

## SALADS

BY H. L. RANN.



The salad is a time-worn specialty which is introduced between acts in order to interrupt eager guests who act as if there wouldn't be anything after the meat course but the finger bowls. It is served on individual plates, and is usually eaten with the wrong fork.

The object of the salad is to increase the price of admission and give everybody a breathing spell. By riving in a still-life study in hot-house tomatoes and California grapes, the caterer is able to persuade the hostess that he is about to lose money at \$4 per plate.

The salad is always worked into a meal at the precise moment when stout male guests begin to wonder if their dress suits will stand the strain. It makes a welcome hiatus and stimulates the flow of conversation on the part of the people who do not know whether they should use a spoon or a fork.

The simplest form of salad is made of undressed lettuce, ornamented with the pallid form of the hard-boiled egg. This salad has to be attacked with great vigor, as it is an agile and slippery preparation and is harder to eat gracefully than spaghetti. Many a man has stabbed desperately at a lettuce salad without securing a foothold, in the effort to keep up with somebody who was rounding the home stretch.

The fruit salad is a high-class stimulant which some people feel of gingerly and then glide away from with a guilty look. Very few people can eat somebody's first attempt at a fruit salad without wishing that they had gone to the skating rink or some other social function.

The average salad is not meant to palliate the appetite, but is thrown in as a scenic effect. It enables the hostess to show some original hand-painted china and thus arouse the envy of the neighbours, who eat the salad and then tip up the plate to see if the Haviland brand is on the back.

Salad is not indigenous to the homes of the common people, and when it is served at a company dinner the husband is liable to take it for a kind of dessert. It is getting so, however, that it comes as part of the regular equipment and is no longer an object of suspicion.





**Another Scandal**

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—In August last, several residents of Grand Falls made application to the Governor-in-Council for grants of land situate to the eastward of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company's property, that intention being to build up for themselves small homesteads.

To their great surprise, they have been informed that the first two lots measuring thirty-five chains frontage have been applied for and is to be granted to two Tory supporters. One of these two is a reporter on a Government newspaper, and the other, a well known funny, who acts for several large land grabbers, and who, in our opinion, in this instance, is acting for a Land, Timber, and Mineral Speculator.

It is manifestly unfair for the Government to make these grants in this section of the country, and thus be making the independent labourer and mechanic of this flourishing settlement subject to a few land grabbers, and thereby preventing them from building for themselves independent homes. It has been stated, these were the first two applicants for land in that locality. About this, there is room for doubt, and that legally the Government cannot refuse these Grants. It may or may not be legally right, but it is morally right for the Government to hand over to two speculators as payment for past political services, a tract of land with almost one mile frontage, in the vicinity of one of the most flourishing and up to date towns on the Island, and thereby compelling those who wish to build near by their work, to pay any price that those land grabbers may ask, or go without the home building which they had planned? This would mean a valuable tract of land unoccupied. This, we consider, Mr. Editor, most unfair and a reproach to any Government. The District of Twillingate on the whole have not received that consideration and attention which it deserves.

We are now within a few months of four years since Sir Edward Morris took charge of the Government. He has had ample time and an abundance of opportunity to show what he could do. He has held four sessions of the Legislature, and the country is now able to size him up as Prime Minister. The popular judgment has already been given informally and it is by no means flattering to him and his confederates. He inaugurated a party, leavened largely with a Tory element, which arrogated to itself the title of People's Party, and set forth the claim that it was to be the party whose special duty would be to look after the interests of the industrial classes of the community—the Fishermen, the Farmer, the Mechanic, the Laborer, the Clerks and all who work for a living.

### Garden Cities.

Henry Vivian Describes What Is Being Done in England.

Henry Vivian, chairman of the co-partnership tenants' movement in England and ex-member of Parliament from Birkenhead, recently described the growth of the garden city idea in England.

