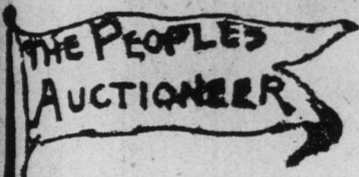

**At the House.**

THURSDAY, May 27th. Mr. Kent presented a petition asking that the Newfoundland Building Association be incorporated.

The petition was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the following:—Mr. Kent, Mr. Lloyd, the Premier, Mr. Moulton, Mr. Coaker, Mr. Higgins, Mr. Bennett, Mr. Emerson.

Mr. Woodford presented petitions re wharf and road.

The Prohibition and Volunteer Force Bills were read a third time and sent to the Upper House for concurrence.

The Council's amendment to the Patriotic Association Bill was concurred in and sent back to the other Chamber.

A despatch was laid on the table informing the House of the appointment of Mr. Bonar Law, as Secretary of State for the Colonies. The Council's Amendments to the Municipal Bill were read a second time. These were mainly the amendments proposed by Mr. Lloyd, which were supported by the Government but endorsed and adopted by the Upper House. The amendments had the effect of allowing the present Commissioners an extra twelve months to finish their work, ending June 1916. The original clause provided to give the Board an extension of only six months.

Mr. Kent was of the opinion that the amendments were a great improvement to the Bill. Twelve months ago he had expressed himself, which he reiterated now, that the old Council should go on as it was going and that a special Commission be appointed to formulate a new system of Civic Government. They were now in office about a year, but to terminate their term in the middle of their work would stultify everything the Commissioners had done. In all probability, said Mr. Kent, they will be able to make some remedy for civic improvement when they come into this House next winter, with their reports, whereas if they had gone out of power in the meantime their work would be incomplete and would be taken up incompletely by other people who would necessarily have to go over the same ground again. The amendments were concurred in and sent back.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the Council's amendments to the Logging Bill. Mr. Coaker objected to most of the amendments which were entirely in favor of the Logging Companies and were unjust to the men. He suggested that the matter be taken up in Committee with a view of effecting a compromise.

Mr. Kent found a way to adjust the disagreement existing between both Houses, regarding the Logging Bill. He proposed that a Select Committee of both Houses meet and discuss fully the differences about the Bill, that a satisfactory compromise could be made and a law enacted satisfactory to all concerned. It matters are allowed to remain as they are nothing would be arrived at. Mr. Kent's solution to the difficulty was acted upon and the following members comprised the Select Committee:—Messrs. Kent, Lloyd, Coaker, Emerson, Clapp, Moulton and Higgins.

Mr. Clapp rose and indignantly complained of the unfair treatment meted out to his district (Bonnie Bay) from time to time by the present Government. He first asked the reason why the motor ferry boat was discontinued running between Woody Point and Norris' Point. In 1913, shortly before the elections the boat was put into operation for the conveyance of passengers to and from those places. It appears that the boat was taken out in 1914 and substituted by an ordinary row boat. He (Mr. Clapp) then brought down to the House an influentially signed petition to have matters remedied and he was given the impression that the Government had accepted the request until he recently received a letter from a prominent clergyman of the district complaining of a row boat being used. An extraordinary circumstance is, said Mr. Clapp, that this gasoline boat was authorized to be run by the Public Works Department which also sent a supply of gasoline to a Government supporter at Bonnie Bay. However, the motor boat was not allowed to run after the elections were over. It must be borne in mind, emphasized the indefatigable member for the district, that Bonnie Bay contributes a considerable amount to the revenue of the Colony and deserves, at least, a passing notice from the Government. In 1914 Bonnie Bay paid \$10,128 and there was no reason at all why the people there should be deprived of the use of a paltry ferry boat whereas Pogo could get a large wharf erected in election year that cost the Government \$12,000. In addition Mr. Clapp pointed out that there was not a single public building in his district. The Post Office was a disgrace prior to the elections, a fact that the Premier knew well. In conclusion he asked that some provision be made to supply a much needed motor boat or allow the former ferry to be reinstated and that the people be given a convenience for travelling between the points mentioned.

