A REAL AMAZON - An East Prussian paper gives some particulars of the female soldier whose passage through Berlin was recently noticed. Her name is Maria Weiss. She was born at Schumburg, and educated at a respectable establishment at Haguit. She soon, however, evinced a singular preference for military attire, and as a civilian servant to a captain of the 60th Regiment at Treves, with whose family she had occasion to make long journeys to the south. Her good conduct induced her master to procure for her military education, so that she was competent to pass the ensign's examination. Shortly before the war, provided with a recommendation from the captain, and without being subjected to a strict surgical examination, she entered his regiment, and took part in the battle of Spicheren. Transferred to the Crown Prince's regiment, she succeeded in the battle of Gravelotte, first alone and afterwards supported by two of our men, in recovering the flag of the 16th infantry regiment which had been seized by the French. She received in this exploit four bullet wounds, one of which, in the knee, disabled her from walking. She received from Prince Frederick Charles for her bravery the second class of the Iron Cross, as well as an autograph certificate commending her services.

EXTRAORDINARY DISASTER - DISAPPEARANCE OF AN ISLAND THIRTY-SIX MILES LONG. - One of the most extraordinary occurrences ever announced, has just been reported as having taken place in the South Pacific Ocean. Captain Cook, of the barque Adolph, bound from Iquique to London, states that while passing the New Hebrides Islands, he discovered that the Aurora Island had entirely disappeared, and nothing whatever was to be seen of it on the face of the ocean. With the exception of eight or nine of the islands, Aurora is one of the largest and most fertile. It lies in lat. 12° S., long. 169° 25' E., and was about thirty-six miles in length, and upwards of five miles in breadth. It has been always known that two of the islands, Almyra and Tanna, contained volcanoes, but all the other islands were generally supposed to have little or no tendency to volcanic action. How or when the Island of Aurora and its inhabitants disappeared beneath the South Pacific, is at present unknown; but no doubt Capt. Cook will be able to give more particulars of the catastrophe on his arrival.

This "high tide" was a grand failure in Nova Scotia. At Halifax, Yarmouth and Windsor, the tides were not any higher than usual.
