from which they can open fire if the Nicaraguan forces should attempt to interefere with the occupation of the town. Corinto is almost deserted, a bombardment having been generally expected.

GREAT FIRE IN MONTREAL

Donald's Tobacco Factory Damaged to VcDonald's Tobacco Factory Damaged to the Extent of \$750,000.

Montreal, April 26. — Montreal was visited by another big fire last evening, which destroyed several hundred thou-sand dollars' worth of property. Shartly before six o'clock flames were discovered in McDonald's tobacco factory, an im-mease structure covering several acres of ground on Ontario street. The flames,

which started in the tower of the building, made rapid headway and in a short space of time the whole upper portion of the building was in flames. When the fire broke out the factory was crowded with hands, many of them girls, who were just about finishing their day's work, and preparing to leave for their homes. The breaking out of the fire caused a panie. The exit was cut off, and many of the girls had to jump from the upper storeys of the building in order to save their lives. The ambulances were called out and several girls were removed to the hospital badly injured. It is reported that one girl was burned to death, but the report is not confirmed. The flames enveloped the whole of the upper storeys and worked downwards. The firemen seemed to be powerless, and, as the fire is still burning it Jooks as if the whole factory will be destroyed. The loss will be very heavy, probably \$750,000, and there is said to be no insurance. The factory is the property of W. C. McDonald, the tobacco man.

There was a tower built in the building for the express numers of ellowing. Ottawa, April 25.—In the House of Commons yesterday Colonel O'Brien fired hot shot at Hon. With such wall decorations for bedrooms and bachelor apartments, the old-fashioned chintz bed curtains' and valance of three generations ago have disappeared.



THE SENSE OF TOUCH.

These corpuscles are elliptical bodies, one to two millimetres in length. To the naked eye they appear to be clastic, semi-transparent bodies with white stripes. Other corpuscles resembthose found imbedded in the papillæ



Profitable Swine Raising.

Select the breed best suited to your fancy and surroundings, then breed pure. Avoid inbreeding, for no farm animal will so quickly deteriorate from it as the hog. Select a pure bred sow from one to two years of age, of good length, heavy quarters and a short snout. The bear should also be heavily quartered, well proportioned and evenly made. Sows should be bred to farrow about the middle of April and the pigs should be kept growing until ready far masket. Fall pigs, unless weighing from thirty to forty pounds when going into winter quarters, are usually unprofitable. Feed the brood sow sparingly of corn but give her plenty of bpan and middlings. Some feeders argue that a sow will do botter at farrowing if she be thin in fiesh. This is true if she has been fed on corn, but if fed as recommended above, she will do much better by her pigs if in good flesh. A few roots and an occasional feed of clover hay are very healthful and will be enjoyed by the sow. Care should be taken not to operfeed hear for a few days preceding farrowing and for two weeks after, as the pigs cannot dispose of too much milk at that age. This feature is of great value, as in the construction of stone streets it is necessary in many cases to spread thicker in the middle of the road than at the sides; if the scraper was stationary this could not be done, but as it is adjustable it can be spread thicker on one side than on the other.