### Something for Nothing

The Government carried last night in the House of Assembly their resolutions to allow the export of pulpwood from the Labrador for ten years. This is a reversal of the policy which governed the Bond party and the Morris party for the past twelve years. The very fact that such a permission was likely to be given at this session of the Legislature has gladdened the hearts of those interested in timber licenses on the Labrador, and there is quite a large number of friends of the Government party who have secured licenses to cut timber there since 1909. The rumor that such a course was probable has also had the effect of causing quite a rush for timber areas in that dependency. The course pursued last night is quite in keeping with what was done in 1911. Under the law which governed licenses before that date, they were liable to have their licenses taken away from them for not paying the rents due after a certain time and also for not complying with other conditions of the license relating to surveying and the erection of saw mills or pulp mills. By the law passed in 1911, licenses became forfeitable only for non-payment of rent, but not for non-fulfillment of other conditions of the license. The re-issuing of licenses from the latter obligations for that is what the change amounts to in practice was strongly opposed by Sir Robert Bond and the Opposition of that date. By the law, which is now being made, licensees on the Labrador are being relieved of their obligation of not exporting timber in an unmanufactured state from the Labrador. This is a very considerable concession to these licensees and they are put in a position as speculators to dispose of their limits on more favorable terms to suppliers of pit props and pulpwood to pulp and paper mills in Great Britain and the United States. They are placed on the same level as those who

### At the House.

(Continued from third page.)  
Mr. Kent said that he had listened with considerable interest to the remarks of the Prime Minister, but nothing that he had said appealed to him. He was prepared to go as far as possible in order to assist the Empire and her Allies, but did not believe that a measure such as that before the House should be brought under such a guise. The cutting of timber for export is a matter that today is receiving the most careful consideration of every country in the world that has such resources. It is a well known fact that we are particularly rich in these resources both in Newfoundland and Labrador, and the first duty of the Legislature should be to make the best of our resources. Owing to exceptional circumstances arising out of the war we had a request from the Imperial Government and the Republic of France, whose sons are fighting side by side with the Empire's sons in this great struggle that the Colony allow the exportation of its products to facilitate the work in the mines. This was helping the Empire and all were unanimous that Newfoundland should do her share in every way possible. To extend a license for indiscriminate cutting of timber was another matter. We are continually hearing complaints regarding the three mile limits due to indiscriminate cutting. What cleared out the forest areas of the State of Maine, of Ontario and of Quebec but the indiscriminate cutting. Mr. Kent then referred to the fact that on the opening of the debate on the Speech from the Throne he had read a clipping from the "Standard of Empire" which he again read to the House. He contended that the item showed that a campaign had been initiated to provide a license to cut such timber as referred to for an indefinite period. The speech combined with previous information was in his opinion sufficient proof that such a campaign had been in progress. He contended that the information was only apparent since the introduction of the Bill, though the Government was to show that the "Standard of Empire" had come from an authoritative source. "The pulp wood industry is a remunerative one," said the X. D. of the N. D. Co. and Albert Reed Co. would not continue their business as they have done. No effort has been made by the Government to show that it is impossible to profitably carry on the business. In the event of a Legislature permitting the exportation of timber, they should in the first place establish a code of laws for a proper system of re-forestation of trees. He would not support the Bill for the period of the war only, but not from Newfoundland for any time, because the supply on the Labrador was sufficient to meet all the requirements of the authorities. He was of the opinion that we should hesitate before passing such a Bill. The passing of the Act in its present form will mean the destruction of the forest areas one of the most valuable resources of the Colony.  
Mr. Coaker made a practical speech along similar lines, and held that there should be no timber industries in the Colony. He, too, believed that a campaign such as referred to by Mr. Kent had been initiated and referred to the fact that members of the Government were interested in the companies possessing timber limits on the Labrador areas and would naturally support the Bill for that reason. Mr. Emerson, the Colonial Secretary and Mr. Higgins supported the Bill, disclaiming any personal interest in the success of the measure.  
Mr. Halford would favor the Bill if it were to assist the Empire and her Allies, but thought that general exportation was an entirely different matter.  
Mr. Winsor stated the case of the people of his district, who would be materially affected by the passing of such a measure.  
Mr. Lloyd was pleased to notice the disclaimer of the members of the Government who had stated that they were not personally interested in the Bill. By the Bill of 1914 the licenses of timber limits had been released from certain obligations, and now the House was asked to release them from further obligations. It was a well known fact that the campaign referred to in the "Standard of Empire" was carried on last fall.  
Mr. Grimes and Mr. Hickman also expressed their disapproval of the Bill.  
Mr. Kent moved an amendment to the Resolutions which embodied permission to export pit props from Labrador during the War, but not from Newfoundland and opposed the granting of licenses to cut and export pulp wood from the Labrador for ten years. It was lost on a party vote.  
At 12.30 the Committee rose and the House adjourned.