To illustrate the value of suburban garden towns for the housing of workmen of large cities and their families Mr. Vivian gave some interesting statistics. He said that the average child of seven years brought up in one of these communities had been shown to be three inches taller than the average child of the same age living in a densely populated city.

At the age of fourteen the difference was still more marked. A garden city youth of this age averaged five inches more in height and thirty pounds more in weight than one of the same age from the big cities. In some of the crowded manufacturing towns of England, he said, the death rate was forty for every thousand inhabitants, while in garden cities the rate had been reduced to between eight and nine thousand.

These statistics were gathered by a committee of Parliament of which Mr. Vivian was a member. On the report of this committee the housing and town planning act was passed in 1909 by Parliament. This act gave government support to the building of ideal suburbs around the great centres of population in the British Isles.

The co-partnership tenants' movement, Mr. Vivian said, had designed suburbs near Liverpool, Hampstead, Ealing, Manchester, Birmingham, Stoke-on-Trent and elsewhere. The most perfect type of the garden city, he said, was at Hampstead. One of the cardinal principles in laying out such a suburb, he said, was to leave the trees untouched so far as possible. The land is parcelled into large lots, so that on an average there are not more than two houses to an acre.


The laws governing such suburb building prevent land speculation and are all framed for the benefit of those who are to live there. Any kind of home may be built, from a cottage to a mansion, the building restrictions providing, however, against structures which would mar the architectural harmony.

Large spaces are set aside for parks and playgrounds. The gardens are the distinguishing feature of these suburbs, as those dwelling in them are aided by the city in surrounding their homes with flowers.

Hampstead is laid out so that the view up and down every street ends in the sight of a handsome house, the speaker said. The suburb at Hampstead covers between 700 and 800 acres and is building for a population of 30,000. Factories are allowed, but they are built in an area set apart from them, where they do not mar the beauty of the community. Care is taken to place them where the prevailing winds will blow the smoke and odors away from the city. The garden city at Hampstead, Mr. Vivian said, was the most beautiful city in the world.

### Rough Passage.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 4. The Turkish Ambassador, here has been directed by the Ottoman Government to inform Britain of Turkey's willingness to receive assistance in bringing about a suspension of hostilities. Tewfik Pasha immediately went to the Foreign Office and conferred with Sir Edward Grey for four hours. The Balkan nations and Greece are persistent in their determination that Turkey must arrange directly with them the terms of peace, without intervention by the European Powers.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 4. A correspondent of the Chronicle, who was with the Turkish Commander-in-Chief during part of the operations, calls the Battle of Thrace an appalling and terrible defeat, 40,000 of the flower of the Turkish troops having fallen, while Abdullah Pasha himself narrowly escaped the fate of 75 per cent of his artillery, who were made captives.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, Nov. 4. The French Government has refused the appeal of the Turkish Government to take the initiative in bringing about intervention by the great Powers to stop hostilities and impose an armistice on the Balkan States. The French Foreign Office points out that for France to take the course suggested would be contrary to international law, and would make her appear as siding against the Balkan States. France can only, it was added, consider, in accord with all the great Powers, a request for mediation, properly so called, if such a request be addressed to her.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, Nov. 4. The Bulgarian troops have now occupied Buk, on the Saloniki-Constantinople railroad, and this, with the possession of Nevelop, finally cuts off communication between the Turkish army in Macedonia and the Turkish garrison of Adrianople. Turkish troops on Saturday attacked the Bulgarian left flank, but were repulsed, and put to flight, the Bulgarians capturing five officers and 1,200 men, in addition to a quick-firing battery.

The spoils captured by the Bulgarians at Lule Burgas included deposits of clothing, arms, stores, fifteen camels, search-lights, and telegraphic instruments. Prisoners taken by the Bulgarians say that a Prussian officer named Tentell, who held the rank of Colonel in the Turkish Army was killed by his own men after the disastrous action at Lule Burgas. The prisoners say they went into action in a famished condition. The meal had received only one biscuit or a half loaf of bread for three or four days. Many of them deserted to the Bulgarians.

