factory will be destroyed. The loss will
be very heavy, probably \$700,000, and
there is said to be no insurance. The
factory is the property of W. C. McDonald,
the local magnate.

the scuffle the revolver fell on the floor.
Two policemen scoured the woman,
who talked incoherently of the affair,
but persisted that the man had tried to
shoot her and she had simply taken the
weapon from her. She gave her name
as Mrs. Ellen Brown, of 29 Chertsey
street, and her husband had been
dead for three years.

A MYSTERY CLEARED UP

The Body of a Missing Man Found in the
Welland Canal.

St. Catharines, April 28.—The mystery
of the strange disappearance of John
Smith, which occurred on November 30
last, was cleared up yesterday afternoon
by the discovery of the badly decomposed
remains in the old Welland Canal. On
the night of his disappearance he was
around town and had been drinking
somewhat. At 11.30 he was seen outside
the central fire hall. He started for home
and was not seen again, nor could any
trace of his whereabouts be discovered.
All sorts of rumors were afloat but investigation
of them always proved them false and
the general belief was that he had
quietly gone to parts unknown. Mr.
Disterick, his employer, however, has
held to the idea that his man was drowned
in the canal and tried to induce the
superintendent to empty the level without
success. Failing this a tug was got
from Port Dalhousie, and by disturbing
the water tried to raise the body but
without effect. The water was yesterday
drawn out of the canal, according to
custom, and the body was discovered
just above lock 2. There were no signs
of violence on the body, and the pockets
all that was discovered was a bunch of
keys with a watch. The latter had stopped
not minutes before Smith was last
seen alive, which confirmed the theory
that he had fallen into the water while
crossing lock 2 to reach his home. The
body was taken at once to North Pelham
and interred.

THE BELL-HALL CASE

Something About the Family of the Girl
in England.

London, April 28.—Paraph investigation
into the affairs of the family of Miss
Emily Hall, who is supposed to have died
in an hospital in Detroit, and her rela-
tions with her supposed betrayer, Rev.
Jonathan Bell, elicits the fact that the
girl's mother never left her home in
England, and has been forwarded to her
by the post office authorities in Boston.
The latter had been accused by the Rev.
Jonathan Bell and had remained in the
Boston post office unaccounted for. It
was written by Miss Bell, and contained
serious allegations against Bell.
The girl's mother is prepared to turn
the letter over to the police. Her daughter,
she says, prior to her going to America,
resided in Bell's house six weeks last
summer, leaving there in August. She
was accompanied by the housemaid.
Bell was a frequent visitor at the home
of the Halls, but since his return from
America he has visited there only once on
business. He was not seen, and it was
rumored that he had been arrested. It
was learned that he had left his residence
from his home for two days. It is be-
lieved that he has left his district al-
together.
The excitement and indignation in the
neighborhood are increasing. The authori-
ties of the Methodist church, to which he
belongs, are inquiring into his finan-
cial affairs, and interesting revela-
tions may yet be made.
Mrs. Hall asserts that she frequently
remonstrated with Bell against his in-
correctness, and she expressed anxiety
that the American authorities
should take some action in the matter
of the girl's death.
The local police have informed Mr. Hall
that they are unable to act in the matter
in the absence of definite information
from America. Meanwhile, the affair
furnishes an intense sensation in the dis-
trict, and has caused the resignation
of the girl's father.
The girl was well known throughout
the neighborhood. She was accustomed
to preach and lecture, and was a candi-
date for assignment as lay preacher. Her
conversion is completely pronounced, and
she is in a critical condition.