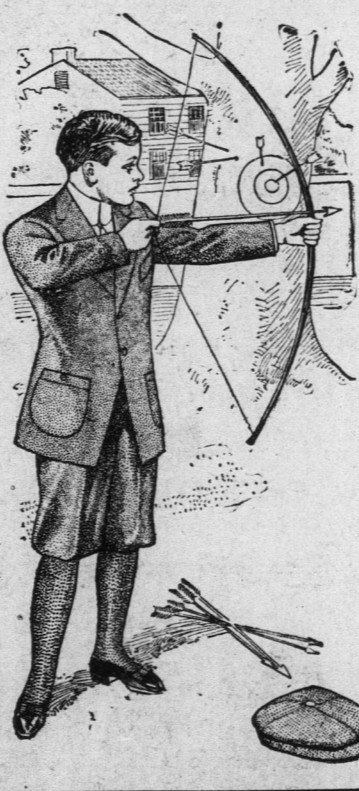

General French reports continued progress east of Pestubet, prisoners being captured. The First Army has since May 16th pierced the enemy's line of front extending three miles. Total prisoners, 8 officers and 777 men. Ten machine guns also were captured.  
Two women were killed and one child injured by Zeppelin bombs at Southampton last night. Little material damage was done.  
The French Government report very violent fighting, all gains maintained, and progress made at various points.  
The French air squadron bombarded one of the largest German explosive factories at Ludwigshaven, striking several buildings and causing many fires.  
The Russian Government reports desperate fighting continues on both banks of the San. **BONAR LAW.**

### FRENCH OFFICIAL.

#### PARIS, May 27.

In Belgium along the Yser Canal, intermittent artillery engagements have taken place. In the section north of Arras the day has been marked by several actions of an intense character which gained for us new successes.  
In the region of Angres the enemy delivered two counter-attacks, but was twice repulsed. We remain masters of the positions conquered by us. German losses very heavy.  
Further south, east of Ablain, a vigorous attack by troops who had previously taken Carency and a greater part of Ablain, resulted in the occupation of German trenches in front of the village cemetery. Immediately afterwards we carried the cemetery itself where the enemy was strongly organized, and we then advanced beyond the cemetery. We took 400 prisoners, among whom were several officers.  
In the region of Eurcie and Rollincourt there has been a severe artillery combat between Arras and the Vosges the day was calm.

### BELGIAN OFFICIAL.

#### HAVRE, May 27.

The Belgian official report of May 26th, says: Artillery bombarded our advance posts and the village of Costkerd. Our batteries replied successfully, notably in the direction of Schoore, where bursting shells caused fire and violent explosions.

### ITALIAN ADVANCE.

#### GENEVA, May 27.

A sharp Italian advance guard crossed the Isorno to-day after a sharp fight with an Austrian force, and have arrived before Monfalcone, 20 miles from Trieste. The first of the Austrian wounded are now landing at the latter place. The Italians also attacked at several points along forty miles of the Carinthian frontier. A battle is now raging around Ploken also west of the Pradedl Pass in Austria. Italian forces are now marching on Gorz, and Gradisca.

### TURKS SUSTAIN HEAVY LOSSES.

#### LONDON, May 27.

A statement given out to-night by the official Press Bureau says that the losses of the Turks in the recent fighting in the Dardanelles were considerably heavier than had been supposed. The statement was in the form of a report from Major General Birdwood, transmitted to-day from Cairo. It follows:  
To-day, General Birdwood reports that during the suspension of fighting in order that the Turks might bury their dead, much larger losses than 5,000 dead, already reported, came to light. Two areas in front of one of our sections, where heavy punishment of the enemy had not previously been reported, were covered with dead. Corpses counted in an area of 80 by 100 yards numbered about 400.  
Turkish burying parties worked quietly and quickly. They were all supplied with cotton wool, prepared with some solution to deaden the stench, a most necessary precaution.  
Over 1,200 Turkish rifles were picked up on our side of the dividing line during the suspension of hostilities.  
On the 25th an advanced trench of 150 yards, in front of General Cox's brigade, was rushed and occupied by our men.