USKUB, Nov. 4. Advances of the Servians toward Monastir and Saloniki are progressing successfully. The defeat of the Turks at Kumanova was so complete that the pursuing Servians found the Turkish troops had abandoned the impregnable positions of Katchanilass and Ovitopolis where it was expected would be the scene of desperate resistance. When the Servians reached the Pass they found the Turks had fled in the wildest confusion, leaving twenty-one guns, numerous rifles and piles of ammunition. At Kratora the Turks left one hundred and thirty field guns behind them.

PARIS, this a.m. The French attitude in regard to the Turkish appeal for mediation is shared by England and Russia. The Turkish proposals are as follows:—First, that the Powers offer, and it need be, enforce an armistice on the belligerents; second, that the Powers profit by the armistice to invite the belligerents to make known to them the terms of peace necessary to harmonize the conflicting terms of the belligerents. In refusing to act Premier Poincaré declared France was unable to accept the suggestion about the armistice without furnishing the Balkan allies guarantees relative to conditions of peace. An armistice, Poincaré said, would check the advance of the allies at the height of their victories, and give the Turks time to re-organize and strengthen their armies.

### A Wonderful Experiment.

Kept Vital Organs Alive for Ten Hours After Removal from Body.

New York, Oct. 26.—Another step forward in Dr. Alexis Carrell's experiments looking to the prolongation of life is announced at the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research. Some time ago Dr. Carrell created a sensation in the scientific world by keeping a fragment of tissue from a chicken heart, "alive" for 104 days.

Now he has succeeded in separating from the body of an animal the heart, stomach, liver, ureters, kidney and bladder and in having these organs live and functionate under his eyes for ten hours.

To accomplish this result, the excised organs were placed in a solution, supplied with blood aerated continuously by oxygen pumps and kept at the requisite temperature by an apparatus much like an incubator.

The aim of Dr. Carrell's experiments was thus expounded by him in a recent address: "If it were possible to transplant immediately after death the tissues and organs which compose the body into other identical organisms, no elemental death would occur and all the constituent parts of the body would continue to live."

Dr. Carrell has received the Nobel prize, amounting to \$40,000, this year for Medical Research. He is a Frenchman, and before accepting his present position was a Professor in McGill University, Montreal. The doctor is yet under 40 years of age.

### 60 Women Go to Gaol.

Refuse to Pay the Fines Imposed at Sydney.

Sydney, N. S. W., Oct. 30.—For wearing hats that protruded too far, 60 women most of them prominent, were tried, convicted and fined to-day in a Sydney court. They went to jail rather than pay their fines, declaring they would not submit to "iniquitous and unnecessary legislation."

The city authorities face a situation similar to that growing out of the suffrage demonstration in England, as the women assert that if further arrests and imprisonment are ordered because of the hatpin ordinance they will declare a "hunger strike."

### Big Vote in Election Contest.

Special Evening Telegram.

**NEW YORK, To-day.** The most vigorous presidential fight of recent years came to an end to-night with the leading candidates for the nation's chief office continuing their personal appeals to voters almost to the last moment. Almost more than the Presidency is at stake in these elections. The Republican forces have endeavored to prevent the overturn of loyal organizations or the capture of legislatures of states heretofore republican. Democrats have made an organized assault upon a number of states so that a majority of Senators may be swung to their party and to vote against the republican predictions that the Senate will remain republican. The democratic leaders claim enough of states to give them a Senate and greatly swell the majority in the House of Representatives, which they captured in 1910. The influence of women in the campaign will probably be greater than in any previous election. Each national headquarters has had an organized bureau to appeal to women, well known in public and social life. In six western states where women will vote, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, California, Idaho and Washington their ballots will be an active factor in the result. In five other States, Michigan, Kansas, Oregon, Wisconsin, the right of women to vote will be an issue at the Polls. Uncertainty is caused by the third party ticket. More than ordinary urgent appeals of party managers for all voters to go to the Polls, and the local machinery indicate a record vote in almost all sections of country.

