THE DYNAMITERS.

The Stuff Esed in Recent Outrages Made in America.

London, April 14.—Col. Majendie, in his report on the recent dynamite at-tempts, says that the agent used was ligerica, the manufacture of which is not licensed in England. Further proof of its being American make, he asserts, is found in the fact that slabs of the material have been discovered, the paper wrappings of which are marked "Atlas Powder company." He says the clocks used in the infernal machines are also of American make, and the pistols were of a tyre common in America. It shows that lignin dynamite was a component of the informal machine imported in Malta from Bavaria in 1881, and was the agent of the explosion in Possil park, Glasgow and at the office of the London Times in 1883; that it was a component of the maching found in Liverpool on April, 1883, and of the cartridges found in Primrose Hill tunnel on January last. Since the arrest of Egan, a well known Fenien has quitted Birmingham.