### GERMAN AEROPLANE DESTROYED.

#### PARIS, via St. Pierre, May 27.

A German aeroplane, which was making a course for Paris this morning, came in contact with our air fleet near entrenched fortifications, and dropped in its flight several bombs, without any result, upon Villenoy near Meaux. Our air fleet at the front was immediately notified, and kept a look out for the German, and on his return shortly afterwards, the German plane, loaded with bombs was brought down by our aviators near Braupe, Soissons, and the two German airmen were killed. Our aerodrome of Brayelle, near Douai, The sheds and instruments were struck.  
**'ADRIATIC' SAILS.**  
NEW YORK, May 27.  
The White Star liner *Adriatic* left New York to-day for Liverpool with 285 passengers and 18,000 tons of general cargo and munitions, an unusually large manifest. Among the passengers is Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Only three passengers were Americans. (See 7th page.)

## A Coward's Weapon.

It is as easy to laugh as to cry, says the optimist cheerfully. Quite true. And sometimes it's easier, may more, sometimes it's altogether too easy. Ridicule is a weapon which not one person in a hundred knows how to handle fairly, wisely and with proper restraint. And yet it lies ready to the hand of the most unjust, the most prejudiced, the most uncontrolled.

Bringing the Millennium a Million Years Nearer.

If it were as easy to make people think as it is to make them laugh the millennium would be about a million years nearer.

Not long ago I attended a mass meeting in favor of a certain reform with a woman who does not believe in the cause. She hates rattle, caustic wit and she turned it against every speaker and every incident of the evening. She soon had the people about her in the mood for seeing the ridiculous in the most commonplace thing. The serious side of the meeting was entirely forgotten, a spirit of mockery and ridicule crowded it out.

I do not call that fair or just. The woman is clever but she could find a better use for her cleverness than that. Hadn't she a perfect right to see the funny side of the thing, you may ask. Yes, a right in one sense, but not in another. You remember what Phillips Brooks said, "We don't have a right to all our rights." The right to try to make a sane seagious movement seem ridiculous is emphatically one of the rights we don't have a right to.

Easier to be a Martyr Than a Laughing Stock.

Ridicule is all too often the weapon of cowardice and injustice. If I were absolutely unscrupulous and I wanted to fight some good man or some high cause I would not try to blacken the man's character or prove the cause wrong. I'd just try to make the man or the cause ridiculous. That would be a much safer and surer way of accomplishing my purpose. If the truth were known, I think we should find that ridicule makes more backsliders in any great cause than persecution. It is easier to be a martyr than a laughing stock.

One reason why people like to join in ridiculing anything is simply that they like to laugh. Another quite as potent is that the attitude of derision gives them a false sense of superiority.

The Sense of Humor versus the Habit of Ridicule.

To ridicule a person does not prove that you are any cleverer, any wiser, any wittier than he. It probably proves that he is in earnest about something and you aren't.

It is the American habit to exult the sense of humor. That's all right. But remember, a sense of humor and the habit of ridicule are not the same thing. A sense of humor that gives us the grace to see our own absurdities and the funny side of our daily annoyances and to laugh with tolerant, tender mirth at the follies of our friends is one thing; a habit of ridicule that makes us always ready with a derisive sneer is quite another.

### A Tribute

To a Gallant Newfoundlander's Memory.