### The Phonograph King.

Clever Performer Now Engaged at Nickel Theatre.

When the announcement was made last week that Mr. J. W. Myers had been engaged at the Nickel Theatre there were exclamations of great surprise on every hand. But the announcement is true nevertheless, and can be verified by the fact that Mr. Myers appeared at the Nickel last night to the delight of the large audience present. Mr. Myers is the self-same artist who was identified for many years with the Edison Phonograph, and was principally engaged in making vocal records. He is the possessor of a charming voice, deep, rich and powerful, and will continue to please the musical tastes of Nickel-goers for many weeks to come.

### Men Tarred Young Woman

Norwalk, Ohio, Oct. 25.—Six men were arrested yesterday at West Clarkesfield on indictments charging them with riotous conspiracy in connection with the recent tarring or painting of Minnie LaValley, a young woman of that village.

A seventh man was arrested on an indictment charging perjury in connection with his testimony before the occurrence. Reginald Thomas, constable, was among those charged with the attack on the girl.

The seven arrested are to be arraigned here to-day.

Minnie LaValley was seized on the street of the village the night of August 20, divested of her clothing, and smeared with tar or paint. It was alleged that women, dressed as men, had taken part in the attack. This the finding of the grand jury denied.

## LATEST War News

Special Evening Telegram.

**LONDON, To-day.** The prospect that a considerable portion of the defeated Turkish Army will be able to reform behind the lines of Tebratali, the last fortifications before Constantinople, is not altogether excluded, but whether the Turks will be able to maintain a serious resistance to the Bulgarian advance, a question which remains of doubt, in the struggle the Turks have lost more than half of their artillery. The Servians alone claim to have captured at least 300 guns. This will certainly militate against any prolonged stand at Tebratali. In a circular note to Turkish Ambassadors abroad the government maintains although embarrassed the position of affairs is not desperate. It declared when the allies had completed mobilization that they had barely begun theirs. The note insists that Turkey is still able to maintain a prolonged warfare. Up to the present there is no sign of any outcome to the Porte's appeal to the Powers for mediation. No replies have been received. They will embody a refusal to consider the idea of proposing an armistice. Apparently Bulgaria is in no mood to negotiate for peace at the present time.

The woodwork in the kitchen near the stove had ignited, and the western and central firemen, who were on the scene, quickly quenched the blaze. Not much damage was done in either case.

### Theft Reported.

SEAMAN PINSENT OF S. S. PORTIA LOSTS \$50.

An alleged robbery is reported to have occurred on board the s.s. Portia. The loser of the money is a seaman named Pinsent, and the amount lost is \$50.00. Thursday last was the last time Pinsent saw his money. He counted it and then placed it in a valise, which he put in his bunk in the fore-cabin. Yesterday when the ship left Cape Breton, the last port of call, Pinsent came off watch. He went to pay a visit to his "dough" and was dumbfounded to find that it had vanished. He immediately acquainted Capt. Kean of his loss, who in turn on the ship's arrival reported the matter to the police. Supt. Gormes took the matter in hand, and before any of the crew were allowed ashore had two detectives make a thorough search of their rooms. It was without avail, however, as there was no sign of the missing money. The detectives questioned some of the seamen and stokers, but were unable to glean any information of the robbery. Pinsent has not the least suspicion of anyone on board taking his money. No arrest has yet been made. The police told the Telegram that they are satisfied with Pinsent's story that the money has disappeared. They have little, if any, clue to work on, but are hopeful of solving the problem.

The trial will begin on November 7. District Attorney Whitman appeared before Justice Goff to-day and asked that a special panel of 200 talesmen be summoned for the case.