The Rev. Dr. Geo. J. Bond, of Halifax, sends us the following: At the Convocation of the Nova Scotia Technical College in Halifax, last Friday afternoon, in the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor and a distinguished audience, the following tribute to the late Gordon V. Boone was given by Principal Sexton in the course of his address to the graduating class:

"We have to honor here to-day the memory of one of our graduates who recently gave up his life in the bloody battle of Langemarck, where the Canadians gloriously held the flower of the German veterans from crashing through the thin way line of trenches on the east of the Yser. Gordon Valentine Boone of the class of 1913 perished in this assault. His memory will be dearly cherished by all who knew him. He was a native of Newfoundland and came to Mount Allison to take his first two years preparatory work before entering the electrical engineering course at the Technical College. After graduation he entered the employ of the Canadian General Electric Company and was among the first to enter the First Contingent. He was an excellent athlete and an eminently satisfactory student. He possessed the strength of character, the initiative, the modest, clear-headed efficiency, the capacity for sustained effort and other British qualities which in the mass of our soldiers will eventually demolish the inhuman, smashing German juggernaut. We mourn that we shall never grasp his hand again, but we shall ever honor his memory in giving his all for the ideals he cherished."

A LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. The battleship Majestic was a vessel of 14,900 tons and 10,000 horsepower capacity. Her officers and crew on a peace footing aggregated 751 men. The Majestic was built in 1895, and carried four twelve inch, twelve six inch and sixteen three inch guns and twelve three-pounder guns. In addition she was armed with five 18-inch torpedo tubes. The sinking of the Majestic makes the fifth British battleship lost in the Dardanelles campaign, and the second by hostile submarine, the Triumph having been sent to the bottom of the Gulf of Sars last Wednesday. The French also have lost one battleship in the Turkish campaign. About the same time, the steamer Princess Irene, which was built last year for the Canadian Pacific British Columbia coast service and which was taken over by the Admiralty at the commencement of the war, was accidentally destroyed by an explosion while at anchor at Sheerness, where she was undergoing repairs. The submarine menace is growing both in the Aegean Sea and homewards. These vessels promise to take an active part in the operations in the narrow waters around the Adriatic, where, as in the Aegean, the numerous islands afford good shelter. The Admiralty still believes the American steamer Nebraska, now on her way to Liverpool, was torpedoed. In addition to the British steamer Morwenna, bound for Canada, and the Danish steamer Betty, have been sunk by submarines. Only a few days ago, a commander of a submarine informed a Danish captain he had no orders to sink Danish vessels.

Amongst the activities on land, sea and air from the Dardanelles to the waters around the British Isles, Central Galicia remains the scene of the greatest and most important fighting. There the Austrians and Germans continue to batter the Russian lines northeast and southeast of Przemyel.

Italy reports successes. ROME, To-day. An official statement issued to-day says: On May 25th on the Tyro-Trentino frontier, the Italian troops occupied the heights of Mont Banno, from which point the enemy were forced to retreat, abandoning tents and material which Italian artillery located at Tomozzo and silenced the enemy's fire. In Carnia, our success around Val Degano is confirmed, the Italians occupying Sassetta Prevalia. In Rascollana Valley, our losses were four killed, one officer and ten soldiers wounded. Moreover the submarine could not have failed to see our name and nationality, which was outlined in huge letters on our sides. Members of the crew of the Nebraska were agreed that the explosion was undoubtedly caused by a torpedo. The forward part of the ship was completely wrecked."

THE NEW FIRST SEA LORD. LONDON, To-day. Admiral Sir Henry Broadwood-Jackson has been appointed First Sea Lord of Admiralty, and takes the place of Admiral Lord Fisher, who resigned recently, owing it is said to differences with Winston Churchill, then First Lord of the Admiralty. Admiral Wilson will remain with the Board of Admiralty in an advisory capacity.

GOOD WORK OF E 11. LONDON, To-day. The British Admiralty issues the following report from the Vice-Admiral of the Eastern Mediterranean, Submarine E 11, Lieut. Commander Martin and E. Nanseth has sunk in the Sea of Marmora a vessel containing a great quantity of ammunition, comprising charges for heavy howitzers and several gun mountings for six inch guns. She also chased a supply ship with a heavy cargo of stores and torpedoed her, alongside the pier at Rodosto. A small store ship was also chased and run ashore. The submarine E 11 entered Constantinople, discharged a torpedo at a transport alongside the arsenal. The torpedo was heard to explode.

12.30 P.M. LAUNCH AND CREW BLOWN UP. LONDON, To-day. No trace has been found of a harbor steam launch which was moored alongside the Princess Irene, or its crew of five men, since the explosion which destroyed the big steamer. It is assumed five more men must be added to the list of dead.

SUNK BY GUN FIRE. PENZANCE, To-day. The British steamer "Cadeby" has been sunk off Scilly Islands by the gunfire from a German submarine. All aboard the vessel including four passengers were saved. The Cadeby was 677 tons and owned in Glasgow.

PERSIAN TOWN OCCUPIED. PETROGRAD, To-day. Urumiah, Persia, has been occupied by the Russians after an engagement with the Turks in the direction of Dilman and near Bekkala.

OPTIMISTIC ABOUT DARDANELLES. LONDON, To-day. The allies are described as buoyantly optimistic concerning the operations in the Dardanelles owing to the daily arrival of reinforcements of troops, ships and guns. The Turks are said to be short of heavy ammunition and to be using shrapnel filled with pebbles as well as shells with an inner casing of wood instead of more effective projectiles. Men from the front reports that the Turks on May 22nd attempted to capture the Australian position at Gaba Tepe. Describing the attack, the Times correspondent says, the first onset began at 3 a.m. and for twelve hours the enemy attacked in serried columns in a series of desperate assaults. Yet at 2 p.m. the Australians were able to signal that they were holding easily and at 3 o'clock they counter-attacked, driving the enemy back with the bayonet and pursuing him in the open to his entrenchments with great slaughter. The Turks lost 2,000 killed and 5,000 wounded. The Australian casualties though heavy were light in comparison.

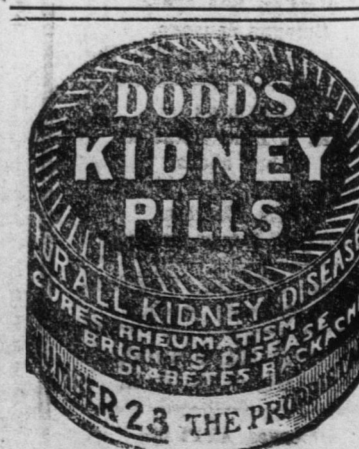

Fogota Back.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. Dalton, arrived in port from the northward last night after a round trip of 27 days during which much ice was encountered. Leaving here on Saturday, May 1st, the ship made a good run to Bay de Verde. The run from Bay de Verde to Catania, which under ordinary conditions takes about 3 hours, occupied 5 days. Four more days was spent before Greenspond was reached. At Pool's Island the Fogota took a supply of coal from the s.s. Bloodhound, and attempted to force her way farther north. The farthest port reached was Newtown, though the ship was some miles past Newtown but could not enter any of the more northern ports because of the blockade. The run from Greenspond to this port was made in 30 hours, which is remarkably good considering the ice and fog conditions. Capt. Dalton says that it would not be difficult to get down to St. Anthony on the outside of the ice, but no ship could enter the intervening ports because of the ice which is continually shifting about with the tide and blocking the harbors. The Fogota brought one passenger, S. C. Skinner in sloop and 32 in steerage. Including several crews from Greenspond and other places, who have come up for their schooners which have been moored in this port during the winter. The ship sailed again for the northward on Tuesday next.

Death of the Rev. Mother John

Of the Presentation Convent, Harbor Grace. (By H. F. Shortis.)

On the Octave of the Ascension, May 20th, the sad tolling of the Convent bell, announced to the people generally of Harbor Grace, that the pure spirit of the beloved Rev. Mother John had passed to its reward, to receive its crown of glory. No person, old or young, rich or poor, who had the privilege of speaking to the deceased lady but was edified and delighted with her pleasing personality, which brought with it an atmosphere of sanctity to the surroundings. The loss to the good Sisters of the Convent is great, and the memory of her kindly disposition, her care and attention to those committed to her charge will be life lasting. The children particularly will miss the loving care of the saintly Rev. Mother.

The Rev. Mother John (Mary Shortall) was born in the town of Mountmellick, Queen's County, Ireland, about 50 years ago. She received her early education at the Presentation Convent in that town, and subsequently she attended the Schools of the Presentation Convent, Cahel Co. Tipperary, so famous for the number of subjects it has fitted out for foreign missions. On the expiration of her period of training she with Sister M. Patrick, still in the Convent, left for Newfoundland and arrived here just 32 years ago. At that time the community consisted of Rev. Mother de Sales Lovelock, Rev. Mother Josephine French, Sisters M. Catherine de Sazli, Clare, Teresa, afterwards Rev. Mother, who are so well remembered and venerated by the older generation. Since taking up the calling to her sacred duties, Rev. Mother John devoted herself to the teaching of God's little ones, and there are many proofs of her zeal. The Rev. Mother, with Sister M. Patrick, entered her religious life May 3rd, 1883, the Feast of Ascension, and was received by the late Most Rt. Rev. Bishop MacDonald, on the Feast of Presentation, 1886, in the beautiful old Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, which was destroyed by fire on the 2nd September, 1889. Owing to the death of Mother de Sales, they were not professed until August 15th, 1886. This ceremony was also performed in the grand Cathedral. In 1911 the late Rev. Mother and Sister M. Patrick celebrated their Silver Jubilee, and at the time of her demise the Rev. Mother was in the 29th year of her profession.

The Rev. Mother was for some time suffering from an incurable illness, which she bore with all that sweetness and patience which characterized her every act in life, humbly submitting to the Will of God. Her illness necessitated two operations, the first performed by Dr. Keegan in Dec. 1914, and the second on March 6th, 1915, by Dr. Fraser. These gentlemen have the lasting gratitude of the good Ladies of the Convent for their unflinching attention to their beloved dear one's wants, as well as have the great number of friends for their sympathy in their sorrow.

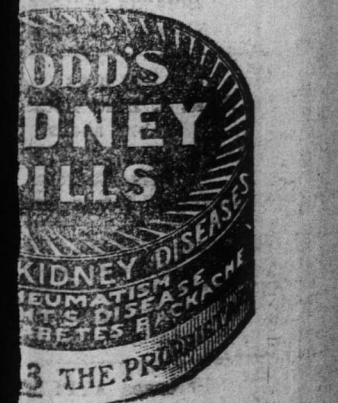
The remains of the Rev. Mother rested in the beautiful Convent Chapel until Saturday morning, when borne out to the Cathedral, High Mass was sung by Rev. Father Walker, the Rev. Dr. Whelan also being present. The procession then proceeded to the Convent Cemetery. Amongst the cortege were the school children, Catholic Cadet Corps, Children of Mary and citizens of all classes. The remains of the beloved Rev. Mother were placed in the sacred plot, among those of the dear Religious who welcomed her and Sister M. Patrick to the shores of Newfoundland, 32 years ago.

The Rev. Mother was very grateful to the Hospital staff for their unremitting care and kindness, and made special mention of Nurse McGrath. (Requiescat in pace.)

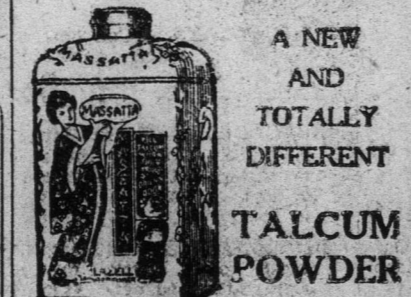

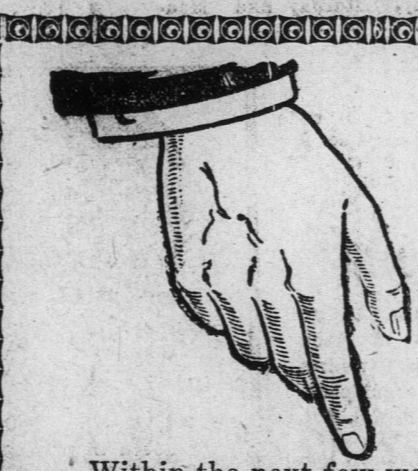

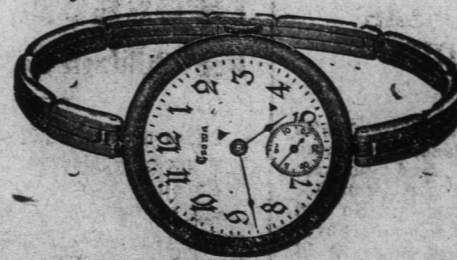
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
